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Receptions Build Bird Boxes in Design, Technology and Engineering

As part of our Unit of Inquiry into 'How the World Works', Reception students from St Peters Campus recently visited the Concordia Campus for a hands-on learning experience that combined science, design, construction and environmental care. Their exploration of local animals and how we care for them inspired a collaborative project with Mr Beitz and the Design, Technology and Engineering team—building bird boxes for native birds.

The students began by selecting a local bird species and, as a class, researched the dimensions and features needed to create a suitable bird box. This inquiry-based approach helped deepen their understanding of animal habitats and the importance of thoughtful design in supporting wildlife.

During their visit, the children were introduced to the Design, Technology and Engineering workshop—a new and exciting environment filled with tools and possibilities. Under the expert guidance of Mr Beitz, they learned how to:

- Sand timber to prepare it for construction
- Use the drill press and saw to shape and assemble their boxes
- Personalise their creations using the laser cutter

What stood out most was the way the children embraced the responsibility of working in this new space. They showed great care and maturity in following safety instructions, respecting the tools and supporting one another throughout the building process. Their enthusiasm was matched by a strong sense of focus and pride in their work.

This experience not only supported their inquiry into the natural world but also introduced them

to basic design and engineering principles in a fun and engaging way. The completed bird boxes were a testament to their creativity, teamwork and growing understanding of how we can care for the animals in our local environment.

To conclude the day, the students read the book *How I Changed the World*, which inspired thoughtful reflection on the impact of small acts of kindness. They made a powerful connection between their bird box project and the idea that even small contributions—like creating safe spaces for local birds—can make a meaningful difference in our world.

We are incredibly proud of our Reception students for their curiosity, responsibility and compassion. A huge thank you to Mr Beitz and the Design, Technology and Engineering team for making this memorable learning opportunity possible!

SchoolTV Special Report: Parenting Styles

There's no such thing as perfect parenting, but by understanding different parenting styles, we can better support our children in healthier and more effective ways.

Most of us parent as a blend of our own upbringing, lived experiences and external influences such as books, podcasts or parenting websites. While parenting is always a challenge, it can become even more complex through divorce, separation, blended families, trauma or bereavement. Not to mention life's many other hurdles.

The concept of "parenting styles" was first introduced in the 1960s by Diana Baumrind, a clinical and developmental psychologist. She identified four main categories of parenting. Each style shapes a child's development in different ways and comes with both strengths and challenges.

Although well-intentioned, each parenting approach can have drawbacks in a child's development. Every child is unique and their needs change as they grow. An authoritative style may suit younger children, but teenagers often require a greater balance of guidance and independence. The goal is to create a secure environment where children feel respected, heard and supported.

By learning more about the different styles and how they influence children, you can make informed choices about the approach that best suits your family. Remember also that styles are not fixed. They can evolve over time as your child grows and their needs change.

Legal Studies Update

Week 9 was an exciting week for Senior School Legal Studies students. On Tuesday evening, Year 11 Legal Studies students, along with Mr Sommariva, Mr Whatley and Frau Harris, attended 'Just Lawful', a presentation at the University of South Australia. Co-hosted by Daniel Panozzo and The Advertiser's chief court reporter, Sean Fewster, the presentation took the audience through the evidence provided during a real murder trial. Students were encouraged to use their critical-thinking skills to consider the significance to attribute to the different items of evidence, and to question inherent bias and assumptions. The evening provided the students with valuable insight into the complexities of murder trials as well as helping the students to consider whether we have a justice system or merely a legal system.

On Friday of Week 9, the Stage 2 Legal Studies students had the opportunity to meet Supreme Court Justice Laura Stein. Justice Stein described her career pathway, which saw her rise to the position of Crown Solicitor and then a Supreme Court Judge. She also described some of the typical aspects of a 'day in the life' of a judge, and gave firsthand insight into how the South Australian court system attempts to balance the "competing tensions" of fairness vs efficiency, empowered vs disempowered, rights vs responsibilities and certainty vs flexibility. Justice Stein also provided the students with information and suggestions about careers in the legal field, which was particularly valuable for students planning to study Law at a tertiary level.

As part of their studies, the Year 10s researched the importance of sensory play in early childhood development and then put their knowledge into practice by designing and creating a sensory toy.

Each toy was carefully planned to encourage social, cognitive and physical development in children. A key requirement of the task was for students to include at least one handmade element in their designs, allowing them to showcase creativity and practical skills.

The highlight of the task was visiting our St John's Campus ELC to share these toys with the younger children. It was a fantastic opportunity for our Year 10 students to connect with our ELC learners, observe how the children engaged with their creations, and see firsthand the value of sensory play in supporting development.

This collaborative activity was both educational and enjoyable, strengthening the bond between the ELC and secondary school students while deepening the Year 10 students' understanding of child development in a meaningful, hands-on way.
