# Values and Culture at Concordia

This year, our entire school has worked on a document that outlines the kind of culture and environment that we want to characterise the Concordia community. The outcome has been some beautifully simple explanations of the types of behaviour we want to see, exhibit and experience in our school. These range from personal relationships, to communication, to personal excellence, and also to the way we show care and compassion for one another.

While we will refer to this environment as our 'culture', as a Christian school we understand that this is rooted in an even deeper reality, the kingdom of God. Jesus came as a king whom no one expected and no one recognised. However, if you pay close attention to what Jesus said, you will notice that he regularly spoke about the kingdom of God. He was a king who would rule in a different kind of way. 'The Kingdom of God' was never referring to a geographical location, but rather a spiritual reality and, more concretely, a particular way of living under God's rule. By faith, we become part of Jesus' kingdom and learn to live a life shaped by him.

Jesus was the living example of God's kingdom, or God's way of being. He was gracious and forgiving. He always

spoke the truth. He used his life to give glory to God and to be a blessing to others. He made sacrifices for the sake of others and used his power to serve those in need. He put his trust in God, not himself, and taught his disciples how to do the same by giving them The Lord's Prayer. Jesus calls all of us out of a culture where we make ourselves king (or money, or success, or something else) and into a life where he rules with grace, justice and kindness.

As we seek to follow the Values and Culture document, we trust that God's kingdom will be evident here in our school. There will certainly be times when we are confronted by our own failures to live up to these ideals, which is when we will need to hear God's words of grace and forgiveness. This is a key part of our culture! But

we will also be encouraged to live out these values with each other as a way of glorifying God and blessing the people in our community.

Paul's words to the first Christians in Rome are a guiding light to us as we seek God's strength to live in his kingdom:

Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in love. Honour one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervour, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality. Romans 12:9-13

## The Future of International Students

At the beginning of 2020, Concordia's immediate priorities were:

- to prepare for registration allowing the College to continue enrolling students from overseas, a critical component for an IB World School, and
- implementing identified future priorities from the revised international program review conducted by consultant Mark Porter and the Concordia College Board.

With the emergence of a pandemic that has seen Australia's borders closed to international travel, and no imminent date for a return to such travel, it became apparent that Concordia needed to reflect on the College's international program and its priorities as we wait for the new 'normal'.

Initially, with international borders closed and countries scrambling to curb the pandemic, families in the Asia Pacific region were unable, and understandably unwilling, to send their children abroad to study. However, by mid-2021 confidence had grown and the USA, the UK and Canada opened their borders, enrolling students prepared to study abroad, many of whom typically would have come to Australia had our borders been open.

Over the past 18 months South Australia's handling of the pandemic has placed it as a front runner in maintaining public health and safety, resulting in Adelaide being recognised as a safe educational destination for future offshore school-aged students. Combined with Adelaide being

ranked the third most livable city in the world and Australia's most honest city, Concordia now promotes this recognition as its 'point of difference' to families when considering a study destination for their children.



Whilst we wait for the Australian government to unveil its plan to reopen our international borders, Concordia has not sat idle. Priorities within the international program have been elevated with the view of strengthening the College's global profile. To ensure future student diversity, a representative in Vietnam has been engaged to

promote Concordia to families and demonstrate our commitment beyond just student enrolment. In Taipei, sister school relationships are being forged that will see Years 7 to 10 students collaboratively studying online, sharing language, culture and most importantly diversity of learning. Teachers will have unique professional development opportunities to experience with peers from other countries.

So, what of Concordia's current overseas students? With other schools needing to provide additional support to their students who are unable to return to their home countries and suffering long-term separation from family and friends, Concordia students feel blessed as they live with their parents or older siblings, reducing their anxiety and maintaining focus on their learning. These students have embraced their learning at Concordia and their interactions with the wider South Australian community.

