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From the Concordia Campus Principal





Innovative and Accessible Education

As I begin my journey as Principal of the Concordia Campus, it is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on our spiritual heritage and the impact our church's teaching has had on education. Not many people would know that Martin Luther himself was a staunch advocate of innovative and accessible education, and was at the forefront of those who sought change in education in his time. Although Luther's writings were immense, Concordia College derives its name from the document that brings all Lutheran teaching together, *the Book of Concord (1580)*, and this is a heritage for which we are grateful.

Appreciating the role of education in directing church and society, Martin Luther put forward views that were deemed radical at the time, including:

Education as a right of all children. Luther wrote, "the greatest wealth of any society is in its well-educated citizens". In 1524, he reminded the councilmen that a city's true wealth resides in its "able, learned, wise, honourable, and well-educated citizens."

Expanding educational opportunities. Luther urged parents to send their children to school and called upon the authorities to provide scholarships and support for education to expand opportunities for young people, recognising the essential role of education in preparing "good and capable men and women".

Promoting learning for life and life-long learning. In a time when learning was seen as the right and privilege of only a gifted and wealthy few, Luther emphasised not only education for all, but education as a life-time pursuit.

Emphasising the liberal arts. Luther supported the study of the liberal arts and emphasised the study of languages as particularly valuable.

Even though it is over 400 years since Luther's death, his insights are still relevant for our current educational scene. Lutheran schools aim to encourage and support students, informed and sustained by the Word of God, to develop their God-given talents so that they may shape and enrich their world. (A vision for learners and learning in Lutheran schools, 2005)

In reflecting on key aspects of effective pedagogy, particularly the powerful combination of engagement and meaning in contributing to a sense of purpose, I feel blessed to work at Concordia College. Within our context, teachers have the opportunity to innovate with the intention of creating rich learning opportunities for the students. Underpinning this intention is our Gospel focus with its acute sense of forgiveness, service and emphasis on living in a loving community.

Let us continue to be grounded in our faith based approach while pushing the boundaries of educational innovation and accessibility.

Commencement 2018



It was with much excitement and anticipation that students and staff began the 2018 school year on Monday 29 January.

During the St John's Campus opening Chapel service, Principal Michael Paech extended a warm welcome to students and new staff, and the 2018 School Leaders were officially installed.

On Tuesday 30 January, the Concordia Campus Commencement Service formally ushered in the new school year for the Middle and Senior Schools. As well as new Student Leaders and House Leaders, a total of 15 staff members were installed. Among them this year were Paul Weinert and Dale Gosden who were installed into significant leadership positions at the Concordia Campus, as Principal and School Pastor respectively. Bishop David Altus and Mr John Proeve, Executive Director of Lutheran Education SA/NT/WA, formally installed Paul and Dale, praying for God to work in and through them as they serve at Concordia.



The Class of 2017 are congratulated on achieving some excellent academic results, with 28.9% of students gaining an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) score of 90 or greater, which places them in the top 10% of students nationwide. In addition, over 54% achieved scores of 80 or above, with four students receiving scores of 99 or greater.

A total of 19 Merits for perfect scores were awarded to 15 students across nine subjects. These results reflect the hard work and perseverance of our Year 12s throughout their final year of school, and we wish all graduates the very best for the future.

The top university pathways chosen were Medical, Allied Health and Health Sciences, followed by Business, Commerce, Management and Marketing.

Dux of Concordia College

Earlier this year, Mitchell Munn was recognised as the Dux of Concordia College for 2017 with an outstanding ATAR of 99.80. In his acceptance speech, Mitchell expressed his gratitude to his teachers, his parents and the Class of 2017, as well as encouraging the Class of 2018 to focus on always putting in their best effort, rather than comparing themselves to others.

"When I went into Year 12, I told myself that I would simply work as hard as I could. ... I wanted to make sure that by the end of the year I would be able to tell myself that I had honestly done my best. ... The only thing you have any control over in Year 12 is how hard you work. Never settle for anything less than your best, and you will never have any reason for regret. Reformation 500 Celebrations

On Tuesday 31 October 2017, students at Concordia joined many people around the world in celebrating the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation, when Martin Luther nailed 95 theological theses for debate on the Castle Church door in Wittenberg, Germany.

