# **Reminder: Year 10 Immunisations Friday 22 March**

## First Visit Reminder for Parents of Year 10 Students

Immunisation information for parents/legal guardians of Year 10 students

All Year 10 students will be offered:

- two doses of the meningococcal B vaccine, Bexsero® at two separate visits (two months apart).
- one dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine, Nimenrix®

The Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be visiting Concordia College on **Friday 22 March** to complete the meningococcal B (first dose) and ACWY vaccine, Bexsero® and Nimenrix® immunisations for Year 10 students where consent has been provided.

Further information and videos for high school students are available online.

Immunisation consent packs were given out at the beginning of the school year with information about the vaccines on offer. It is important that you have read the information supplied in the packs before you give consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack from your child, please ask at the school office.

# If any information you gave on the original consent form has changed, please inform the Authority's immunisation staff before the date of vaccination on 8132 3600.

Please notify us if:

- Your child has already started the above program with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed.

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

Remember: It is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition. A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.

## **Student Achievement**

Well done to Lily 12TMCC for being selected among 95 Year 11 and 12 students nationwide to attend the 29th National Schools Constitutional Convention in Canberra.

The program is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education (DOE), coordinated by National Curriculum Services (NCS) and supported by the Australian Curriculum Studies Association (ACSA) and department of education from all states and territories.

This year's convention topic is 'Section 96 of the Constitution allows the Commonwealth to grant funds to areas that fall outside those prescribed in Section 51. Should Section 96 be amended to decentralise the power of the Commonwealth?'.

Students will examine, discuss and debate these aspects of the constitution, with outcomes being presented to the President of the Senate, Senator Sue Lines, for tabling in Parliament and recorded in Hansard.