## World Oceans Day

Immersed in all things oceanic, groups of primary and secondary students enjoyed interactive exhibits in the Resource Centres at both campuses to mark World Oceans Day on Tuesday 8 June. A range of artefacts were on display for students to observe and touch, including whale vertebrae, a Port Jackson shark, shells, a shark jaw, whale baleen and a dolphin skeleton.

Experienced scuba diver and Concordia teacher Mr Brendan Toohey brought his diving equipment into the Concordia Campus Resource Centre, with some students keen to try on the buoyancy compensator device and feel the weight of the oxygen tanks.

We were excited to have Carl and Jess from Experiencing Marine Sanctuaries visit and run virtual dives, providing virtual reality (VR) headsets to enable students to observe cuttlefish, squid, sea lions and leafy sea dragons in their natural habitat. The younger students could barely contain their excitement and squealed with delight at seeing these creatures up close – an amazing opportunity to observe in a life-like

way some of the incredible marine life South Australia has to offer.

Throughout the day's events, students not only learned more about the ocean habitat so many creatures call home; importantly, they also learned about the shared responsibility we have, as stewards of God's creation, to conserve the world's oceans for future generations.



## Concordia's Lively Library

# Unlocking Futures



## IB and SACE Programmes

As a College, we believe strongly that we have a moral obligation to position and equip our students with specific capabilities and skills that they will need in order to thrive and flourish, both now and in the future.

Our **Unlocking Futures** learning framework is the new narrative for learning in our College. Its purpose is to embed key learning principles into our learning and teaching programs and practices, to develop strongly independent, inquisitive, resilient, creative and connected learners.

The educational philosophy and key principles that underpin Unlocking Futures align strongly with both the International Baccalaureate (IB) mission statement and associated programmes and the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). At the heart of our Primary Years Programme (PYP), Middle Years Programme (MYP) and SACE programme is a focus on the development of the 'whole child'. This includes building their skills and capabilities in key areas that will enable students to grow into inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who are able to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect. Through these programs we are aiming to achieve the goal of Unlocking Futures: "giving our students the ability to live their best life throughout the rest of the 21st century".

Below are examples and features to illustrate how our PYP, MYP and SACE programmes are orientated based on Unlocking Futures.

### In the PYP...

#### Units of Inquiry

These units are the core to the Primary Years Programme. Incorporating the Principle of Inquiry, students are engaged in learning experiences that involve wondering and questioning, leading to constructing new knowledge that can be transferred to a variety of contexts and subject areas through the use of research and thinking skills. Teachers plan these units with the purpose and intent of engaging students in a process of inquiry and discovery.

#### Student Led Conferences

This integral reporting opportunity allows students to share the growth and development of their learning with their parents. They plan and present through various learning activities that highlight their goals and areas for growth. This showcases the students' skills and dispositions within the Resilience Principle outlined in Unlocking Futures as they reflect on their learning and share the strategies that they plan to implement to meet their learning goals.

#### Year 6 Exhibition

The culminating unit of the PYP embeds all aspects of Unlocking Futures. Students have voice, choice and ownership in their learning through learner agency while fostering curiosity and creativity through the inquiry process. They develop resilience through setting

goals, persevering amidst challenges, managing their time and resources, and reflecting on their learning methods. Innovation through critical and creative thinking is at the forefront as students plan to take action and consider various perspectives of their global issue. Students connect with their peers and the community in communicating their knowledge. They also appreciate and understand different perspectives throughout the process.

### In the MYP...

#### Cross-disciplinary events

City Week (Year 9); Connected Unley (Year 8); Civics Week/Canberra trip (Year 7). All of these require an element of learner agency, connection and resilience as students work in diverse groups, are put outside of their comfort zones and build the capacity to solve problems for the wider community. These events also focus on innovation, asking students to consider new perspectives, show initiative and engage in critical and creative thinking.

#### Year 9 Physical Education - Sport Education in Physical Education Program (SEPEP) Unit

Learner agency is developed through the driving of the program and running the various elements. Connection is built through community building to run successful events and take ownership of these themselves.