Chapel devotions at both campuses provided an insight into the historical and spiritual significance of Luther's actions.

Reformation Fair

St John's Campus students and staff commemorated the occasion by dressing in period costumes. Jostling jesters, knavish knights, medieval maids and marvellous monks all added to the celebration, which included a chance for students to visit the Reformation Fairground throughout the week. Run by Mrs Reu's Year 4 class, the Fairground traced aspects of the story of Luther's life through games and activities such as Coins in the Coffer, the Printing Press, Pin the Cross on the Luther Rose, and perhaps the most energetic – the 'Run for Your Life' relay!

Commemorative Services

Approximately 20 Concordia Campus students represented the College at various events held in Adelaide. In the evening, senior students read Prayers of Intercession during a service at St Francis Xavier Cathedral and lit five candles symbolising agreements made between Catholic and Lutheran Churches as part of the national "Together in Hope" initiative.

Nautilus Centre Visits

Since the Nautilus Centre opened in Term 4 last year, some of our St John's Campus students have enjoyed opportunities to use the microscopes in the labs. On one occasion, the Year 1s worked with the Year 8s to take a microscopic view of some plant specimens they had collected. Later, a different group of Year 1 students became budding forensic scientists, observing the intricate patterns of fingerprints. Year 3s from City to Sea

To finish the unit of study they planned a 'big bike ride' and on Thursday 26 October the students' perseverance and determination were evident as they rode 15km along the Linear Park from the city to Henley Square! Through their journey, students looked at how the river changes as it makes its way to the sea and considered actions required to ensure its future health.

Siassi Teacher Visit

This year, the St John's Campus community continued its partnership with the Siassi Islands of Papua New Guinea by hosting three teachers for a 10-day stay. During their time with us the visiting teachers were immersed in the English language, learned valuable skills and strategies from our teachers, and greatly enjoyed opportunities for worship and fellowship as part of an Australian Lutheran community. Their visit coincided with our annual Siassi Walkathon, which was lots of fun and saw the St John's Campus community raise over \$2500 for the Siassi schools.

Murtoa Showcase

The Murtoa Showcase in Term 4 enabled our Year 7 and 8 students to share their learning with parents, staff and other students through an exploration of Historical Civilisations and Societies in the Year 7 classrooms, and an engaging, interactive Science Fair run by the Year 8s.

The Year 7 projects were impressive in diversity and scope, ranging from a moving model of a centrifugal steam governor to a study of Roman aqueducts, an investigation into the history of paint brushes and more. The Year 8 work was also well presented with a wide variety of exhibits and experiments including the efficacy of multitasking, the effect of parents' careers on the pathways chosen by their children, and factors influencing taste perception. The air cannon was also of interest to many! Throughout the showcase it was wonderful to see the students taking pride in their work and sharing their knowledge with those who attended.

Culture and Innovation through Music and Food

In Term 4, Year 9 Music and Food Design students worked together creatively to unpack the concepts of culture and innovation. The students' goal was to decide whether food and music are mediums for innovation and cultural expression. The culminating activity was a great success as students delivered dining experiences that combined original food designs and music compositions, exploring cultures such as French, Australian (including Indigenous Australian), Indonesian, Irish, American/Cajun and Greek.

Connected Unley

For three days in Term 4, our Year 8 students learned about, and served, the Unley community through the annual Connected Unley program, with each day aligning to one of the three pillars of Concordia's vision: Engage, Achieve, Serve.

The 'Engage' component saw students hearing from the Mayor, touring the local area and stopping at sites of historic, cultural and social significance to learn more about the community. The next day was spent serving others through tasks such as cooking for those in need, assembling hygiene packs and helping in the thrift shop at The Salvation Army, gardening, visiting residents at Fullarton Lutheran Homes and assisting local churches. Finally, students spent a day reflecting on and presenting what they had learned.

