# Combined Chapel Service

Around 1300 staff and students from ELC to Year 12 gathered together in a wonderful celebration of community for a wholeschool Chapel service on Friday 31 March. Reconciliation was a constant theme throughout the service which began with a Welcome to Country and a community song led by some Year 10 Music students. After Pastor Peter Bean's address, campus Principals Lester Saegenschnitter and Michael Paech launched a College-wide Reconciliation Action Plan, which seeks to promote and foster connections with Indigenous peoples and cultures. At the close of the service, Middle and Senior School students were invited to form guards of honour and to give 'high fives' to the younger students as they returned to their classrooms. This gesture was a wonderful display of friendship and support, and a fitting way to end our time together.

#### Farewell Peter Bean

After eight and a half years of service Concordia farewelled Reverend Peter Bean, known around the College as Pastor Pete. who retired at the end of Term 1, 2017. As Concordia Campus School Pastor, Peter oversaw the Chapel program, provided a listening ear, delivered pastoral addresses at Commencement and Valedictory Services, and connected with students through retreats and service trips. Through his ministry, Peter reminded young people that they are loved and valued by God, that God can be seen at work in the everyday events and relationships of life, and that we have a responsibility to protect the environment in which we live. We thank Peter for his service to the Concordia community and wish him all the best in his retirement.

#### Surfboard Street Art


Early in Term 4 last year, the Year 6 students worked together to create a collaborative artwork on a surfboard kindly donated by one of our OSHC educators. As part of their unit on the topic of street art, each student created a different wave design on the board. The contributions were unique, but the many and varied patterns combined to create a striking finished product. Once the artwork was completed, it was hung from the Art Room ceiling for all the students to enjoy.

#### ALWS Walk My Way

On Friday 3 March, the Year 6s heard from Australian Lutheran World Service representative Julie Krause about the personal stories of several refugees. In a scenario-based activity, students played the role of new arrivals in a refugee camp, building shelters and a toilet block, making a newspaper soccer ball and learning basic greetings in a foreign language. Students also heard about the ALWS Walk My Way event which will see participants, including a team from Concordia College, walking from Hahndorf to Adelaide to raise funds to support the education of children in refugee camps.







Late in Term 1, the Reception, Year 3 and Year 5 classes shared their learning with their parents through three separate year level 'Expo' events. The Reception Expo covered topics within the theme of 'Communities' while the Year 3s presented their learning under the banner of 'How the World Works' and the Year 5s demonstrated their understanding of 'Where We Are in Place and Time'. It was lovely to see students presenting with confidence through group performance, practical demonstrations and one-on-one discussions. The wind-powered skateboard race at the Year 3 Expo was a particularly exciting moment with lots of cheering in a close rush to the finish line!

#### International Mindedness

Visitors to the St John's Campus may have noticed the bright, decorative display boards around the school containing colourful paper cut-outs. Each cut-out was decorated by a different student, symbolising the valuable contribution of every person within our diverse learning community. As an International Baccalaureate World School, developing international mindedness is a key part of our teaching and learning program. The displays are a wonderful visual reminder of our common humanity, our shared guardianship of the planet, and our desire to help create a better and more peaceful world.















#### Digital Design

For many students, the introduction of the new Digital Design course offers an exciting opportunity to take on new challenges and develop skills for the future including computational thinking, programming and automatic data manipulation. Throughout Term 1, students in Years 7 and 8 have been learning the basic concepts of computer programming with the goal of developing a basic mathematics application or a 2D interactive game. At the end of the course, students were divided into teams and applied newly founded skills to simulate a test for driverless cars at an intersection with traffic lights, using Sphero Robotics programming.

Digital media has also been a focus, with Year 7s creating a photographic montage video and Year 8s producing an audio podcast about the impacts of e-waste. There have been some fantastic results already and we look forward to seeing what our students will produce next!

#### Fairy-tale Endings

Two groups of Year 8 students recently performed their fairy-tale adaptations for an appreciative Year 2 audience following the introduction of a new Drama course into the Year 8 Arts curriculum. The students had fun creating storylines, developing characters, adding props and wearing costumes to enhance their productions which provided plenty of entertainment for the young audience.

#### Middle School Showcase

The Middle School Showcase in Term 4 provided parents, staff and students from other year levels with an insight into the learning that had been taking place amongst our Year 7 and 8 students.

The Year 7s presented major projects on the theme of Ancient Civilisations through many impressive models and displays.