#### Year 10 Personal Project

The Personal Project has a direct focus on the Approaches To Learning skills required for lifelong learning. It provides a checkpoint for students to explore their strengths, areas of growth and how they learn best before they move into the SACE.

### In the SACE...

#### Year 11 Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions

Students are involved in inventing and designing an entrepreneurial product that meets an industry need or solves a problem. They apply critical problem-solving skills and incorporate technologies to design solutions and address problems and challenges. This subject incorporates the transfer of interdisciplinary skills and knowledge and enables the students to connect with industry experts through the design process.

#### Research Project

The Research Project epitomises the key principles of Unlocking Futures. As students engage in a research project of personal interest, they actively develop learner agency as they choose their topic, tailor the

topic to their interests and take ownership of how the process of research unfolds. The premise of the Research Project is to develop curiosity and wonder as students generate questions and solve problems through an inquiry model. The Research Project also teaches students to develop resilience. Through ongoing reflection, students learn to be adaptable and open-minded as they work through the challenges presented to them. Many students develop connections with outside agencies through their research process and find themselves understanding their chosen topic from multiple perspectives to develop innovative solutions.

#### Out & about in the community

The alignment of Unlocking Futures with SACE's strategic goal of Thrive - which seeks to develop elements of agency, connectedness, deep understanding and transfer of learning - encourages students to think innovatively and connect meaningfully with their local and wider communities. Examples across various SACE subjects include:

- Food and Hospitality students catering for school functions
- Legal Studies students visiting the local courts and parliament
- English students meeting with authors during Writers' Week
- Geography students developing innovative solutions to a geographical issue through fieldwork
- Maths students determining the best path for a roller coaster
- Drama and Music students entertaining a variety of audiences through various productions

... and the list goes on!



Children also participated in an interactive storytelling session on Indigenous Literacy Day.
- The Receptions shared in an Assembly their drawings inspired by the picture book ‘Sorry, Sorry’ by Anne Kerr.
- All students and staff contributed to a collaborative artwork called ‘Stepping Out – Taking Action’ comprising many wonderfully decorated paper cutout-feet.
- Students engaged with a focus on reconciliation in devotion times.

These learning experiences were a great reminder of the truth of this year’s Reconciliation Week theme: ‘More than a word. Reconciliation takes action.’

Later, the Year 5s enjoyed a visit from Bishop Chris, National Aboriginal Bishop from the Anglican Diocese of

Adelaide, who shared personal stories about the Stolen Generations. They also had a classroom visit from Uncle Tamaru and his pet bearded dragon, Ferris, prior to Uncle Tamaru guiding them on a fascinating and eye-opening excursion to the Migration Museum, River Torrens Precinct and Piltawodli.

IMBALA comprises a father and his four children who provide a glimpse into 60,000 years of Indigenous culture through stories involving dance and music. Everyone in attendance enjoyed and appreciated the presentation, feeling a strong commitment to this year's call for Reconciliation – "More than a word. Reconciliation takes action."



## Lily wins national Rostrum Voice of Youth Competition

Throughout Term 2, Year 9 student Lily participated in the Rostrum Voice of Youth speaking competition, now in its 46th year, with 800 students participating in 2021. Beginning with the Junior heat, where she presented a prepared six-minute speech as well as a three-minute short notice speech with just 15 minutes of preparation time, Lily was successful and progressed to the semi-finals.

Her semi-final speeches earned her a place in the State Finals in the House of Assembly at Parliament House, which she won. Five adjudicators conferred and awarded Lily first place in the Junior category for her speeches delivered at the SA / NT Zone Final, announcing the results via Zoom. Concordia congratulates Lily on this truly outstanding achievement.



