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A Heart of Passion

Human beings can be incredibly passionate – especially if it’s for a cause they believe in! Harnessing these passions and directing them in the right way is all part of living in a vibrant and harmonious society.

Our Concordia community is blessed to have many people who use their passions to make our school a great place for our students to grow and pursue their own passions. Whether they are parents, members of staff, Old Concordians, or students themselves, we are fortunate to have a culture at our College that is caring and supportive, striving for excellence, and seeking opportunities for personal growth. It makes Concordia a wonderful place to be!

While the meaning of the word ‘passion’ has changed over time, both its Latin and Greek roots actually connect it with *suffering* and *passivity*, which at first glance seems to be almost the opposite of how we see it today. In its original sense, *passion* is about enduring something that has come from outside of ourselves. While we often associate passions with a personal emotion from within, passions have classically been understood as deriving from an *external* force that works on us to bring about a passionate response. While this external force can be positive and lead to pleasant and joyful outcomes – such as the birth of a child bringing joy – the word *passion* is most closely associated with enduring something difficult and experiencing some level of suffering.

Perhaps you can see this reflected in your own life. Certain interests and hobbies we have might be important to us, but if we have to let them go for a time, or miss out on them due to something else, we can survive. But our *passions* distinguish themselves from mere hobbies because they have almost always involved an element of sacrifice or suffering. We are willing to endure things for our passions and, as we look further into these, we can sometimes see what the external force was, or is, that has played such a big role in making us care so passionately about certain things.

As we have ventured through the season of Lent at Concordia, we have closely examined and relived the events of Jesus’ betrayal and crucifixion, which have famously been called his *passion*. It was the extraordinary love that God had for all people that meant Jesus was willing to suffer and endure incredible anguish on the cross. It is because of this, as well as the remarkable hope of his resurrection, that Christians have passionately shared the message about God’s love in Jesus throughout the world, even if it has meant enduring their own suffering in order to do so.

The spiritual life of the school this term has allowed us to reflect on the passions that drive us and consider whether these are always good, or in balance. We have also been open to the work of the Holy Spirit to shape our hearts, so that our passions and desires come to resemble his.

We hope your own Easter journey has allowed you to reconnect with God and his love for you and that you are facing 2021 with a renewed sense of purpose and passion.

Welcome to the 2021 School Year

One of the real strengths of Concordia is the strong bond of community that has developed over many years. It is therefore good news that we are currently able to invite more of our community back to both campuses as we give thanks to God for his protection during these uncertain times.

Much has been happening both in the learning spaces and behind the scenes during the latter half of 2020 to position us for the year ahead – a year of change, opportunity and aspiration.

Firstly:

- Late in 2020 we shared the redevelopment of our St John’s Campus. Our appointed architects, Brown Falconer have prepared some extraordinary drawings that will soon begin coming to life

- We anticipate the build to be around 18 months in duration, commencing in the middle of this year, and in 2023 we will welcome you to a multi-level dynamic building designed for an amazing learning environment
- The Board has involved key stakeholders to advise us during the process, mindful of emerging learning environments and ensuring attention to detail in line with the future needs of our students, indeed the future needs of our entire College community
- Upon completion, our ELC will then include three-year-old children (we currently offer this learning experience from four years of age)
- Years 4, 5 and 6 will be triple streamed – meaning three classes per year level, all the while maintaining our sense of community, student connectedness and vibrant learning opportunities

- Other Primary School year levels will increase to triple streaming in the future on a carefully planned timeline
- A larger multipurpose hall for use by students, staff and parents/caregivers at the St John’s Campus is part of the redevelopment.

Further:

- The Board is in the process of active planning for a new gymnasium to serve the entire community.

Finally:

- We will invite you to join us on the journey of “*Building for the Future*”, including inviting you to consider a philanthropic donation during our annual giving. We cherish all your contributions be they prayerful, in person, or monetary (with all monetary donations being tax deductible) and thank you for your support.

The Board will keep you updated as progress continues.

Valedictory Service, Principal's Address

Tuesday, 20 October 2020

Chair of the Board, Dr Loyd Fyffe; College Board members; St John's Campus Principal, Mr Michael Paech; special guests, College staff, parents and carers and the members of the Year 12 Class of 2020.