The Year 8 classes ran an engaging Science Fair, presenting interactive experiments and informative displays to showcase their learning on topics including strength and agility, the psychology of rabbits and how they learn, whether or not different foods can produce electricity, and more. Four prizes were awarded, with Ella George and Indi Zammit named overall winners for their experiment on the psychology of pain perception.



Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 were recently equipped with some useful information on the topic of cyber bullying through an engaging drama performance by Brainstorm Productions. The performance helped students to consider the impact that online interactions can have on people. It was a helpful reminder of the rights and responsibilities each person has as a digital citizen, as well as the need to look out for one another and to speak up on this important topic.

#### Year 9 Challenge Day

On Friday 24 March our Year 9 students spent the day at Belair National Park, participating in a range of team building activities, games and exercises to enhance wellbeing. The culminating activity saw students working together in their Home Classes to develop strategies that utilised each member's strengths in order to progress through four challenges as quickly as possible. The race was a highlight for many students, with each Home Class keen to secure the win. During the race, students had to climb through the 'spider web' of ropes, complete a word puzzle, circumnavigate the playground by balancing on the wooden skirting and complete a whole-team table tennis rally. Year 9 student Kaelah Owens-Fleetwood had this to say after the conclusion of the final challenge:

"Congratulations to all the 9SBR girls on winning the race! Challenge Day was not only lots of fun, but it was a great way for Home Classes to work on team building skills and friendships."











#### Outstanding Year 12 Results for the Class of 2016

In 2016, Concordia students once again achieved some outstanding academic results. Of the 147 students who completed the SACE or the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP):

- Around 26% achieved an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) of 90 or above, placing them in the top 10% of students nationwide
- 52% achieved ATAR scores of 80 or more, placing them in the top 20%
- 17 students gained Merit certificates for obtaining a perfect score in a particular subject.

Among the IBDP cohort, the average and median scores were 95.15, with the top IB student achieving the maximum possible score of 99.95.

Some particularly notable achievements include:

Abby Mather was the top IBDP student and the Dux of Concordia College in 2016, achieving the highest possible ATAR of 99.95. Abby also earned four subject Merits for Physics HL, Chemistry SL, Mathematics SL and Spanish ab initio SL.

**Amber Watkins** was the top SACE student, with an ATAR of 99.0 and subject Merits

for Performance Special Study and Legal Studies.

The majority of students who applied for university admission gained entry into their first preference course. The top tertiary pathways in 2016 were Medical, Health Sciences and Allied Health, as well as Business, Commerce, Management and Marketing.

Congratulations to the Class of 2016 on their incredible achievements!

#### Abby's Advice

In her speech after Abby was announced as the new Dux of Concordia College, she sincerely thanked her teachers, her friends, and her parents. She also gave some excellent advice to current students:

"Don't fall into the trap of thinking that Year 12, or a result, defines you. The beautiful thing about being as self-aware as we are, is that we can redefine ourselves at any moment. One thing that helped me was imagining myself in ten years' time. Not so much where I was in life, but what qualities I wanted to possess. Once I had figured out what kind of person I wanted to be in ten years, I began to try to be that person now ... Every year of your life, and every aspect of your life, is a reflection of who you are at that time. So my advice would be: figure out what kind of person you want to be and let Year 12, and the rest of your life as you continually grow, reflect that."

## Heart Foundation Fundraiser

Continuing an annual tradition, the Concordia Campus Student Leaders coordinated a Valentine's Day fundraiser, with proceeds going to The Heart Foundation. Red roses and singing telegrams were available for purchase leading up to the event and these were delivered with much enthusiasm and joy by the Year 12s during Home Class. The students' creativity was highlighted through their colourful outfits and singing telegram performances, and this year their efforts raised over \$1000 for this worthy cause.

# Paper Cranes for Hiroshima

Late in 2016, during a unit on the poetry of war, Year 10 English students decided to fold 100 paper cranes to send overseas with representatives from their class who were involved in the Japan Music Tour. The paper crane is a traditional symbol of hope, peace and healing. The cranes were formed into an artistic arrangement which was placed in Hiroshima's Peace Memorial Park during the Japan Tour.

#### Legal Studies

A group of Year 11 Legal Studies students travelled to Adelaide's Parliament House in Term 4 to hear Professor Dean Jaensch, Professor Rick Sarre and barrister Michael Manetta give their views on the question "Should Australia become a republic?" The much-anticipated culminating activity was a debate amongst students from various schools in the House of Assembly. Our students had this to say about the debate:

"No one held back and though it was very entertaining, it also allowed us to gain knowledge and a greater understanding of the topic, whilst enabling us to hear different opinions. Overall it was an extremely rewarding opportunity."

