Over the Term 2 holidays, the College embarked on a re-paint internally and externally and the laying of a new vinyl floor in the Old Gymnasium, now called the Multi-Purpose Hub.

The existing flooring was becoming a health and safety issue with many cracks starting to appear. The “Chicken Wire” around the perimeter interior walls looked tired and dated. This has now been painted and gives it a fresh and vibrant appeal for users and for bystanders watching on.

This upgrade provides the opportunity for not only PE to use it as an overflow from Fortiter, especially during wet weather but also for Drama and other faculties to utilise the open space. Further to that, the space will again be available to hire out to community and sporting groups.

Another project to be completed during Term 3 is the disability access to the altar area in the College Chapel. Access will be via a disability lift to be located in the room behind the current band area. A railing will also be placed along the main steps down to the altar to assist persons needing to move to and from the altar. These improvements will be welcomed by the community who utilise the Chapel in assisting those with disabilities and the frail.

The Property team is also awaiting concept designs to improve the ELC play area at St Peters campus. Upon review and costing, the College looks forward to implementing the designs to freshen up this play space later in the year.

Recently, we took 50 Year 9s to the new South Australian Sports Institute (SASI) facility to undertake physiological and fitness testing for talent identification for future Olympic pathways. The students were also able to go on a tour of the new facility to observe different professionals working in their fields specific to sport science, exercise physiology, sports psychology, physiotherapy, data analytics and coaching.

The Year 9s achieved some impressive fitness testing results. **Jamie (9NSHR)** and **Daniel (9MSMA)** achieved maximum wattage scores on the bikes above 1,100 watts. Meanwhile, **Christian (9MGAS)** and **Jacob (9NSHR)** achieved level 13.10 and 14.1 on the beep test respectively. **Daisy (9SFOR)** had the most impressive VO2 max for the girls. There were also a number of girls identified, through physiology testing and their previous experience with dance and calisthenics, for diving pathways. All students put in a great effort during the testing and were complimented on their work ethic, application and respect.

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St Peters Campus Receptions' How the World Works Inquiry

This term, our St Peters Campus Receptions have embarked on a fascinating Unit of Inquiry into how the world works, exploring how we observe and wonder about the natural world.

We began with a thought-provoking provocation, inviting students to investigate a series of engaging stations: testing different sounds, exploring plants, examining a small-world habitat, feeling materials with varying properties, smelling herbs and studying objects under magnifying glasses. Their challenge? To work out how these experiences were connected. The children quickly discovered that by using their senses and curiosity, they could uncover details and patterns in the world around them.

Since then, our budding scientists have been sharpening their observation skills. We have gone on a sound hunt and listened carefully to identify and describe different noises in our environment. We explored our sense of taste with a delicious (and sometimes surprising!) tasting session, describing foods as salty, bitter, sweet or sour—including some less familiar flavours like blood orange and horseradish! We created sensory boards, combining materials of different textures and completed observational drawings, focusing on fine details we might normally overlook. This week, we have played '*What's That Smell?*', using our noses to guess mystery scents.

Through these experiences, students are learning that careful observation, using all our senses, helps us to understand and appreciate the world in new and exciting ways.

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Oliphant Science Awards

We are incredibly proud of the students across our three campuses who represented our

school in this year's Oliphant Science Awards. The Oliphant Science Awards give students the chance to shine outside the classroom and to see how science connects with the real world. It encourages problem solving, critical thinking and creativity—skills that are so important in today's world. This year there was a new record of 3,092 projects registered and over 2,000 projects delivered to the Adelaide Showgrounds for judging ahead of Science Alive! The awards celebrate the curiosity and scientific thinking of young people across South Australia—and our students truly rose to the challenge. Throughout the process, students became young scientists—asking big questions, testing their ideas, experimenting, observing and carefully documenting their learning. Their projects reflected real passion and effort, and we were so impressed by their originality and persistence.

This year, our entries included growing crystals, designing and building board games, creating apps, photography and more. Each student showed a strong commitment to exploring science in meaningful and imaginative ways.

We also recognise our families who have supported their children through this complex process. Concordia College has again achieved a set of incredible results through the judging process. Students achieved nine prize winning entries (1st, 2nd or 3rd place in their age category) and five Highly Commended entries.

