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From the Director of Digital Resources

We live in a world immersed in cyber activity, the vast majority of which is informative for learning, helpful or good for relationships. The College, for example, has almost 1600 active network users on site daily, stores 3.8 million files in OneDrive, and in any one day can process more than 22,000 emails. We also are very aware that some of the activity can be intrusive, malicious and dangerous.

For this reason, the College invests in an industry-standard firewall that constantly searches and learns from the internet what to monitor and block and what to accept as safe. College sites use the HTTPS security protocol and we use Microsoft cloud to enhance our online security. We have separated VLANS for staff and students, lock down most administrative rights on student devices and protect the ELC and Primary and Middle and Senior systems with dual fibre pathways.

While the above has served as well, our next steps are to invest in real-time offsite backup and redundancy, extend Microsoft Defender for Endpoint to all devices and add multi-factor authentication to logins. These come at cost and take time, but the benefit is an enhanced, secure online experience for our students and staff.

Hi, I'm Mark and I am the College Chaplain here at Concordia.

What is a chaplain and what do they do?

The first thing to say is, I am not a Pastor – everyone asks, so I'm just putting that to rest. I do however work with two Pastors, and most wonderful ones at that! This is a new role here at Concordia, put in place to support the College Pastor (Ps Dale) and to work with the Pastor (Ps

Andrew) of our partner church, St John's Lutheran Church, Unley. It is a varied role, but the most fundamental part is to support and encourage staff, students and parents in the involvement and understanding of the spiritual life and Christian culture of the school. The role includes working across the College, but for me, most of this work occurs in the ELC and Primary School (Ps Dale works more at the Middle and Senior School). I lead and coordinate the Chapel and devotion life for the ELC and Primary School, and I also assist teachers to be resourced to lead their classes in spiritually focused activities. This year has certainly presented several challenges in that space, firstly not having a large indoor area while the building program is happening and then the COVID-19 curveballs which have meant we haven't been able to meet as a school. Pre-recorded Chapels have been the order of the day!

In my role as Chaplain I also support new staff coming into the school by helping them formally through professional development, but also informally in helping them understand how a Lutheran school ticks, i.e. what we value and how we live together in community. The other significant part of this role includes coordinating service-learning projects across the College. This involves helping students understand the importance of service and compassion to one another, but also extending that to supporting people in need through various local and global agencies such as Australian Lutheran World Service. Some of these projects are campusspecific and others are spread across the College.

As I arrived at the edge of the oval, I observed a PE class in the distance. They were taking turns at kicking a soccer ball at a set of goals. Nothing unusual about that, but as I approached the group, I noticed that the person preparing to shoot was wearing a blindfold and a guest of the teacher was tapping the three sides of the goals with a stick to make a sound that signalled

the direction to shoot. Stopping to watch, I asked the teacher what was happening. He explained to me that he has a student in the class with a vision impairment. So, he had arranged a visit from Andrew Whisson of SA School and Services for Vision Impaired to set up a simulation which allowed all the students to experience what it is like to have a vision impairment and to therefore build empathy and understanding. When the lesson finished, the group remained for a period chatting with the staff about what they had experienced. There was no rush to race off to lunch even though the bell had gone minutes before. They were clearly engrossed in the learning.

Taking the time and effort to arrange such an activity is an example of a Concordia teacher going the extra mile for students to enrich learning and to bring it into reality. Extraordinary!

A highlight of Trent's visit included viewing clothing items made of kangaroo, and learning about respecting the land that we live on. The students thoroughly enjoyed Trent's demonstration of the yidaki (didgeridoo) and listening to Trent's explanation about the significance of the school's red river gum trees.