Welcome to the Concordia College 2020 Valedictory Service. In many ways, this is the pinnacle of the school year at Concordia College.

I want to share some of my thoughts and reflections as we head towards the close of the 2020 school year.

It has been a year where, together, we have shared in the achievements of this Year 12 group, achievements that were reached by being open to new possibilities.

Despite constantly changing constraints, our Year 12 Class of 2020 grew at a pace we all thought might prove difficult and, in many

ways, we have all had to grow with them as we navigated our way through what were new and unexpected challenges.

Theologian and author C.S. Lewis once said, "Hardships often prepare ordinary people for an extraordinary destiny." We will all face adversity in our lives, the key is how we choose to respond. Congratulations to you on what has been a year of outstanding service to the Concordia community.

It has been wonderful to witness these leaders modelling incredible resilience and self-management under pressure. The determined

response of the student leadership was a wonderfully positive influence in the College through their enthusiasm, energy and servant hearts. Please acknowledge the wonderful service of our School Leaders.

The overwhelming emotion for most of you tonight will be joy. You have looked forward to this day and to this moment for a long time. You have finally completed your secondary education!

While I truly understand your emotion, I am also quite sure there will be a tinge of sadness, and that you will look back with fondness on the experiences you have had, the lessons you learned, and most importantly the friends you made here at Concordia.

Over the past 12 months you have shared emotional stories whilst on Retreat, some have confidently strutted their stuff on the dance floor at the Formal, others nervously headed to the Media Studio to make yet another video. You have laughed and screamed

during the Champions Cup and given rousing renditions of 'The Blind Man Sat By The Road' on the last day of each school term.

But, as if in the blink of an eye, ... your time at Concordia is about to become a memory.

Every year, as we farewell another cohort and acknowledge everything they contributed to the College, we also acknowledge what we lose as they leave.

Every year, a little part of us walks out the College gates with the departing class, because, in amongst the hard work, the frustration and the stress, there are always many more moments of joy, enlightenment, satisfaction, success, pride and appreciation.

In turn, we hope a small part of this community remains with you. In hard times, I hope the lessons learned at Concordia can be your solid ground, your North Star, a source of inspiration, a clear small voice in your hearts that will be with you always, comforting, directing, and reassuring you.

In conclusion, I would like to discuss the importance of commitment as you go forward into the next stage of your lives.

As you approach the last of your school days, the allure of freedom and individualism is strong. It is right for you to go out and explore. There is nothing wrong with freedom and possibilities and autonomy, but the vision that claims life is all rosy can often over-promise and under-deliver. Ironically, within this newfound freedom, one of the more liberating values is that of commitment.

It is important to recognise that you have experienced a life of discipline and commitment to a community during your time at the Concordia. You have belonged to something bigger than yourselves, and you have carried the obligations and expectations that come with that belonging.

You have built friendships through shared experiences. You were surrounded by people whose lives are marked by service and

commitment; in fact, your entire school experience was made possible by the commitment of those around you.

As you ponder your life commitments for the future, it is important to recognise the commitments made to you in the past.

Firstly, your parents and carers, whose love and commitment to you is one of the defining elements of your lives. Their commitment to you has been immense. They have put aside their own interests and opportunities, they have supported and encouraged and witnessed and wept. They are living examples of the fact that commitment is critical is to success. Please join me in publicly acknowledging and thanking your parents and carers for their commitment to you.

Your teachers, too, are defined by their commitment. Teaching at Concordia is a vocation – a calling. It is a calling that leads them to go above and beyond in guiding your education. Their commitment to seeing you grow and flourish and thrive in mind, body and spirit stems from their conviction that education matters, and that you matter. Please join with me in publicly thanking and acknowledging the staff at Concordia, whose commitment to your education has made your journey what it is, to this point and in the years to come.

I put to you that commitment is a cornerstone of a fulfilled life. The challenge for you is to work out how, who, and what, you will be committed to.

Your parents, your teachers and your experiences have equipped you with the knowledge and skills to make wise, considered, and compassionate choices in your commitments.

My hope and prayer is that, as you move on from Concordia, and as you find those people, and places and tasks to which you will commit, you will also remember the Lord Jesus. His words are a firm foundation on which we can build a good life. He provides us with a mission and purpose. His death and resurrection provide us with hope that endures, and commitment that will not disappoint.