## da Vinci Decathlon

A Year 7 team and a Year 9 team represented Concordia in the 2021 da Vinci Decathlon, a day of academic competition across 10 disciplines, centred around problem-solving, teamwork, creativity and higher order thinking skills. Competing amongst 22 schools and 14 schools respectively, the Year 7s and Year 9s put in a fantastic effort. The standard of the competition is incredibly high, and therefore placing in the top five in

any of the categories is a significant achievement. Results of note for Concordia included the Year 7 team placing fourth in Art and Poetry, third in Ideation and second in Engineering, and our Year 9 team placing first in the state in Art and Poetry. We commend the students for these excellent results and for representing the College so well in this challenging competition.

## Year 7 Museum Exhibits

Three of our Year 7 classes hosted a vibrant Ancient Civilisations Museum Day in June, featuring exhibits they had created to share their historical findings from ancient Greece, Egypt and China. With pyramid models, hieroglyphics etched in clay, architectural models, boats, food, depictions of ancient fashion, interactive digital displays and more on display, there was so much amazing work to see!

## Dramatic Learning Through Industry Connections

Connections to professionals within the Arts industry presented invaluable learning opportunities for our senior Drama students in recent months. In May, the Year 11 students were fortunate to get a sneak peek behind the scenes at the Adelaide Festival Scenery Workshop, where many sets for professional productions were built from 1979 until the Workshop closed on 31 July 2021. Year 11 student Nicole Schubert reflected, *'This was an extraordinary experience and combined two of my favourite subjects on a huge scale. As a student of both Drama and Design, Technology and Engineering, seeing the workshop was an incredible opportunity to consider future pathways for myself. ... We were shown the art behind the magic of theatre and, really, it made theatre all the more magical for me.'*

The Year 12s benefitted from a workshop with State Theatre Company actor Rory Walker who provided helpful insights into realism and how to portray true-to-life emotions on stage.

While studying Commedia dell'arte – an Italian renaissance style of theatre famously known in the dramatic realm as the birthplace of comedy – Year 11 students attended a full-day intensive masterclass with Commedia expert practitioner Corrina De Niro. With a PhD in the style of Commedia and experience working with students Australia-wide, including at NIDA, it was a privilege to have Corrina impart her knowledge to our students while they worked towards their performance of *The Accidental Death of an Anarchist*.

## Learning to Save Lives

Groups of Senior School students have engaged in programs designed to equip them with important knowledge and skills to help save lives. The annual Road Awareness Program delivered by the Metropolitan Fire Service was once again an impactful occasion for our Year 11s. They learned about the importance of making safe and responsible choices on the roads and always 'looking after our mates'. Then, following their mid-year exams, a record 72 Year 11s opted to complete a full-day first aid course with St John Ambulance, gaining hands-on skills and extending their understanding of workplace safety. Finally, a group of 40 Year 10 and 11 students took part in a unique program called P.A.R.T.Y. (Prevent



Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth) facilitated by a paramedic and nurses from the Royal Adelaide Hospital. As well as gaining a sobering insight into serious real-world outcomes of risky behaviours, the session provided a great introduction and exposure to health expertise for those considering a career in emergency medicine.

## National Titration Competition

A unique chemistry challenge – the National Titration Competition – saw two teams of three Year 12 Chemistry students aiming to find the mass of samples of crystalline oxalic acid to 1,000th of a gram using the technique of chemical titration. For two and a half hours students individually carried out experimental procedures in a team setting, needing to achieve less than a 2% combined team error to progress to the State Final. Both teams were successful and are

commended on reaching the State Final. A particular congratulations went to Jasmine who achieved an unbelievable accuracy with only a 0.01% error – an extraordinary result!

LATER: Concordia College qualified for the National Finals. Although, not amongst the top teams, the Concordia team performed very well with Tom being awarded a gold pin for an overall error of only 0.16%. Kern and Tait gained silver awards.



## Australian Brain Bee Challenge



What is the role of a suprachiasmatic nucleus? Approximately what percentage of neurons are devoted to visual processing? Where would you find three ossicles called the malleus, incus and stapes? These are the sorts of mind-stretching questions faced by Year 10 students in the Australian Brain Bee Challenge, a competition to learn about the brain, its functions,

neuroscience research and related careers. The program also dispels myths about neurological and mental illnesses. Almost 3,000 students across Australia and New Zealand participated in Round 1 and we were excited to have two of our Year 10 students, Jackson and Nicholas, earn a place in the State Finals – an incredible effort!