Reflections and Training Tips from Tara Palm

Reflections and what the City to Bay means to me

The City to Bay holds a place in the heart of the Adelaide sporting community. Runners, walkers, footballers, netballers, people dressed in costumes, young and old, all gather. Every year the atmosphere is fun. We line up behind the traffic lights outside the Adelaide Festival Centre. Ready ourselves for the long road of Anzac highway. It is a fast net downhill course. On lucky years the wind blows in a NE direction creating a tail wind. It's a feeling of relief when you can see Glenelg in the distance. One kilometre to dig deep from Jetty Road.

I took part in my first City to Bay when I was in Year 8 in 1999. According to the Advertiser, how we used to get sporting results, my time was 49.30. Two decades later my best City to Bay performance came in 2019, I placed 2nd in 39.10. Last year I was fortunate to win the half marathon event. It's special to see my longevity of improvement and to have had my grandparents waiting for me at the finish line every year.

Following on from Clay, here are some more tips to help you train for race day:

1. Good running shoes. It is important to have shoes that fit correctly and will optimise comfort and performance. There are several running stores that will allow you to try shoes on a treadmill and provide specialist fitting advice.
2. Training locations. Explore some different locations. Adelaide is surrounded by parklands making it the perfect city for a distance runner. All parklands have accessible often marked paths, perfect for walks, jogs or interval sessions. My regular places to train are the Linear trail, Karen Rolton ovals, Semaphore to Largs Bay beachfront and Uni loop.
3. Enjoy trails and nature. Once a week I drive out of the city to run in national parks and reserves. The hills provide a different training stimulus and being in nature makes the run go quickly. My favourite locations are Rocky Creek Hut, Happy Valley Reservoir and Belair National Park.
4. Complete a practice race. Five-kilometre Park Run events are on every Saturday morning at a variety of locations. Participating in a lead-up race or park run can be a fun way to train and practice your race day routine.
5. Practice good nutrition and hydration. Good pre- and post-race nutrition will promote performance and recovery. Bircher muesli, chocolate milks, 'fruit and nut' bars and bananas are some of my top choices.
6. Listen to your body, enjoy the training process and all the best for race day.

Australian Brain Bee Challenge State Final

The Australian Brain Bee Challenge is a prestigious and intellectually demanding international neuroscience competition for Year 10 students. Designed to stretch even the most

academically gifted, the challenge tests students on complex topics such as brain anatomy, neural communication, neurological disorders and current advances in brain research. The day is hosted by university academics from Flinders University and the University of Adelaide. Students undertake a series of tests on the day, both individual and in a team.

This year the competition was held at the Adelaide Health and Medical Sciences building at the University of Adelaide. We had nine students compete at this State Final on Friday. It was a pressure-filled day. One of the questions involved students listing the 12 cranial nerves in two minutes - glossopharyngeal and vestibulocochlear to name just two!

Our team performed exceptionally well and placed second in the State in the Team Challenge. Congratulations to **Adele (10RCRO)**, **Paige (10BWHA)**, **Sophie (10JDIV)** and **Paris (10BWHA)**.

A few fun facts:

- Since 2022, Concordia College has had **26 students reach the State Finals** of this competition.
- We have placed in the **top three in the teams' competition three times since 2022**
- To prepare for this year's competition, our nine students answered a total of 22,500 questions about the brain.

The Brain Bee Challenge is a wonderful extension opportunity and is of particular benefit to those students who wish to study in a medical field. It is also very useful to students who go on to study biology and psychology at SACE level. Well done to all who took part on the day and represented our school so beautifully.

Oliphant Science Awards

In more wonderful news, Concordia has had some great success in this year's Oliphant Science Awards. Find a more detailed article in this edition.

In 2025 we have had **nine winners** (1st, 2nd or 3rd place - exact placings will be announced at the Awards night later in the year) and **five Highly Commended** students from Reception–Year 11. There are several categories in the competition ranging from 'Games' to 'Programming, Apps and Robotics', 'Multimedia' and 'Scientific Writing'. Concordia students earned a **top three placing in eight of the different categories** within a range of age groups. This is exceptional given that there were over 3,000 projects entered this year. Of special note at the Concordia Campus were the following results:

- Oliver (10BWHA) - Won a prize for 'Programming, Apps and Robotics' for his app to teach Greek and Latin root word stems in scientific words.
- First place for Laura (11RGOG) — 'Year 11/12 Multimedia' for her presentation on the Central Nervous System.