# Design Your Own Experiment

Year 12 Physics students had an opportunity in Term 1 to design and carry out their own experiments to answer a question that was of interest to them. The resulting experiments covered a variety of topics and it was great to see the students taking ownership of their learning in this way in order to further their understanding. Some of the highlights included measuring the chiral activity of sugar with a laser, testing cantilever and supported beams, and investigating uniform circular, projectile and Bifilar Pendulum motion.











Through service, students develop an outward focus, looking beyond their circumstances and providing practical assistance to others. Here are just some of the ways students have been a blessing to the wider community in recent months.

#### Road Crossing Monitors

Each school day, students from Years 5 and 6 serve the community as Road Crossing Monitors, ensuring the safety of students and their families amidst the busy traffic.

In Term 4 last year these students received in-person training from an SA Police Officer, giving them a greater insight into this important role and preparing them to serve in 2017.



In Term 4, Year 8 students took part in a three-day Connected Unley program, with each day focused on an aspect of Concordia's vision statement; Engage. Achieve. Serve.

The service component saw students serving the Unley community by making soup, creating Christmas cards and assembling hygiene packs for The Salvation Army to distribute to people in need, working in the garden at Fullarton Park Community Centre, and providing assistance to local churches, schools and community groups.



#### Mary Magdalene Drop-In Centre

On Saturday 25 February, the Concordia Campus Student Leaders worked alongside the Head of Senior School and one of our wonderful P&F volunteers Liz Sexton to prepare and serve a hearty meal to the patrons of the Mary Magdalene Drop-In Centre in Adelaide's CBD. School Leader Benjamin Lang reflected on the experience by saying, "The trip to the Mary Magdalene Centre was a great opportunity for us to be able to give back a bit to the community ... Helping to prepare the food that Concordia Senior School families had donated and having a hands-on role in serving the community was certainly an eye-opener. It built upon our appreciation of what we have, and just how privileged we are with things we often take for granted."



On Friday 7 April, students from ELC to Year 6 took to their feet for the annual Siassi Walkathon, raising funds to support the St John's Campus partnership with the Siassi community in Papua New Guinea. The students had one hour to complete as many laps of the oval as they could – a welcome challenge for many! In the end, over \$3,600 was raised. The Walkathon is a wonderful reminder that there are simple things we can do to make a difference in the lives of others.

#### Environmental 'Green Team'

To serve their community and protect the environment, a group of St John's Campus students have developed an initiative known as the 'Green Team' which monitors and reduces waste. The initiative originally stemmed from a Year 2 curriculum unit and was then driven by the Student Representative Council (SRC). By coordinating the distribution and emptying of organic waste bins for each classroom, the Green Team has seen a reduction in the amount of regular 'blue bins' filled each week. A display has been placed in the central courtyard to report on the number of blue bins used from one week to the next, thereby encouraging students to think twice before sending rubbish to landfill.

The St John's Campus SRC and Concordia Campus Forum exist to give students a voice, to facilitate student-led initiatives, and to provide opportunities for students to serve their peers.









#### Flexible Learning

Flexible learning environments complement our teaching program by facilitating student choice, fostering engagement and encouraging collaboration.

In our Early Learning Centre you'll see students sitting on stools or on the floor around small tables, enjoying books on bean bags or cushions in the reading corner, and moving from one area to another depending on their interests.

In Reception, flexible learning is commonly used to help students to develop

fundamental skills in phonics, spelling, reading, sorting, counting, addition and subtraction. Students may sit at desks in small groups or work on the floor. They might read along with audiobooks on their iPads or read on the couch in the reading corner. There are even open-faced calico tents with cushions which provide a quiet space to sit and concentrate amidst the busyness of the classroom!

When asked what they enjoy most about their learning environment, our Reception students shared these thoughts:

"I sometimes sit with my friends and sometimes on my own. I like the comfortable chairs, they feel like my chairs at home."

"I feel safe in my classroom."

The Resource Centre provides another flexible space, with different types of seating in various areas for students to use while working or reading individually or in groups.

In the Murtoa building, Middle School classes enjoy opportunities for collaboration and team teaching due to the interconnected layout of the classrooms with large glass sliding doors that open out into central breakout spaces. At different times, students may work in small groups

around tables, find a quiet space on a beanbag or chair on the landing, or work in pairs on the bench seat by the window.