# Senior School

## Personal Project Exhibitions

In the final year of the Middle Years Programme, our Year 10 students explore an area of personal interest over an extended period. The Personal Project provides them with the opportunity to consolidate their learning and develop important skills they will need in their learning and life beyond the classroom.


There are three elements that students complete in the Personal Project:

- a **product or outcome**, which is evidence of their results - what they aim to create or achieve.
- the **process journal**, which is their ideas, criteria, developments, challenges, plans, research, possible solutions and progress reports.
- a **report**, which is an account of their project and its impact. This includes evidence from their process journal which documents any development and achievement throughout the project.

The Personal Project allows students to formally show their approaches to

learning skills for self-management, research, communication, critical and creative thinking, and collaboration. All of these skills lay the foundations for their learning and allow them to be able to reflect on their strengths and areas of growth before they move into the rigours of the final years of their schooling at Concordia. As the personal interest takes shape, a broad range of personal projects are developed, as unique as the students who made them. It is always amazing to see the diversity and impact of each cohort's personal projects.

## Young Women in STEM

The Young Women in STEM event at the University of Adelaide empowers girls in Year 10 to experience university life and learn about a number of courses, including Computer Science, Engineering and Animal Science. On the day, the girls programmed robots for battle, built an electric motor, learned about animal training and participated in a combustion rocket competition. Maddie and Ruby shared the following reflections.

the theoretical work put into action, which opened my eyes to how applicable STEM is to the world. It helped me to realise there is a wide variety of careers in the STEM area, and I was able to gain more understanding of what university life is like.' - Maddie

## University of Newcastle Science and Engineering Challenge Day

A team of 18 Year 10 STEM students represented Concordia at the University of Newcastle Science and Engineering Challenge Day, competing against seven other schools from across Adelaide. Critical thinking and problem-solving skills were needed as students worked to create innovative solutions to real-world problems. Tasks included cost-effective energy production and supply, applying basic robotic principles to maneuver objects, designing and creating a hovercraft to be controlled over an obstacle course and designing a high-performance hydro-electric generator, amongst others. Our students represented the College to a high standard and engaged extremely well in the challenges, developing outstanding solutions. Collectively, our team placed second overall - an excellent result!

## Music in the Primary School

Music in our Primary School continues to flourish. Some activities have once again this year been affected by COVID-19 restrictions; however, the students continue to rehearse with enthusiasm.

Concert Band meets each Friday morning and is conducted by Mr Mat Noble from the secondary campus, assisted by Mrs Lugg. ## Building our Community – a history of St John's Campus ELC – Year 6

### 1952

The founders of St John's Lutheran School had the passion, vision and belief to plan for the first stand-alone Lutheran Primary School in Adelaide and began a fund to help establish the school.

The original school building was completed mainly by volunteers from the St John's Lutheran Church Unley congregation with a meagre budget of about £3000. It consisted of a steel frame with walls of compressed straw coated with cement. St John's Lutheran School was dedicated on **10 February 1952**; nineteen pupils were enrolled and started on 12 February with Miss T (Dora) Doecke as the teacher.

The school's enrolments had grown to 200 and a new school building was opened by Dr C Hoopmann, Rev N Jaensch and Rev Dr E Leske.




### 1996


# Walk My Way

## Generations of Concordians

### Q&A with Barbara Bishop

1952 St John's Lutheran School Foundation student

Barbara was living in Payneham and attended Payneham Public School until 1952, the year that St John's Lutheran School in Highgate was opened. Her first day was 12 February and she was in Year 6, and one of 19 students in a classroom with ages ranging from 5-12 years old.

