### Off to a Great Start

The transition from home to the ELC or school, or from one year level to the next, is a significant step for both children and families. Children may struggle with new routines and families themselves may have concerns about their child's ability to cope with the demands of their new environment.

Forming a strong partnership between the ELC/Primary School and a child's family helps to establish an understanding between educators and families about expectations and attitudes and provides a foundation for building on the knowledge of both parents and educators.

We know the importance of educators forming close relationships with children and their families so that we can understand their individual needs and learn how best to support them.

Getting to Know You Chats (ELC to Year 5) take place in Term 1 with the intention of reciprocal information sharing. During the chats, teachers hear perspectives offered by parents, children's needs are recognised, their early successes are acknowledged, and plans are made.

This year most chats are taking place through Microsoft Teams and so far, they have been overwhelmingly positive and productive.

Continuing open communication between teachers and parents allows all parties to build on this great start and work together to support improved outcomes for children.

They have their whole life ahead of them and being brave to learn, explore, try things and to work hard is the key in my opinion.

### **Primary School Leader – Sue Drogemuller**

- Manages the daily operations of the school. Also responsible for student behaviour management and wellbeing.

### **ELC Director – Kate Wood**

- Has the responsibility of maintaining the coordination of the education outcomes and operation of the ELC in accordance with the Education and Care Services National Law and Regulations whilst ensuring the positive transition from the early years into the early years of the school.
- Also responsible for the daily operational management of the Early Learning Centre.

### **Primary School Learning Leader – Rachel Muldoon**

- Leads in the strategic development and operation of all teaching and learning programs.
- Leads the teacher professional development program for ELC and Primary School.

### **Primary School Coordinator – Nicolette McClure**

- Supports the Primary School Leader to help ensure the smooth running of all daily operations across the campus. The Primary School Coordinator will also begin developing structures and systems to support the enrolment increases from ELC to Year 6, commencing in 2023.

### **Primary School Mentor – Graham Buxton**

## Immunisations Information for Year 8 Parents/Guardians

The 2022 SA School Immunisation Program will be offered at your school by **Eastern Health Authority (EHA)** on Tuesday 15 March 2022.

All Year 8 students will be offered:

- 2 doses of the human papillomavirus vaccine, Gardasil®9 at 2 separate visits.
- 1 dose of the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine, Boostrix®

Immunisation consent packs were sent home with all Year 8 students at the beginning of the year. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack from your child, please ask at the SSO. All parents / legal guardians are to complete, sign and return the Consent Cards, even if you do not consent for the student to be vaccinated at school. Students aged 16 years and above can consent for themselves.

**SA Health advises that students who may be receiving a COVID-19 vaccine have a minimum interval of 7 days between receiving a COVID-19 vaccine and any other vaccine. Therefore, if your child has either had a COVID-19 vaccination OR is booked for a COVID-19 vaccination 7 days prior or 7 days after our school visit, school immunisations will need to be rescheduled. Please contact EHA on 8132 3600 to discuss.**

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already started the above program with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed
- Your child is due to have or has had a COVID-19 vaccine in the last/next 7 days.

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

**Remember: it is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition, on the day of immunisation or prior. A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.**

**School Immunisation Program records may be required for future employment or travel.**

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## **Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday**

Last week was the beginning of the Christian season of Lent. Lent is a 40-day time of reflection, repentance and preparation for Easter. At Concordia this week, we commemorated two events that signify that Lent has started - Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday. Students were able to walk past the various stations and reflect on the significance of the day, including drawing an ash cross on their foreheads in the traditional manner. This was special, as it was the first time, we had been able to have a Chapel time together this year. The Lenten themes of Jesus' sacrifice, suffering and death will be the focus of our Chapels (online or otherwise) for the remainder of the term.