Concordia - The Rite Journey

Year 9 students were up bright and early on Friday 23 March, leaving Concordia at 5.15am to travel to the Bluff at Victor Harbor for a unique sunrise experience as part of their Pastoral Care. 'The Calling' ceremony is a component of Concordia - The Rite Journey, a yearlong program introduced at the College in 2018 to assist students at this important stage of their transition from childhood to adulthood. German Exchange 2017-18

Eighteen Year 11 students (now in Year 12) departed from Adelaide on Friday, 24 November, to experience just over two months abroad on the 2017-18 German Exchange. Staying with their host families in Bavaria, the students were immersed in German family life, school and culture. As well as experiencing what life is like for students in another part of the world, the students were able to improve their German language skills. They had a fantastic time together on a nine-day trip to Berlin, taking in many of the historic and cultural sites within this fascinating city. After saying goodbye to their host families, the students returned to Australia with many memories which are sure to stay with them for years to come.

National Youth Science Forum

Early in January, two Year 12 students attended the National Youth Science Forum at Australian National University in Canberra after successfully undergoing a rigorous selection process last year. Lachlan Maddaford and Benjamin Cook were among the 200 participants who spent 12 days immersed in all things Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). They attended lab and site visits, keynote addresses, lectures, workshops and debates. The delegates also enjoyed networking with peers from around Australia, meeting prominent members of the scientific community, performing scientific experiments and gaining valuable insights into potential study and career pathways. As well as being action-packed, the Forum was an amazing learning opportunity for the students to further develop their interest in STEM while experiencing life on a university campus.

Ella's interest in science has developed from a young age. Having been involved in the Science Club at primary school, she now studies Physics in the senior years and hopes to become Australia's first female in space.

The Camp, held at the US Space and Rocket Center, will provide a rare and exciting insight into the space program through simulated missions and STEM-based challenges, team building activities, and the chance to utilise equipment used to train astronauts

The Nautilus Centre











The Nautilus Centre, Concordia's fantastic new facility for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics (STEAM), was officially opened on Monday 30 October by His Excellency the Honourable Hieu Van Le AC, Governor of South Australia.

Invited guests joined students and staff in the Chapel for the opening service. The building was dedicated by Reverend David Altus after several speeches and a ceremonial handing over of the keys from John Held of Russell & Yelland Architects to Sylvia Andersons, Chair of the College Board. Incoming School Captains Jacob Kemp and Cate Sexton then assisted the Governor with the unveiling of the plaque.

After the service, guests made their way to the new building to witness the cutting of the ribbon by the Governor, with assistance from 2017 School Captains Harrison Warrick and Georgina Leske. Guests then enjoyed the opportunity to tour the facility and to see various classes in action.


We are thankful to all who contributed to this project which marks the beginning of a new era in Science and Art education at Concordia College.

STEAM at Concordia











Providing opportunities for learning across traditional subject boundaries in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics, STEAM helps prepare students for future vocational pathways. Our STEAM strategy focuses on helping students to think analytically and creatively, drawing on knowledge and skills from different disciplines, and harnessing the ever-growing technological landscape to solve real-world problems.

Primary Years

In the Primary School, STEAM learning involves grasping key concepts and beginning to see how they connect through units of learning that span multiple subject areas. For example, students program miniature 'Bee-Bot' robots to develop mathematical estimation, spatial awareness and sequencing skills. Teachers also organise activities, excursions and visiting presenters to extend STEAM learning. In Term 4 our Year 2s enjoyed a visit from SciWorld presenters as the students began to study 'How the World Works'. They explored forces and the six types of simple machines (inclined plane, wedge, screw, lever, wheel and axle, and the pulley), prompting excitement for further learning and a desire to create their own inventions.

Secondary Years

Year 10 STEM students learn about the forces of gravity, lift, drag and thrust, as well as aerodynamic and engineering principles as they design, construct, test and evaluate model gliders. They also apply engineering principles related to solar power and energy efficiency to build a solar car, utilising technologies such as 3D printing, laser cutting and gearing.

Year 10 students attending a two-day elective in Term 4 used robotics to develop a solution to a real-world problem following a presentation from Dr Russell Brinkworth, Program Director in the University of South Australia's School of Engineering. The mathematics associated with the programming of self-driving cars was an area of particular interest for many students.

The opening of the Nautilus Centre has also brought new opportunities to embed STEAM-related skills into the curriculum, with some innovative and relevant learning experiences already underway in Art, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education and Humanities.

We are thrilled to be able to offer valuable learning experiences for students at all year levels and to draw on state-of-the-art facilities in this ever-evolving area.

