From the Middle and Senior School Principal

Last Friday at Assembly we acknowledged the efforts and achievements of all Academic Excellence and Academic Merit award recipients from Semester 2, 2021 and from Semester 1 this year. It was pleasing to have over 130 names displayed across the screens and read out by Mr Watkins and Ms Wegener. To each award recipient, congratulations! To any student who achieved a personal best and/or improvement from their previous academic report, irrespective of whether you qualified for one of the awards, I equally congratulate your efforts.

Our Year 12 cohort of students has a relatively short time remaining at the College before graduating. It probably feels like a long way away given the assessment workload and preparation at present, but time will pass quickly. To maximise my time in which to learn from them, I am currently inviting groups of approximately eight Year 12 students to have lunch with me each day. While not compulsory, it is pleasing to see most taking up the offer over the first two weeks of term. The lunch is an opportunity to get to know them better as I do not teach them this year, but most importantly, it is a chance for students to provide valuable feedback to the College about their collective experiences over their time spent here. I am quickly gaining a profile of the ideal teacher, in terms of attributes that assist students to learn, and what they would change about the College if they could. I have been blown away by their openness and desire to help make Concordia an even better school than it is now. They are solution focused.

The second round of Learning Conversations for the year are scheduled to take place on Tuesday 16 August in person, and Thursday 25 August via Microsoft Teams. Offering an afternoon/evening of each format is in direct response to the feedback received from parents in the recent school-wide survey conducted by MMG Education. We hope this flexibility will maximise your opportunity to speak with your child's teachers about the progress of your child's learning.

Aspect is the shortened name for the not-for-profit organisation, Autism Spectrum Australia. It was an amazing experience and I have come away with a deeper understanding of autism and the importance of inclusion in all school settings. Being Principal in a highly specialised environment was both exciting and challenging. After five years I was ready to move in a new direction and amazingly the advertisement for an Inclusive Learning Coordinator here at Concordia popped up on my LinkedIn page, and the rest is history.

2. Three words to describe you.

Creative, insightful, compassionate.

3. What is your motivation or inspiration in your role?

Working to support our incredible teaching staff and our students is a constant motivation for me and my inspiration comes from always thinking about what's possible. I love the opportunity to problem solve and my role gives me the opportunity to do this ongoing.

4. If you had a superpower, what would it be?

To be able to travel through time and see what the past was like but also the future.

'Red Centre' Music Tour

On Monday 18 July, 56 Concordia students (from Years 7–12) and nine adults embarked on Concordia's first 'Red Centre' Music Tour. For the next 11 days, this group travelled to the Flinders Ranges, Coober Pedy, Curtin Springs, and Alice Springs, performing concerts in each location to a diverse range of communities and audiences.

In the months leading up to this concert tour, the students and their ensemble directors spent

hours of time preparing, including two full days during the term break so that we were well placed to represent Concordia as best as we could.

Whilst music was the 'vehicle' which carried us, such tours are transformative for a great many other reasons. They offer opportunities to not only understand how to prepare and cope for time away from home, but they create community, offer insight into the way others live, enhance appreciation for 'the simple things', shape resilience, enhance appreciation for God's creation, and the list goes on...

Tour highlights include:

- all of the concerts, particularly at Living Waters Lutheran, Yirara College, and Hermannsberg
- Walking around Uluru (9.6kms and not a single complaint from the students)
- Meeting and performing with the Central Australian Aboriginal Women's Choir
- Visiting the RFDS and first Telegraph Station
- Hearing Mattson Jazz (one of our choirs) sing in Simpson's Gap (Rungutjirpa)
- Sleeping in a dugout hotel in Coober Pedy for two nights
- Karaoke on the buses
- Karaoke at the YHS in Alice Springs
- Listening to the students reflect on their daily learnings and experiences
- Hearing from staff at Qantas, Adelaide Coachlines, cafes, the RFDS and hotels we stayed in that this was the most polite and considerate school group they had hosted

Whilst we may still be recovering from the effects of many late nights and very early (and cold) mornings, I am confident that the learnings taken from this monumental experience will be lifelong.

Immunisation information for parents/guardians of Year 10 students

Year 10 Second Visit Reminder

Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be returning to the College on Friday 12 August 2022 for the below vaccination.

2nd dose of the Meningococcal B vaccine (Men B), BEXSERO

A reminder to parents: Students in Year 10 are offered two free vaccines two months apart to be fully vaccinated against Meningococcal B. It is important that your child is present at school on the day when EHA will be providing second doses.

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already started the above program with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

If you did not receive an immunisation consent form from your child at the beginning of the school year, please ask at SSO, or if unavailable contact EHA on 8132 3600.

If you have any further questions about the program, please directly contact **Eastern Health Authority on 8132 3600 or via e-mail at eha@eha.sa.gov.au**

Remember: it is your responsibility to notify EHA on 8132 3600 of any changes or new information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition, on the day of immunisation or prior. A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.

School Immunisation Program records may be required for future employment or travel.