The apostle Paul, nearing the end of his days and reflecting on the path he chose, wrote:

“I am not ashamed, because I know in whom I have believed, and I am convinced that he is able to guard what I have entrusted to him.”

The Lord Jesus can be trusted. Commit yourselves to him, stand firm in him and you will find a joyful and fulfilled life.

Learning Framework

At the start of 2020 Concordia College's new learning framework 'Unlocking Futures' was launched to the school community. This research-based and collaboratively developed framework outlines the key learning principles for the future of the College's teaching and learning programs, designed to support students in being able to thrive in a changing world.

Over the next four years, the methodical implementation of the framework will focus on four skill areas: Self-Management, Research, Social, and Thinking and Communication. The focus for 2021 will continue to be on the *foundational* skills of self-management that underpin the key learning principle of Resilience. In unpacking the key aspects of self-management, the *'Principles of Organisation'* were determined to be a crucial target area.

Learning Conversations

Learner Agency, or the ability of a learner to actively contribute to and take responsibility for their learning, is a key principle of our 'Unlocking Futures' learning framework. We want to further develop opportunities for students to have greater voice, choice and

ownership in their learning, essentially enabling our students to 'take the wheel' of their learning journey, whilst their teachers are sitting in the front passenger seat guiding them along the path they are choosing to follow.

A major strategy in achieving this at the Concordia Campus in 2021 will be the further implementation and improvement of 'Learning Conversations' for all Year 7 to 10 students that commenced last year as a replacement to the traditional 'parent-teacher' interviews. In preparation for their learning across the year, students will be provided with time, resources and support to set and monitor their progress towards learning powerful, emotionally compelling and motivational learning goals. During two 'learning conversations' across the year, students will have the

opportunity to show and discuss examples of their learning that demonstrate their achievement and progress towards their specific learning goals and aspirations. These will be discussed with their Home Class teacher and parents/caregivers.

Learner Profile Pilot Project

There is a major shift happening educationally, both globally and locally, regarding the 'measures' that schools and other educational institutions use to define 'success'. There is a significant shift and recognition in primary, secondary and tertiary education environments towards the view that that simply basing a student's 'academic' success on their subject grades alone, or 'what they know', is not desirable. It is both a very poor indicator of a student's true learning capabilities and progress and is not the most important factor in achieving success in tertiary education. The focus in the context for schools has therefore shifted from looking to report on *'what a student knows'* to instead considering how we can report on *'what a student can do with what they know'*.

Excitingly for the College, we have been recognised for our work in this space with the University of Melbourne in recent years. Subsequently, we have been invited, along with a selection of other schools, to participate in a 'Learner Profile' project. This project will re-shape how our College measures and defines success, achievement and progress in student learning. Ultimately, the outcomes of the project will help our students to gain a better understanding of their learning skills such as problem-solving, communication, self-management and creative and critical thinking – skills that are both essential for their futures, and a much better indicator of 'what they can do with what they know'.

Wellbeing Framework



Since forming a research partnership with Flinders University in 2019, Concordia College has been working to develop an innovative, evidence-based Wellbeing Framework.

Our new framework is supported by strong evidence that wellbeing programs provide numerous benefits. As well as boosting emotional regulation and social competence, they also improve academic performance and contribute to lifelong outcomes such as better mental health, greater productivity and enhanced life satisfaction. As a Christian College, we greatly value these gifts and actively seek to establish practices that allow people within our community to thrive.

Concordia's Wellbeing Framework is based around four pillars:

- + Spiritual Development (understanding the Christian faith, being inclusive and compassionate, service to others, and using values to guide decisions)
- + Self-awareness (understanding and managing thoughts and emotions)
- + Social Development (understanding, respecting and working with others)
- + Responsible Citizenship (understanding the challenges of growing independence, and making responsible, ethical decisions)

Our new Wellbeing Framework also embraces staff and families. It is designed to enable core wellbeing skills to become deeply familiar practices that benefit our whole community and encourage

healthy attitudes and behaviours to become central elements of daily life.