The Atrium and the new Common Room in the Senior School provide open plan and quiet study spaces with café and boothstyle seating. Senior students also have access to the Media Centre, a flexible, hightech space which broadens the scope of their learning experiences.

The new science centre has also been designed with a focus on flexible learning. Classrooms and laboratories surround a

series of breakout spaces, promoting the sharing of ideas across different subject boundaries.

Each student brings a different perspective, a preferred learning style and a unique set of strengths to our learning community. Providing opportunities for students to reflect on their strengths and to identify ways in which they can utilise the learning environment to help them achieve their goals is key to fostering active engagement and ownership.

The annual Art Show featured a wide range of student artwork which was enthusiastically received in a gallery-style exhibition on Friday 18 November.



#### **Europe Art Trip**







The 2017 Europe Art Trip was an aspiring artist's dream and an incredibly memorable experience for the students and staff involved.

A group of 26 students and three staff departed from Adelaide on Friday 7 April on a three-week tour of Italy, France and Spain, taking in the sights, sounds and beautiful spring weather while also visiting many galleries and historical locations.

Drawing lessons in Florence were a highlight, as was a visit to Monet's famous water lily garden in Giverny. A short stop in Nice saw the group visiting the museums of Matisse and Chagall before moving on to Baux-de-Provence. Here they witnessed the Carrieres de Lumieres, an audio visual display based on the work of Brueghel, Bosch and Arcimboldo set in a stunning limestone quarry. Following in the footsteps of Vincent van Gogh, the group toured the countryside of Arles and St Remy, visiting many of the sites painted by the renowned artist.

From visiting the Eiffel Tower and the Louvre to exploring the art and architecture of ancient Rome, the Renaissance and the work of the Impressionists, there were many exciting experiences to be enjoyed and many lasting memories were certainly created.

A flamenco show in Barcelona on the final night was a vivid display of Spain's dynamic and diverse culture, and a fitting way to end a wonderful trip. The students represented the College wonderfully throughout the tour, working well as a group and building new friendships.

With the new science centre due to open in October, it is an exciting time for teaching and learning at Concordia. Here are some of the many learning opportunities embraced by our students in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM).

#### **BioPhotonics**

Year 10 STEM students and Year 11 Physics students attended a student outreach session as part of the Australasia Conference for BioPhotonics held at the Adelaide Convention Centre. Given the design of the new science centre around a series of breakout spaces, it was fitting that students heard about the need for collaboration across scientific fields. During the session, students witnessed demonstrations involving lasers and photosensitive surfaces, as well as engaging with scientists from the Centre for Nanoscale BioPhotonics.

#### **Engineering Week**

Several students participated in the Engineering Week activities at UniSA's Mawson Lakes campus late last year. Working in groups with students from other schools, they engaged in challenging tasks such as building a spaghetti and marshmallow tower, and programming a small stepper robot to traverse a maze.

#### Women in Mathematics

In March, a number of female students attended an event run by the Australian Mathematical Sciences Institute (AMSI) designed to encourage female students to consider careers in mathematics. As well as watching the film *Hidden Figures*, about a group of women who worked for NASA during the space race, students heard from some inspiring women whose interest in mathematics has led them into some fascinating maths-related careers.

#### Light, Sound & Electricity

Students in the Middle School have enjoyed some scientific workshops in recent months, benefitting from the expertise of Mr Shaun Clamp, a much-loved member of the Design and Technology Department and former Technical Controller of Scottish Television. Through a series of practical demonstrations, students learnt about the science of light and sound energy. Members of the lunchtime Electronics Club have also had fun exploring the application of electronic solutions to monitor patient care in hospitals. Students have discovered how machines can move and guide themselves, much like the technology that is currently being tested in driverless cars.

#### Global Perspective









As well as helping students to become competent communicators in a second language, studies in language acquisition seek to foster respect and understanding of other cultures, and to help develop a global perspective.

#### **AIYEP Performance**

The Australia-Indonesia Youth Exchange Program aims to develop international relationships by providing opportunities for young adults with leadership potential to experience and understand the culture and development of the two nations. A group of Indonesian AIYEP participants visited the College in October and shared traditional songs and dances from their home towns. The vibrancy and passion of the performers was engaging and gave students an insight into Indonesia's diversity.

