## Year 8 Visual Art - Out and About

Our Year 8 Visual Art students engaged with two significant exhibitions at the Art Gallery of South Australia late last term.

Students connected with the skills and sensitivity seen in "Dangerously Modern"; an exhibition celebrating the dozens of young Australian women artists who left Australia for Europe in the 1890s to 1920s in search of new artistic, professional and personal experiences. Our students gained an understanding of the significance of the role these Australian women played in shaping the global art movement now known as Early Modernism.

Students also viewed the 'Ramsey Art Prize 2025'; an exhibition of works by current Australian artists under 40 working in a range of media. Students enjoyed the conceptual ideas in this exhibition and were particularly impressed with prize winner Jack Ball, who won the \$100,000 prize for his work "Heavy Grit'.

Another group of students visited the Jam Factory and were fortunate to see artists at work in their studios and connect with the exhibition 'Melting Point', featuring works focused on contemporary jewellery and object making.

In their study, students responded to artworks they found a connection with and those works that challenged them. Their responses have led to further class discussions on art practice and using a wide range of media and ideas to express oneself.

As teachers, we were impressed with how students conducted themselves on the day and how earnestly they responded to a range of artworks. The excursion also emphasised how important it is for students to have real-life experiences to extend their understanding of art and its connection to the real world.

# **Expert Training Tips from Clay Watkins**

With the City to Bay coming up at the start of spring, many Adelaideans are hitting the pavement in preparation for this much-loved Adelaide event. As a former sprinter who now runs for fitness and enjoyment, I've learned a lot about how different distance running can be—but also how rewarding.

Here are a few reflections and tips that might help you prepare:

- 1. **Train, don't strain**: That bit of wisdom comes from Arthur Lydiard, one of the greats of endurance coaching. The human body is a marvellous thing—it adapts to stress and gets fitter and stronger, provided the load we place on it is sensible and consistent. Build gradually, listen to your body and don't feel the need to do too much too soon.
- 2. **Don't overlook strength training**: Coming from a sprinting background, I've always valued strength work—and it's just as important for distance runners. A few short sessions each week (bodyweight squats, lunges and core work) can improve posture, running form and reduce the risk of injury.
- 3. **Vary your training**: Back in my sprinting days, I followed a polarised approach—some sessions focused on short, powerful efforts, others on slower, steadier work. The same applies to distance running. Mix in a weekly interval or tempo session to build speed and efficiency, and balance it with easy runs that help develop endurance without overloading the body. This variation keeps training effective and sustainable.
- 4. Make the time count: I often use my runs to listen to podcasts or audiobooks. It's a

- great way to feed both mind and body—and it turns a training session into valuable thinking space.
- 5. **Alternatively, make it social**: If you're more of a social being, find a training buddy, join a local running group, or run with music that lifts your mood. The sense of connection and shared effort can turn a solo grind into something far more enjoyable and motivating.

Most importantly, enjoy the process. Whether you run for a time, for fun or simply to finish, there's something powerful about setting a goal and seeing it through. Good luck with your training and I hope to see some of the Concordia community on the start line.

# Year 2/3 Students Dive into Pond Exploration and Environmental Learning

The St Peters Campus Year 2/3 class has been busy with hands-on learning, exploring the local ponds in our community late in Term 2. Equipped with their nature journals, magnifying glasses and plenty of curiosity, students have been collecting water samples, sketching what they see and taking photos to document their discoveries. Wearing their trusty gumboots, they've also definitely been enjoying wading into the water for a closer look.

These outdoor adventures are more than just fun—they're part of a deeper investigation led by the students into some of the current environmental issues. Students have shown a growing interest and concern about topics like droughts and water usage. This real-world exploration connects directly to their current Unit of Inquiry, which focuses on resources and sustainability, with a particular emphasis on water.

Building on recent excursions to Wittunga Botanic Gardens and the Marine Discovery Centre, students have expanded their understanding of environmental topics. They've explored ideas like microplastics, habitats, pollution and responsible water use. Their firsthand experiences have helped them make meaningful connections between what they learn in the classroom and what they observe in nature.

Through these pond visits, the students are not only enhancing their scientific inquiry skills but also developing a strong sense of environmental responsibility. They're applying what they've learned about sustainability and water conservation both at school and in their everyday lives.
