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From the Head of College

At Concordia College, we remain deeply committed to listening to our community and responding with purpose. Earlier this term, the Board received the initial results of our 2025 MMG survey—a rich source of feedback from parents, students and staff across our three campuses. At this stage, we are still in the process of analysing these reports and considering how the themes might influence our new Strategic Plan. We will share more detail with the community later this term as we continue to work through the findings together.

What Our Families Value Most

Parents consistently told us what they value about Concordia: nurture, care, community, achievement and values. Their words speak volumes:

- "If you could bottle and sell what Concordia has, it would be the wealthiest school on the planet ... represented by its values, it already takes the title."
- "Every morning when I drop the boys off, I walk away confident that they're in the best

possible place—a school that truly cares."

• "There is something very special about Concordia. Thank you for seeing and nurturing the individual in each child."

These reflections affirm our mission: to provide a Christ-centred education where every child is known, valued, and supported to thrive.

Shaping the Next Strategic Plan

Importantly, the areas for growth highlighted in the early survey reports mirror the strategic priorities we are already shaping. Families want to see continued strength in academic standards, consistency in communication, expanded sport and co-curricular offerings, and strong pathways beyond Year 12. Students highlighted wellbeing, relationships and the need for balance in learning. Staff reminded us of the importance of professional development, clarity and care.

Our draft Strategic Plan directly responds:

- Strengthening teaching and learning through a renewed Instructional Model.
- Deepening wellbeing support for students and staff alike.
- Expanding opportunities in sport, co-curricular and pathways.
- Prioritising staff development and wellbeing as foundations for student success.

A Community Moving Forward Together

What stands out most is how closely the voices of our community and the priorities of our plan align. Together, they form a picture of a College that is compassionate, aspirational and future-focused. Concordia is not only preparing knowledgeable graduates but shaping well-rounded young people with a confident sense of who they are—empowered to make a difference in the lives of others.

We are grateful for the trust and support of our community, and we are excited to continue this journey. As we further analyse the MMG survey results and roll out key themes later this term, we look forward to shaping a Strategic Plan that reflects who we are and who we are called to be.

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Fossil Identification in Stage 1 Earth and Environmental Science

Stage 1 Earth and Environmental Science is a new course that was introduced in 2025 for Year 10 and 11 students to expand their understanding of STEM, incorporating geographical and scientific concepts through an integrative approach. This semester, students have been working on various themes, with the first focus being on 'Life'. As part of this, students explored the beginning of life and the scientific theories and processes regarding fossils and fossil identification. To further students' understanding, an incursion with Dr Felicity Coutts, an Ediacaran Paleontologist, helped students to explore fossils from this period. Some of the samples that students got to touch and analyse were over 600 million years old! Students looked at opalised shells from Coober Pedy, understanding that most of South Australia was underwater during the Cambrian and Ediacaran periods.

This hands-on activity provided a great opportunity to connect with industry and ask questions of a paleontologist. Our next theme on 'Water' will provide the opportunity for students to continue to connect the importance of this finite resource and the world around them.

Academy Learning Conferences with Julie Arliss

In line with our strong commitment to providing high-quality educational opportunities that stretch and challenge our students, Concordia recently hosted a series of learning days with international gifted education specialist Julie Arliss, direct from the UK. This is the 12th year Concordia has hosted these events.

Across three days—a Junior Student Conference, a Senior Student Conference and a Teacher Gifted Symposium for educators from across South Australia—more than 90 Concordia students from Years 7–12 engaged in a rich program of lectures, workshops and debates alongside peers from other schools. A highlight included a live lecture from Dr Andrew Pinsent, who holds a doctorate in physics from Oxford University as well as PhDs in philosophy and theology.

Across the conferences, students explored profound and challenging questions such as:

- What is courage?
- How do we think on our feet like Oxford University students?
- How do Plato's ideas still shape the world today?
- How does religion, science, evil and freewill intersect?
- What is the nature of time?

- Does love conquer all—or can it sometimes cause harm?
- Freedom of speech why is it important?

Through philosophical inquiry, logical reasoning, scientific exploration and spirited debate, students were immersed in a day of rich learning and stimulating thought. This inspiring program not only broadened students' intellectual horizons but also exemplified the value of creating spaces where gifted and highly able learners can be stretched to think deeply, critically and creatively.

State Final Legacy Junior Public Speaking Award

The Legacy Junior Public Speaking Award is a national competition that aims to enhance students' communication skills and to help people appreciate the ideals of Legacy, which are voluntary service, social justice, caring, personal sacrifice and mateship. Legacy is a unique Australian voluntary not-for-profit charity, an organisation dedicated to enhancing the lives of families of our Australian Defence Force veterans who have served in war, peacekeeping and humanitarian missions and who have sadly died or become incapacitated either during war or subsequently.

The organisation currently cares for over 3,500 families throughout South Australia. Year 9 students **Eva (9ALAM)** and **Sophia (9ALAM)** represented Concordia beautifully during the preliminary round of the competition. On Friday 15 August, Sophia was awarded a trophy for competing as one of 10 Finalists for South Australia at the Legacy House State Final. She presented an excellent speech about the importance of voluntary service.

As a special note, while she is a debater, this is Sophia's first year competing in formal public speaking competitions, and she placed highly in the South Australia / Northern Territory Rostrum Voice of Youth Zone Final at Parliament House and excelled at the Legacy State Final. At Concordia, one of our core school values is aspiration—striving for continuous growth and improvement. Sophia demonstrates that with dedication, openness to feedback, consistent practice and perseverance, amazing things are possible. Well done!

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Year 5/6 Excursion to Hahndorf

On Wednesday 20 August, our Year 5/6 St Peters Campus students travelled to Hahndorf to explore South Australia's oldest surviving German settlement and deepen their understanding of Lutheranism, migration, culture and community. The visit brought to life much of what we have been learning in class and in our Hahndorf excursion booklets.

As soon as we arrived, students noticed how the town's German heritage is still visible today in the architecture, food and traditions. Walking down the historic main street, they saw original buildings, old cottages and traditional German-style bakeries. We learned how early Lutheran settlers from Prussia made the long journey to South Australia in the 1830s, seeking religious freedom and a new life. Students reflected on the courage of these pioneers and the challenges they faced.

The excursion also highlighted the contributions migrants have made to South Australian society. We learned how farming skills, crafts and cultural traditions shaped Hahndorf into the vibrant town it is today. Students connected what they observed with the information from their booklets, comparing the Hahndorf of the past with the present-day community.

Of course, the day was not just about history. There were plenty of opportunities to enjoy the unique character of Hahndorf today—whether it was enjoying lunch in the park, sketching historic buildings or simply soaking up the atmosphere of a town that blends old and new.

By the end of the day, students left with a stronger appreciation for the role migration has played in shaping South Australia, as well as memorable experiences with friends. Our Hahndorf excursion was a wonderful mix of learning, discovery and fun—an experience that will stay with students as they continue their inquiry into history and community.