# Flinders University Visitors

In Term 4 last year, Year 7 Indonesian students had a great time learning traditional games and activities from guests based at Flinders University. Students tried a board game called 'Congklak', a variation of knuckle bones called 'bekel' and a game called 'kayu doi'. They also learnt to make skipping ropes (tali lompat) out of rubber bands – a task that is easier than it sounds!

#### German Exchange Students

In Term 1 we welcomed our exchange students from Germany. As well as attending school with their Concordia partners, the students experienced some quintessential Australian sights and sounds on an outback tour. During their time at Concordia they visited classes at the St John's Campus to speak to students about German customs, language, clothing and culture. In return, the Year 3 students taught them how to play cricket! It was wonderful to have the German students with us and we look forward to hearing from our Year 11 German Exchange students after their trip to Germany at the end of the year.



Held every two years, Concordia's international music tours provide students with a chance to gain an insight into the life of a touring musician, to immerse themselves in a different culture and to share their musical talents with people from other parts of the world.

The Japan Music Tour saw a team of Concordia students performing concerts in a range of locations throughout Japan in November. The tour group included the Concert Band, Big Band 1 and a group of singers, as well as supervising staff and hugely talented guest artist, Adam Page. While on tour the students visited Osaka, Hiroshima, Himeji, Kyoto, Sendai and Tokyo, and also connected with three Japanese schools. Performing for the Japanese students was a real privilege and each performance was extremely well received.

A particularly memorable and moving moment was the visit to Peace Memorial Park and the A-Bomb Museum at Hiroshima. While at Hiroshima, tour members placed 100 paper cranes made by Year 10 English students in the Memorial Park as a symbol of hope and healing.

The students were exemplary in their conduct and no doubt many are looking forward to the next international tour in 2018!













The annual Concordia musical, a tradition which can be traced back to 1961, provides theatrical and musical performance opportunities to a large number of students. This year's production of Annie took place on Friday 7 and Saturday 8 April.

As always, we were blessed with a large group of volunteers comprising old collegians, staff, students and parents who helped with the various stalls. We thank all who attended for contributing to the fun and vibrant community atmosphere.







#### Celebrating 90 Years of Co-education

The 1920s saw a groundswell of support in the Lutheran Church for the Christian education of girls beyond the primary school years.

In the years after the end of World War I, when Lutheran primary schools were allowed to reopen, there was an urgent need for the secondary education of female students in the hope that they might become teachers. It was also hoped to provide parents with a more desirable option for the secondary education of their daughters than independent schools of other denominations.

In March 1925, the issue was raised at the Synod of the SA district and in September the process took a decisive turn with the formation of the Society for Higher Education. The initial aim was to establish a separate college or high school for girls. However, further discussions eventually led to a recommendation which made the enrolment of girls at Concordia College possible. A further breakthrough came when Professor Koch told Synod that the Society for Higher Education would be financially responsible for providing board and lodging for the girls.

Two major issues remained. The problem of suitable accommodation for female boarders was solved when a house at number 57 (now 59) Cheltenham Street became available for a reasonable rent. There were two to four beds in each room and according to the prospectus the two bathrooms provided 'ample facilities for practising the virtue of personal cleanliness.'

Concern for the supervision of the girls was abated when Miss T Noske of Melbourne offered her services as matron for a small honorarium. She was assisted by Miss E Klose who served as the cook.

#### A Historic Year

At the start of the 1927 school year, nineteen girls were enrolled, four of them day students. Fifteen boarders from three states filled the Cheltenham Street hostel to capacity.

Daily hostel life was well ordered. Even the free time was closely supervised. However, there were plenty of opportunities for fun.

Lydia Myer, who attended the College in 1929, tells the

following anecdote:

"My vivid memory of the hostel is of everything being spic and span ... We had hard straw beds, and the wind whistled through the everopen door and windows. On April Fools' Day Miss Noske played a joke on us by giving us empty boiled eggs! In addition she arranged for us girls to dress up and perform a mock wedding reception, which we all thoroughly enjoyed - including the iced cake made of mud! Miss Noske, however, was 'hauled over the coals' for daring to do such a thing."

#### The Results

Two years later it was reported that the enrolment of girls had thankfully 'not created a demand for extra teachers and classrooms, as girls join the boys' classes...' The initiative was regarded as a trial, and although there was satisfaction at the way the 'experiment' had worked, as well as with student behaviour, reservations remained about its longterm viability. Dr Elmore Leske remarks that early on "it was more a situation of co-existence than a

positive attempt to provide co-education".