Art Show













2017 was a year of 'firsts' for the Art Show. As well as a new venue, beautiful furniture pieces created by Design and Technology students were displayed alongside work by Visual Art and Design students for the first time.

In 2017 the Year 12 exhibition moved to the Nautilus Centre, with work filling the downstairs art rooms, foyer and breakout space, creating a unique gallery which was enjoyed by guests on Friday, 17 November. Artworks by Year 7 to 11 students were also displayed in the Art Centre. The theme of "Fusion" represented the synthesis of ideas that led to the final pieces and the combination of multiple curriculum areas, with Food and Hospitality students also catering for the event.

Gala Ball



Beyond Books

In 1918 the library at Concordia was housed in a small room. A student described it as 'inconveniently situated, ill-lighted, and poorly supplied with books... many altogether useless.'

However, when a new lecture hall and chapel² was opened in 1927, a vacant room was transformed into a bright and cheerful library.

At the formal opening and dedication Professor Koch stressed the great value of books as 'companions and teachers'. He stated that 'the library is the most pleasant and best-equipped room in the College. An attractive feature is the collection of pictures adorning the walls. A beautiful painting of our Saviour and a picture of Luther help to remind us that although secular knowledge is very useful, spiritual knowledge is far more important.'

Growing Collections

By the 1930s and 1940s, the general collection was beginning to cater for the interests of secondary school students. As well as the usual reference works and classics, 'lighter novels ... of the kind that uplifts and gives food for healthy thought', were also included.

There was also a theological library for seminary students and a small book collection in the hostel for girls.

Student Opinions

In 1942 an opinion poll aimed at senior students posed the following question: Does the library satisfy the needs of the student body? Only one student gave a positive response, while 13 made very negative comments.

'Many of the present volumes should be consigned to flames'; and 'we need a combination of the libraries for boys, girls and teachers in a separate building.'

This last thought was echoed by Professor F Blaess, who

was later headmaster of Concordia from 1953-1959. He wrote: 'What Concordia needs is a modern library building, where old tomes and newer volumes can be properly housed instead of being scattered over four rooms in different parts of the College, and where teachers and students have greater facilities for diligent study and research.'

First Librarian

By the 1960s there was a growing recognition of the importance of libraries in teaching and learning, and the need to have access to resources throughout the school day. Until 1965, when a full-time librarian was appointed, the library was open for students only when teachers could volunteer their time. A student wrote that the inaugural librarian. Miss Dora Georg, an old collegian, displayed the 'most necessary characteristics of friendliness, patience, accuracy and sometimes a firm hand.'

Audiovisual

The 1970s saw many rapid developments as library collections moved beyond

books and printed materials to include audiovisual resources.

Concordia's first purposebuilt library, the Georg Memorial Library, was opened in 1970. It was regarded as a real showpiece, well ahead of its time, and was made possible by generous Commonwealth funding aimed at raising the standards of school libraries.

It was glowingly described as 'large and well-lit, with seating both upstairs and downstairs' and with 'adequate shelving for books, as well as enclosures designed for tape recorders, record players and slides'.

Computers

During the 1980s the wellthumbed card catalogue gave way to the first of several computerised systems for cataloguing, loans and other previously time-consuming administrative functions.

From the 1990s the rapid development of digital technologies and the internet went hand in hand with a re-evaluation of the role of the library/resource centre in education.

There was a renewed interest in the teaching of research and information skills to equip students to deal with the 'information explosion' and develop into independent learners. Additional staff were needed to cope with these trends, so new appointments included a teacher librarian and a library technician.

Yangadlitya Resource Centre

Opened in May 2006, this centrally situated open-plan resource centre reflects the multiple facets of a modern school library. In keeping with its role as the 'hub of the school,' Yangadlitya provides resources in many different formats - print, audiovisual and digital - and services are enhanced by colourful displays, guest speakers, games, special occasions such as Book Week, and the encouragement of independent reading for pleasure.

We love hearing about the many incredible achievements and experiences of our old collegians after they leave Concordia. Here is some of the news we have received in recent months.



Robin Eckermann ('65) was recognised on Australia Day as a Member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia "for significant service to the telecommunications industry through roles in broadband infrastructure and network development, and to the energy supply sector".