Across the wellbeing domains, many themes are already well developed within the College. This year, we will refine three priority areas by building sequenced programs that deepen understanding across year levels. The target areas for 2021 are:

- + Psychological skills to deal with challenges and stretching beyond the comfort zone, including perseverance and challenging unhealthy (self-critical) perfectionism
- + Friendships and bullying
- + Body image education

As these programs unfold, we look forward to sharing more information about what our students are learning, and opportunities for parallel parent education sessions.

This year, we are also excited to launch our new Graduate Transition Program. Young graduates serving on the Old Concordians' Association Committee have identified a need to assist school leavers as they emerge from our closely supported school environment into the relatively unstructured and unknown world of adulthood. In response, our new program provides valuable social support and education for this transition period.

Old Concordians' Association President **Matt Bruening** (2016) had this to say about the development of the program: *'We are so proud of how the program has been developed in collaboration with current and past*

Concordia students. We let their voices be heard and guide the programs focus. Student wellbeing has always been a strong emphasis at Concordia, but the transition between Year 12 and life outside of school is rarely focussed on. By providing graduating students with the opportunity to explore their concerns and anxieties surrounding this transition in a safe and collaborative environment, we hope to make it that bit easier for them.'

The program launched on Thursday, 25 February at a workshop for the Class of 2020. A range of speakers (business, university and recent graduate peers) shared tips for maintaining and building social networks, accessing support, understanding financial decisions and adjusting to independent, young adult life.

We look forward to the growth of this program in the future as the Old Concordians' Association is committed to strengthening the friendships and support networks begun while studying at Concordia. Speaking about the committee's future hopes for the program, Matt Bruening said, *'The program session this year is a launchpad for an expanded and fully-realised program in future years. We aim to build "lifelong connections" between graduates within the Old Concordians' Association, and we really hope this program can further strengthen the bonds students have developed during their school life.'*

