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# Canberra Trip 2025

Our recent trip to Canberra was an exciting and highly successful learning experience that brought classroom concepts to life and created lasting memories for students and staff alike. Over four action-packed days, students explored key institutions that shape Australia's government and civic identity, engaging directly with the Central Idea: "The structure of government and the decisions it makes impact on the fairness of society."

The St Peters Campus Year 5/6s combined with the St John's Campus Year 6s for the trip, which provided great opportunities to strengthen cross-campus connections. Our itinerary included a tour of **Parliament House**, where we had the opportunity to sit in the House of Representatives and ask questions about how laws are made. We also visited **Government House**, where students learned about the role of the Governor General and the importance of leadership and responsibility in public life. At the **Royal Australian Mint**, students explored the history of currency in Australia and even saw coins being made. These experiences were supported by visits to the **National Electoral Education Centre**, the **Australian War Memorial**, and **Questacon**, providing a rich and diverse overview of Australia's history, science and systems of democracy.

Throughout the week, students demonstrated maturity, teamwork and resilience. They successfully navigated airport procedures with confidence, represented our school with pride and participated fully in all activities with enthusiasm. Many students stepped outside their comfort zones, supporting one another and building stronger friendships and independence along the way.

It was truly rewarding to see our students so engaged in real-world learning experiences, applying their knowledge, asking thoughtful questions and showing curiosity about the world around them. We are incredibly proud of their behaviour, teamwork and positive attitudes throughout the trip.

The Canberra experience not only strengthened their understanding of government and civic responsibility but also helped shape them into more confident, capable and compassionate learners and citizens.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist schools and families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing \$90 per student towards those costs under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

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# Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) 2025

In Term 1, 16 students from Years 9, 10 and 12, represented Concordia in the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO). The competition is designed for students who are interested in Languages and Maths or Computing, and who really enjoy solving puzzles and cracking codes.

This year, Concordia students joined 2,692 students from 93 schools across Australia in the first round of the competition. Our students worked intensively in their teams over a period of

two hours, to solve a range of challenging language analysis problems. The standard of the competition is very high. To receive a Gold award, students must achieve in the top 8% nationally, for a Silver award they must achieve in the top 25% and for a Bronze award they must achieve in the top 50%. An Honourable Mention is given to a team that achieves full marks for a problem.

Congratulations to our two senior and two junior teams who performed very well, achieving one Silver, two Bronze and one Honourable Mention overall.

This is a remarkable result for our school, producing our best race result at this track ever.

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# **Year 10 School Immunisation Program**

Immunisation Information for Parents/Appointed Legal Guardians of Year 10 Students

The SA 2025 School Immunisation Program (first visit for Year 10 students) will be delivered by **Eastern Health Authority on Friday 30 May**.

#### All Year 10 students will be offered:

- 2 doses of the meningococcal B vaccine at 2 separate visits (8 weeks apart)
- 1 dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine

Immunisation Consent packs have been provided to all Year 10 students at the commencement of the school year, including information about the vaccines on offer. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack, please contact the school office direct so this pack can be provided to you.

We would encourage all parents/appointed legal guardians to read the information supplied in the packs before providing consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. Additional, further information and videos are available

at www.health.gov.au/news/school-based-vaccinations-for-teens if required.

If you have provided consent to participate in the immunisation program and any information has changed, in particular in relation to your child's medical condition or you wish to withdraw consent, please directly notify your school immunisation provider, Eastern Health Authority, as soon as possible prior to the date of immunisation.

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- encourage your child eat prior to the immunisations and drink plenty of water throughout the day; and
- wear sports uniforms to allow for easy access to the upper arm.
