## From the Learning Resources Manager

It is generally accepted that reading for pleasure is a 'good thing to do'. In our Concordia College libraries, we wholeheartedly believe this to be true, but also think that the 'who' and 'what' of these benefits is worthy of further consideration.

The transition from primary school to high school sees a marked drop in young people's engagement in reading for pleasure, both in terms of attitude towards reading and time spent reading. The reasons for this drop are multitudinous and complex, but it is important to note that reading being less important or beneficial for this age group is **not** one of the reasons. Indeed, research shows that reading for pleasure is beneficial for all age groups from young children right through to the oldest members of our society.

So, what are the benefits of reading for pleasure? Often the academic benefits of reading are the primary focus of the discussion, and it cannot be denied that reading has a well-documented correlation to improvement in a student's vocabulary, comprehension skills, written and verbal fluency, and their general knowledge. These benefits are often reflected in a student's academic results and in standardised tests, including those from which PISA data is drawn.

However, the benefits of reading extend far beyond the classroom. A number of studies have

shown that those who regularly engage in reading for pleasure experience a range of social, civic and economic benefits. Reading for pleasure also, and perhaps most importantly, has positive wellbeing outcomes. Regular reading for pleasure is linked to a reduced risk of depression and improvements in self-esteem, coping strategies and general satisfaction with life. Reading for pleasure can also have a positive impact on sleep and strong social connections.

In short, reading definitely is a 'good thing to do' and not just to improve grades. A strong reading culture, in schools and homes, will make for a happier, healthier and more empathetic and engaged society.

Parents and caregivers have tremendous influence on children as readers. "One way parents can influence their children to read is through modeling keen reading" (Merga, 2023). Time you spend reading for pleasure supports your child to know that reading is a pleasurable activity that people choose to do – not something someone makes them do.

As you prepare for Book Week and put the finishing touches on costumes, take some time to talk with your child about books you have enjoyed reading now and in your childhood.

## **Pedal Prix Tailem Bend 8-Hour Race**

Concordia's six Pedal Prix teams, including Blue Saint from St Peters Campus, competed in the 8-Hour race at Tailem Bend on Saturday 5 August. Competing against 200 school and community teams from around Australia, all teams represented the College well on a challenging 3.41km circuit. Some unexpected rain turned the race into chaos with fogged up windows reducing visibility and making the track slippery, leading to multiple crashes and rollovers.

Concordia Campus teams worked well with smaller teams than normal to keep the trikes out on the track recording consistent lap times throughout the day. *Veloci,* our Senior School trike, experienced some mechanical issues, but our riders were able to make up some good time during the rain period and finish in the top 10 of the Senior School category. Our Year 7 team continued to show great improvement while our other three teams kept their trikes out on the track riding for periods of up to 60 minutes at a time. In a highly competitive competition, our teams achieved some good overall results for Round 4, placing three of our teams in the top 10 overall for the series.

Thank you to the staff and parents who assisted in many roles to make the race so successful. We look forward to the final race of the season at Murray Bridge where teams will race for 24 hours continuously at the end of Week 8 this term.

## Year 3 and 4 St Peters Campus Update

The Year 3/4 class at the St Peters Campus has started the term well with all of our students coming back refreshed from the three-week winter break. This term our unit of inquiry is 'How We Express Ourselves', and we have focused on the different ways that we communicate in our society, both now and in the past. Mrs Molloy has been working with the class and one of the key things we have focused on is how to research and the importance of looking at key words in texts.

A significant part of the unit is studying the history of communication. The students have really enjoyed looking at the ways communication has changed over time. A cassette was used as a provocation. The students tried guessing its function, but the majority of them had never seen a cassette and had no idea what it was used for. One student had seen one and thought it was an old kind of building block kids used in the olden days to make robots. Other guesses were an old iPod, a specialist tool to fix something, and a guitar tuner.

The students have really embraced learning about the history of communication and they particularly enjoyed learning about how we communicate around the world using satellites in space. This topic has also given the students an insight into their own practices of

communicating with others. Over the next few weeks we will be looking at cyber bullying and cyber safety in today's world.

During our Mathematics lessons this term we are looking at measurement. The students are currently designing activities that will be made into cards for their peers to follow. Students have come up with challenging, open-ended questions designed to help them gain a better understanding of varying types of measurement. Topic such as converting mm to cm, cm to m, m to km, time and measuring temperature are some of the activities that students have designed. Once finished and made into cards, these activities will be completed around our St Peters Campus and then some peer feedback will be given to each group.

## Year 10 Immunisation Information

Immunisation information for parents/legal guardians of Year 10 students

**Eastern Health Authority (EHA)** will be returning to Concordia for the final immunisation visit on Friday 25 August, 2023.

#### • 2nd dose of the Meningococcal B (Bexsero) vaccine

A reminder to parents: Students in year 10 are offered two free vaccines two months apart to be fully vaccinated against Meningococcal B. It is important that your child is present at school on the day when EHA will be providing second doses.

\*\* If your child was absent for the first dose two months ago and hasn't been vaccinated (at an EHA clinic or the GP) they can receive the first dose at the second visit.

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already received the 2nd dose with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily

exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone

• Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

#### **Remember:**

It is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition, A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.

Over the last few months, SAPOL has seen an emerging trend involving the targeting of Chinese persons for scams. Recent reported incidents have included international students and have resulted in a large loss of money. The session details are as follows:
