Vale Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG

Concordia acknowledges the recent death of revered Yankunytjatjara woman, Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG, aged 91, on Sunday 4 February 2024. We extend our sympathy to

her family and friends.

A highly respected, influential and formidable Aboriginal leader, Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG dedicated her life to the rights, health and wellbeing of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. She listened, spoke and acted with strength, determination, grace and dignity. Her work and achievements are extensive, including being a co-founder of the Council of Aboriginal Women of South Australia (1965), transferring from the South Australian Department for Aboriginal Affairs into the role of Federal Senior Liaison Officer, Canberra and Adelaide (1973), leading the National Aboriginal Conference (1978) and Aboriginal Development Commission (1980), becoming the first Aboriginal person to address the United Nations General Assembly (1992), being declared an Australian National Living Treasure (1998), working as an Advisor to South Australian Premier Mike Rann on matters relating to the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands (2004), receiving the NAIDOC Lifetime Achievement Award (2009) and many more.

Her profound legacy will continue through the work of the Lowitja O'Donoghue Foundation.

With gratitude for her service to so many people throughout her lifetime, we pay our respects.

Year 7 and 10 School Immunisation Program 2024

Together with SA Health, the School Immunisation Program will be offered at Concordia College by Eastern Health Authority (EHA) in 2024

Immunisation for Parents/Legal Guardians of Year 7 and 10 Students

All Year 7 students will be offered:

- one dose of the human papillomavirus vaccine, Gardasil®9
- one dose of the diptheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine, Boostrix®

All Year 10 students will be offered:

- two doses of the meningococcal B vaccine, Bexsero® at two separate visits (8 weeks apart)
- one dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine, Nimenrix®

The first Year 10 Immunisation will occur on Friday 22 March. The Year 7 Immunisations will occur on Friday 14 June.

Immunisation consent packs will be sent home with all Year 7 and 10 students. It is important that you read the information contained in the packs before you give consent for your child to be vaccinated at school.

If you do not receive an Immunisation Consent pack from your child, please ask at the school office.

All parents/legal guardians are to **complete**, **sign and return the Consent Cards**, **even if you do not consent** for the student to be vaccinated at school. Students aged 16 years and above can consent for themselves.

If you do not want your child to be vaccinated at school, please contact *Eastern Health Authority* to arrange for your child to receive the free vaccines at an EHA clinic located at your local Council.

Year 10 Immunisations - First Visit Reminder

- Two doses of the meningococcal B vaccine, Bexsero® at two separate visits (8 weeks apart)
- One dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine, Nimenrix®

The Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be visiting Concordia College on **Friday 22 March** to complete the meningococcal B and ACWY vaccine, Bexsero® and Nimenrix® immunisations for Year 10 students where consent has been provided. Please <u>download a fact sheet</u> for more information.

If you did not receive an immunisation consent form from your child, please ask at the Student Services Office for one. If unavailable, please contact EHA on 8132 3600.

If any information you gave on the original consent form has changed, please inform the Authority's immunisation staff before the date of vaccination on 8132 3600.

Please notify us if:

- Your child has already completed the Meningococcal B, ACWY vaccine and/or Bexsero® and Nimenrix® immunisation program with another provider.
- You wish to withdraw your consent.
- Your child's medical condition has changed.

Remember: It is your responsibility to advise the vaccinator on the day of immunisation of any change in the information on the consent form, in particular, your child's medical condition. A signed and dated note presented to the vaccinator on the day of immunisation, from a parent or guardian in your child's diary, is acceptable.

Specific Student Support

This year we are committed to further developing and improving our inclusive practice to support the varied needs of all students. We passionately believe that students experience inclusive education when they can access and fully participate in learning, alongside their similar-aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching strategies tailored to meet their individual needs.

The Inclusive Learning teacher's key role is to support the classroom teacher in enabling students with learning needs to access and participate in the curriculum on the same basis as their similar-aged peers. We consult with parents, classroom teachers and therapists to ensure the educational priorities for students with disability are met. We assist teachers in the provision of resources, create differentiated curriculum plans, and share strategies to enable teachers to work effectively with students with identified needs. We also engage with students to ensure their learning needs are met, to create Student Support Plans (SSPs) and provide additional intervention in collaboration with their class teacher.

Throughout Term 4 of 2023, Inclusive Learning teachers facilitated Student Support Plan review meetings. Students who have an identified learning difficulty/disability, and their parent/carers, were invited to attend to review key learning goals and discuss any specific support needs. New Year 7s were also invited as an introductory meeting to formalise their Student Support Plans. These SSPs were updated and shared with the students' teachers to

allow them to plan for and implement these adjustments for their education.

This term, our priorities are to:

- Share information and support teachers to identify student needs and adjustments
- Support new students to transition to the school
- · Identify and timetable in class support
- Consult and collaborate with parents/caregivers regarding required Student Support Plans
- Collaborate and work with teachers to plan, implement and differentiate curriculum

The Inclusive Learning teachers will be in contact within the coming weeks to schedule support meetings for students with identified learning needs within their year levels of responsibility. If you have any questions or concerns about your child's learning needs, please contact the Inclusive Learning teacher for your child's year level.

We look forward to working in partnership with you and your child to ensure successful learning outcomes.

SchoolTV Special Report

The Wellbeing Barometer survey has proven to be an invaluable tool for schools, providing insights into the state of youth mental health and wellbeing. Whilst last year's results focused the spotlight on areas of concern, there were also many highlights that demonstrated the resilience and adaptability of students and emphasised the necessity of prevention strategies.

Participating in this year's survey, will assist in identifying areas of strength and concern, as well as pinpointing opportunities for early intervention. Previously gathered information has helped support families as they navigate difficult conversations that enable understanding and foster connections to build relationships.

This survey is part of an ongoing, longitudinal study, with the results being instrumental in tailoring support for students and their families. Participation is strongly encouraged, as it provides a comprehensive view of students' experiences, challenges and achievements over the past year. Its aim is to capture a comprehensive picture of young people's lives, allowing for a tailored approach to enhance mental and emotional wellbeing.

We encourage you to take a few moments to complete a survey for each of your children. This

will help us determine the nature and extent of your concerns and how best to support families in the months ahead. Responses remain anonymous and will only be reported on an aggregated basis. You are asked to base your responses on observations made in the last 12 months.

Acquiring the skills for future independence, taking healthy risks and giving young people the opportunity to emancipate from parents, are key developmental tasks that are essential if we are to stave off the impact of mental illness in the future. Please reflect on the information offered in this Special Report, and as always, we welcome your feedback. If this raises any concerns for you or your child, please reach out to the school or seek professional medical advice.