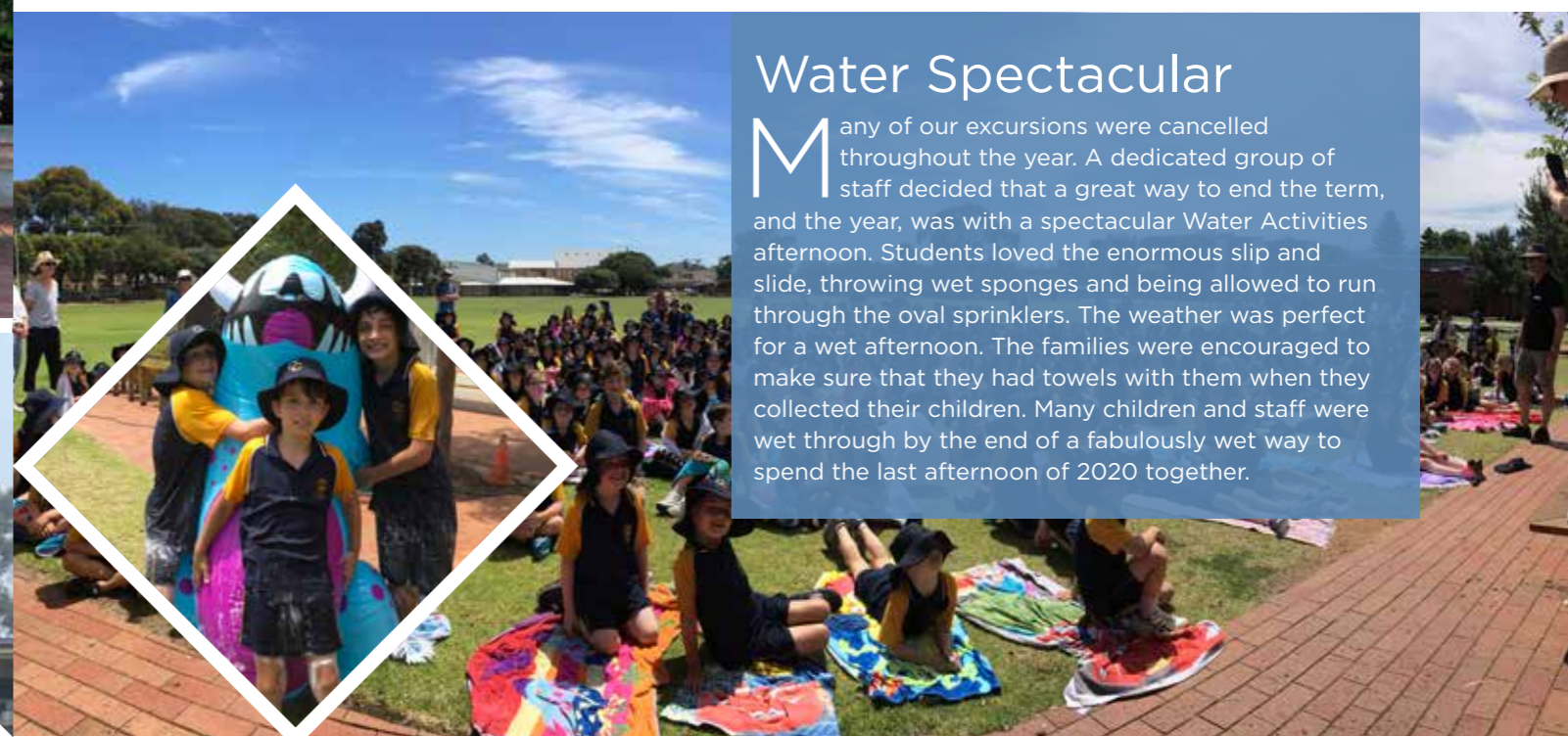
Port Hughes Camp

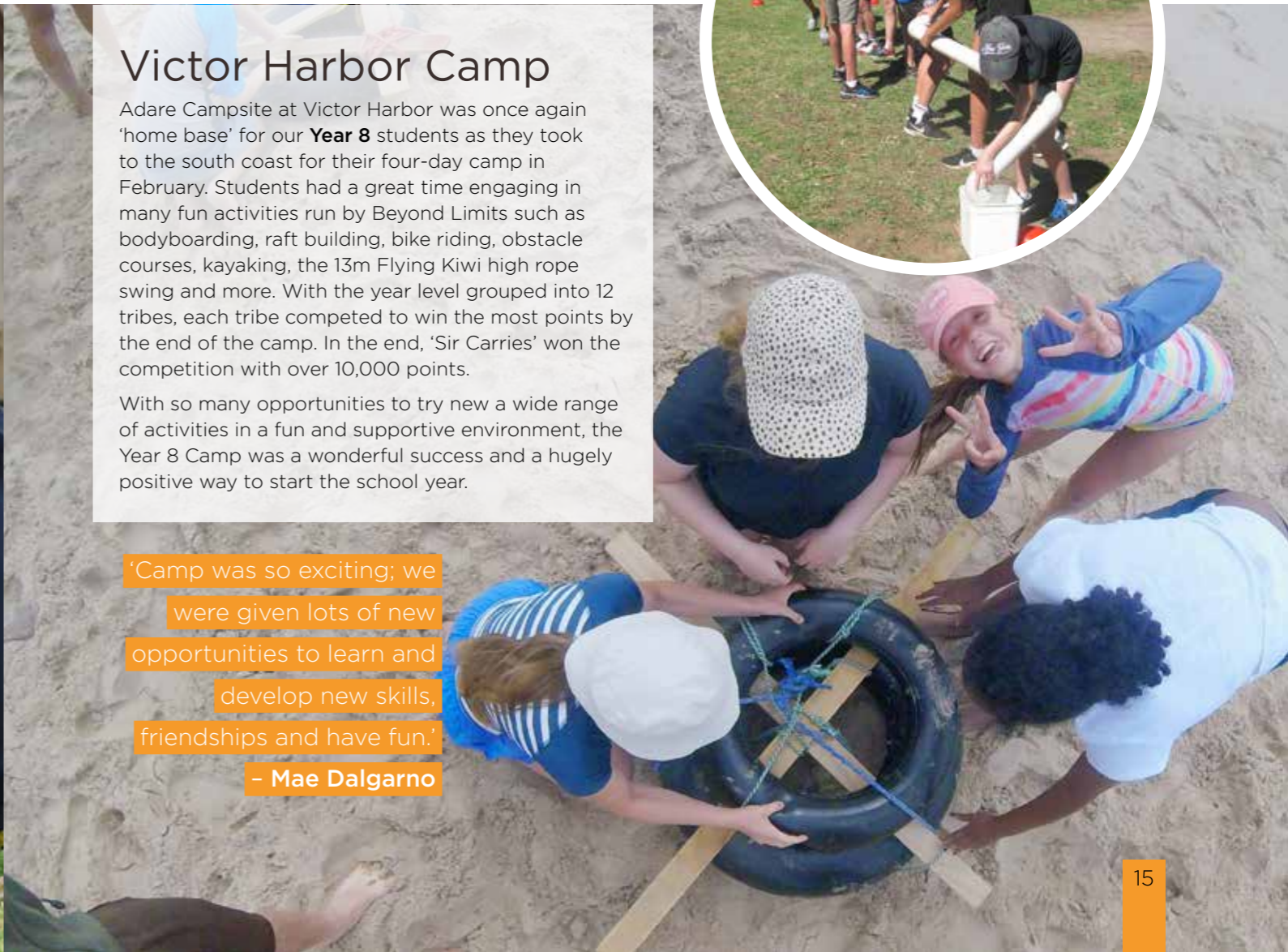
Victor Harbor Camp

What motivates/inspires you in your role?

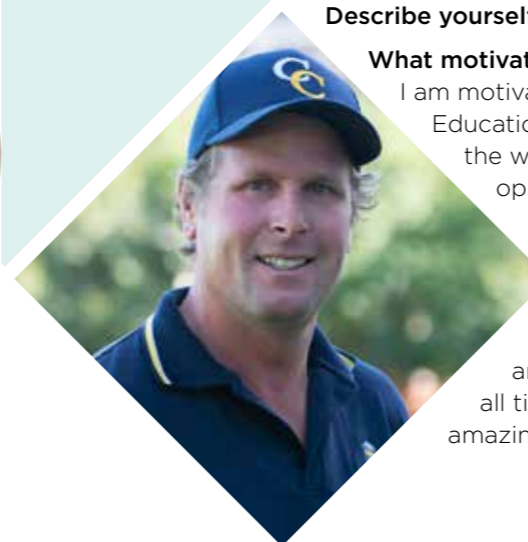

The walkway now greets students, visitors and friends of the College with a vibrant mural depicting elements of life at Concordia.

This is what Dave had to say about the mural:

'This mural contains a few different elements, the ribbon/banner contains the school motto and is drawn from the cover illustration on the first Brown and Gold magazine in 1924. Behind this, the wall is covered with colourful patterning, based on doodles in a 1971 school diary and drawings in the margins of workbooks.'

I was thinking about the history of the College as the things that are universal experiences but not necessarily a part of a curriculum, shared experiences that students had from 130 years ago up to now. This work is creating a connection and drawing a line between the shared lived experiences of students at the College throughout its history. Students have always drawn doodles and experimented with materials available – pens, highlighters and graph paper – to create drawings that feel very specific to the high school environment.'

Q&A with Nick Kriewaldt (1982)

Old Concordian Nick Kriewaldt (1982) was the third generation of Kriewaldt boys to attend Concordia, and his son William is generation four!

What values are instilled in your family from your education at Concordia College?

What is your fondest (or funniest) memory of being at Concordia College?

I was very sad when my time at Concordia came to an end because to me this school was like a close-knit family. It was hard saying goodbye to a school that had become such a big part of my life.

What is different today at Concordia from when you were at school?

The main differences are the facilities, especially the impressive new buildings. When I attended Chapel at Concordia, this was held in The Suaviter. We had a small gym which is now the Drama Centre, and many of the buildings have been either upgraded or rebuilt. Concordia has amazing facilities and my son, William, is so fortunate that he will be able to experience them. One thing that has not changed, for which I am extremely grateful, is the courtyard area, which I believe is the nicest feature of Concordia, and is perhaps one of the prettiest surroundings and locations of any school in Australia.

Another aspect that has changed (for the better) is the school uniforms, both in design and use of colour. Back in my day brown and gold were the predominant colours, but thankfully they have added a lot of blue to the uniform. I think that the Concordia uniform looks very smart.

When choosing a school for our children the opportunity for a good education on a foundation of Christian values was important: Firm in Principle, Gentle in Manner. It has provided them with a good foundation.
