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Nurturing Curiosity Through Hands-On Learning

At Concordia College, we believe children learn best when they explore, question and discover for themselves. That's why we embrace hands-on, inquiry-based learning—an approach that encourages students to actively engage with their surroundings, think critically and develop a lifelong love of learning.

When children experiment, build and investigate, they take ownership of their learning. Whether measuring ingredients in a baking project, observing insects in the garden or designing a simple machine, hands-on activities make concepts come to life. This type of learning isn't just fun—it strengthens problem-solving skills, creativity and confidence.

Inquiry-based learning starts with curiosity. Instead of simply providing answers, teachers guide students to ask questions, test ideas and make discoveries. For example, in a Science lesson about floating and sinking, students might explore different objects in water before discussing the reasons behind their observations. However, hands-on exploration is most effective when combined with explicit instruction at key moments. Teachers provide direct guidance, explain complex ideas and help students make meaningful connections—ensuring they develop a deep and accurate understanding of concepts.

As parents, you can support this at home by encouraging exploration and discovery in everyday activities:

- **Encourage Questions:** When your child asks, “Why?” respond with, “What do you think?” and explore the answer together.
- **Create Hands-On Experiences:** Try simple experiments, cooking, gardening or building projects to spark curiosity.
- **Embrace Mistakes:** Remind your child that learning happens through trial and error—mistakes are opportunities to grow!
- **Provide Clear Explanations:** When your child struggles to understand a concept, offer guidance and explanations to deepen their learning.

By fostering a balance between hands-on discovery and explicit instruction, we are helping our children become independent thinkers, problem-solvers and lifelong learners.

Let's keep their curiosity alive—both in the classroom and at home!

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Year 8 Science in Motion

This term, our Year 8 Science students took on the challenge of engineering and experimenting with electric carts in an exciting hands-on practical. Working in small groups, students constructed their own battery-powered carts and explored how adding mass affected the speed of their vehicles.

The experiment was inspired by a real-world problem: If a delivery service used electric carts to transport goods, how much extra weight could be added before the cart became too slow? To investigate this, students added 50g masses incrementally and measured how long it took their carts to travel a set distance.

Through this experiment, students practised key scientific inquiry skills, including formulating hypotheses, identifying variables, designing fair tests, collecting and analysing data and

evaluating the reliability of their methods. While collaboration was essential for building and testing the carts, each student individually wrote up their findings in a structured practical report.

Many students observed a clear relationship between mass and travel time, reinforcing fundamental principles of physics such as forces, motion and friction. The activity not only deepened their understanding of scientific concepts but also encouraged teamwork, problem-solving and critical thinking.

Well done to all our budding engineers and scientists for their enthusiasm and dedication to this investigation!

The Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be visiting Concordia College on **Tuesday 25 March** to complete the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine (Gardasil®9) and the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough (Boostrix®) immunisations for Year 7 students where consent has been provided.

If you did not receive an immunisation consent form from your child, please ask at the school office for one, if unavailable contact EHA on 8132 3600.

If any information you gave on the original consent form has changed, please inform the Authority's immunisation staff before the date of vaccination on 8132 3600.

Please notify EHA (eha@eha.sa.gov.au or 8132 3600) if:

- Your child has already completed the HPV vaccine (Gardasil®9) and/or the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough (Boostrix®) immunisation program with another provider.
- You wish to withdraw your consent.
- Your child's medical condition has changed.

To assist with access to the upper arm, students may wear PE uniform on the day of the vaccinations.

Remember: It is your responsibility to advise the vaccinator on the day of immunisation of any change in the information on the consent form, in particular, your child's medical condition. A signed and dated note from a parent or guardian in your child's diary, presented to the vaccinator on the day of immunisation, is acceptable.