#### Relationships

Reminiscences, as well as reports in *The Brown and Gold* magazines, reveal that girls in the hostel not only forged life-long friendships with each other, but also enjoyed warm relationships with teachers and hostel staff.

"One of my greatest joys was that I found Concordia a real haven; I discovered loving Christian fellowship there... the girls took the same subjects as the boys. The boys sat in all the back rows and the girls in the front desks..."

"The homelike atmosphere that exists at the hostel is, no doubt, due to the kind and loving efforts of the matron. The happy companionship of the boarders can be understood when one considers that similar occupations, similar interests, and the same Christian faith are strong ties that bind hearts together. ... Past hostel girls will always look back with pleasure to the happy times spent together... to the friendships that were then formed..." The Brown and Gold, 1932.

# There were very definite rules and regulations about contact between boys and girls.

Girls were not permitted to correspond with boys, other than their brothers. Even then, all mail to the girls 'passed through the hands of the matron.' The boys were also told that "The association with girls is permitted only in family circles or in public gatherings which have been approved of by the Faculty."

However, where there was a will, there was a way!

"Although it was against the rules for us girls to talk to the boys in class or at recess time, and meeting in the street by arrangement was a serious offence, we still found ways of communicating with the boy we liked or that showed that he liked us by frequent looks and smiles. My diaries from 1929 and 1930 have frequent references to thrills received from being noticed in a special way by some boy I liked at the time." Agnes (Hoffmann) Nagorcka, enrolled 1927.

"We had a certain time for going to the tuck shop (canteen); so did the boys. This was to ensure we'd never meet the boys there. ... It so happened I eventually married the man I had fallen in love with very early in the piece at Concordia..." Claudia (Koch) Rosenblatt, enrolled 1927.




#### Dr Elmore Leske sums up strides in co-education in the decades yet to come:

"As long as boarding was a major part of the essence of Concordia, little by little there was a movement from mere co-existence of the girls toward what may be classed as co-education. This came about with the rapid increase in the number of girl students... and with the development of educational theory and practice. ... There was an increasing awareness of the fact that Concordia had one of the longest histories of co-education in South Australia." Concordia 100 years, Murtoa-Adelaide : a history of Concordia College, Adelaide, 1990, p 68.

## Did you know?

After attending Concordia College, a number of female old collegians, including those mentioned below, built on these foundations and became notable educators in their own right.



#### **Loris Grote** 1936 - 2015

Loris attended Concordia College from 1949-1952. She excelled in her studies and was top of her year in the 1951 Intermediate Exams. After her high school years, Loris trained as a nurse at the Royal Adelaide Hospital and then as a midwife at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. With a commitment to lifelong learning and a desire for equality, especially for girls, Loris completed a Bachelor of Education as a mature age student and became a nurse educator. She continued to work and volunteer throughout her life, ensuring that her involvement in education would continue thereafter through her generous provision of Concordia's Loris Grote Nursing Scholarship.



Rita Fischer 1919 - 2017

Rita Fischer (nee Meyer) attended Concordia in 1936. After secondary school. she went on to study at a tertiary level and worked as a kindergarten teacher, furthering her studies in subsequent years. In 1976, Rita's lifelong ambition of starting a Christian kindergarten came to fruition with the opening of Calvary Kindergarten at Calvary Lutheran Church in Morphett Vale. Rita's generosity helped to fund the establishment of the new kindergarten and she became its first director. Her example of Christian service was a blessing to the children in her care and her friendship was valued by many members of the Concordia community.



Naomi Hoff 1923 - Present

Naomi attended Concordia from 1936-1939. Following her graduation, Naomi's early career involved working in remote schools, sometimes as the sole teacher, with only basic equipment available. Naomi was a founding staff member of Concordia Lutheran College in Toowomba when it opened in 1946 and by the time she reached her sixties she had helped found and building up many Lutheran schools. A new adventure then took her to Papua New Guinea, where she taught for 12 years. For a total of 47 years Naomi dedicated her life to the important work of inspiring and educating young people. Her enduring faith and willingness to follow God's call are an inspiration to many. Naomi's family has been connected to Concordia since it began, with a member of her extended family currently attending as a fifth generation Concordia student.



There is a buzz this year around the Concordia Campus as students, teachers, families and community members witness the building progress of the very impressive looking Centre for Science and Discovery that fronts onto Cheltenham Street.