Barbara's father, Rev Christopher A. Zweck was keen for her, the youngest of his four children, to attend St John's as soon as it opened. Barbara's older sisters and brother were all students at Concordia College at the time.

### What are your memories of the early years at St John's?

The first teacher at St John's, Miss Theodora Doecke, was an Old Concordian from the Class of 1930. I remember Miss Doecke as being very strict, with no joking around allowed, but she probably had to be strict as the job of teaching such an array of students who were all new to the school would have been a tough assignment.

I remember catching the tram from Paradise to Fullarton to attend school. I also remembers the brand new school desks and what a contrast they were to the very old ones I was used to at my last school. I remember the time when the students were playing 'rounders' in the yard,

someone accidentally knocked out Miss Doecke's false teeth and all of the boys laughed.

February 1952 also saw the death of King George VI, and I remember feeling very sad, as we had all loved the king and had to change from singing "God Save the King" to "God Save the Queen" in the mornings at school. It was quite an adjustment.

### What values are instilled in your family from your education at St John's Lutheran School?

I am very grateful that at St John's I was constantly reminded that I am saved by faith and that Jesus has already provided the way to salvation for us all. In contrast to my last school, faith was an everyday conversation at St John's, and not something that just happened on Sundays when you went to church.

I have seen my own children and grandchildren attend St John's and have kept an eye on the changes to the growing school over the years. Attending the Christmas Concert was always a highlight, as well as other events put on by the school. I have seen the blessings of God unfolding in my life, including finding a job when I needed one so my children could go to Concordia.

### Q&A with Samuel Leske (Year 11)



#### What are the links in your family history and generational years at Concordia College?

My family includes four generations of Old Concordians:

#### What values are instilled in your family from your education at Concordia College?

The most important value instilled in our family at Concordia has been the growth of our Christian faith. As well as daily Chapel services and having faith at the centre of our education, my father (Robin) was confirmed with his class, and both my grandfather (Elmore) and great-grandfather (Gotthold) were trained as pastors at Concordia.

Being a family at Concordia has been a theme for us. As well as the generations of family, my grandparents met at Concordia.

Concordia has taught us well the very values in her motto, "Fortiter in rē, suāviter in modō (Boldly as far as the matter itself is concerned, but gently in the way going about it)." That is, what we do is important, but not before doing it with a kind heart to others.

#### What is your fondest (or funniest) memory of being at Concordia College?

When he was headmaster, my grandfather lived on campus with his family, including my father who was the last baby to do so. This led to some unusual circumstances. One day, my grandmother could not find one of her young children anywhere. She had frantically searched everywhere, up and down the surrounding streets, with him nowhere to be found. At the end of her tether, she interrupted the class my grandfather was teaching. She immediately sensed something was up by the amused faces of the students. Hearing his father's voice, the young child had wandered in earlier, where his father had picked him up and put him under his desk to minimise disruption.

My grandfather remembers most fondly his send-off for when he departed being headmaster to accept a position overseas. The whole school, dressed in full uniform, went to Outer Harbour to see him and his family off and farewell the ship by singing the Concordia hymn and throwing streamers.

#### Why Concordia college for generations?

Our connection with Concordia started with my great-grandfather, who attended the Lutheran Seminary at Concordia. My grandfather always intended to follow in his father's footsteps, unlike his brother, who wanted to be a musician. On arrival at Concordia, the boys aged 11 and 13 met with their headmaster, Dr Hamann, whereupon it was decided that both boys would be pastors. Many of their family members in subsequent generations have since followed the tradition at Concordia.

#### What is different today at Concordia from when you were at school?

Concordia has always been very dear to us, and we have seen many changes. This is especially so for my grandfather, having first seen the place over 80 years ago. As headmaster he built the state-of-the-art science building, now seen razed 50 years later to build another state-of-the-art science building in my time. A great difference in Concordia is the growth in facilities and students. When my great-grandfather started at Concordia in 1905, the year that Concordia moved to Adelaide, there were only 26 students, one professor, and the original buildings from Malvern College.
