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Making a Difference with Vinnies

Within every community, there are people facing hardship, loneliness, and struggling daily to simply get by. With around 1,500 people in Adelaide alone facing homelessness, something needs to be done to help these people stay warm and safe. This is where the St Vincent de Paul Society, known by many as Vinnies, steps in. Founded in Paris in 1833, Vinnies began as a small group determined to turn faith into action. With more than 45,000 volunteers, the organisation continues to support people experiencing disadvantage in our community. Guided by compassion, Vinnies works tirelessly to create a more caring and equitable world, offering a hand to those who need it most.

Vinnies provides essential services such as food assistance, emergency accommodation, women's shelters, financial advice, and home visits. Every item that is donated to Vinnies via their op shops helps provide meals, warm clothing and shelter for people facing domestic violence, homelessness, poverty or illness.

As part of my Year 11 Activating Identities and Futures (AIF) project, I wanted to create a meaningful impact within my local community. My goal was to raise awareness about the incredible work done by charities such as Vinnies, which provide essential support to people experiencing hardship and homelessness. Through this project, I aimed not only to highlight the importance of compassion and community involvement, but also to actively contribute my own skills to help those in need. By doing so, I hoped to make a positive difference and inspire others to get involved in supporting the local community.

To achieve this, I joined a knitting group that creates handmade items for Vinnies, including beanies, scarves, baby caps and teddy bears for unwell children. Within my AIF project, I learnt and developed my knitting skills, through the help of the knitting group, to be able to create and donate knitted beanies and scarves. With guidance from the group organiser, Tess Holland, I also helped deliver our donated items, along with food and essentials, to people experiencing hardship.

Tess has volunteered with Vinnies for over 20 years, assisting families with food, clothing and bills. As she says, *"The enjoyment is seeing the clients happy when they see us. We can offer a little friendship and understanding at a crucial time."* Volunteers like Tess show how compassion and community spirit truly change lives.

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Graduating Year 12 student Amelia ‘Milly’ – A Story of Courage, Talent and Triumph

As our Year 12 Class of 2025 prepares to graduate, we felt it important to pay special tribute to a student who has had a truly extraordinary high school journey.

Amelia ‘Milly’ was born in Western Australia, fully blind. At six months of age, she regained a small amount of sight but remains legally blind to this day.

In 2016, at age eight, Milly began Year 3 at Concordia College. That year, her teacher organised a blind sport demonstration to help the class understand her vision impairment. It was here that Milly was first introduced to Goalball; a sport designed specifically for people with vision impairment and a recognised Paralympic sport.

In April 2019, Milly began playing Goalball competitively. Just months later, in October, she competed, representing South Australia at her first Australian Goalball Championships (AGC), where she earned a bronze medal in the junior division.

Following the disruptions of COVID-19, Milly returned to competition in 2021, winning a gold medal in the junior division and earning promotion to the South Australian state senior team, where she helped secure a bronze medal. Her progress caught the attention of national selectors, and in 2022, Milly was added to the Aussie Belles, Australia’s senior national Goalball squad. Later that year, aged just 14, she represented her country at the World Championships in Porto, Portugal, scoring her first international goal against Egypt.

In 2023, Milly travelled to São Paulo, Brazil, to compete in the Youth World Championships, where she claimed silver after a hard-fought final against Türkiye. Domestically, she also took first place at the NSW State Championships and second at the AGC senior division.

That same year, Milly began exploring other sports and took up blind cricket. Her natural talent with the bat led to her selection in the first-ever Australian Women’s Blind and Low Vision (BLV) Cricket Team, representing Australia at the International Blind Sports Federation (IBSA) World Games in Birmingham, England. She earned her Baggy Green (No. 13) against England and went on to play in the final at Edgbaston Stadium, narrowly losing to India.

However, Milly's return home was met with unexpected difficulty. She struggled to recover from the overseas trip, and after becoming increasingly fatigued—culminating in being sent home from a Year 10 Camp—she was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML).

In November 2023, she began treatment at the Women’s and Children’s Hospital in Adelaide. Despite being given a small chance of recovery, Milly faced her diagnosis and numerous rounds of chemotherapy with remarkable courage. After several setbacks, she successfully

underwent a stem cell transplant at Randwick Children's Hospital in Sydney.

Her resilience paid off. By October 2024, Milly recommenced her Year 11 studies, completing all assessable work with the support of Concordia College and the Hospital School. She returned to full-time learning in Year 12 in 2025, now supported by her Guide Dog, Bixby—a loyal companion who has brought her renewed confidence, mobility and comfort.

At the start of 2025, Milly returned to training and added another sport to her repertoire: blind tennis. She steadily rebuilt her strength and was once again selected to represent Australia, this time in a T20 blind cricket series against Pakistan in April. Her year continued with a runner-up finish at the NSW BLV Tennis Championships, a doubles victory at the National Tennis Championships, and a silver medal at the AGC's held in Sydney.

Milly is now back training with the Aussie Belles, preparing for the next Goalball World Championships in her pursuit of qualification for the Los Angeles 2028 Paralympic Games.

She will also complete her Year 12 studies this year, and immediately following her final exam, she will travel to India and Sri Lanka to represent Australia at the inaugural Women's Blind and Low Vision T20 Cricket World Cup.

Milly is a shining example of what can be achieved through perseverance, courage and unrelenting determination. She has turned adversity into triumph, and her journey continues to inspire all who meet her. She is not only an elite athlete but also a role model, proving that challenges can be faced and overcome, with strength and resilience.

We are so proud of you Milly.

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School TV New Topic: Substance Use and Addiction

Substance use and addiction are complex issues that can affect young people in many

different ways. While some may experiment out of curiosity or peer influence, others may use substances as a way to manage stress, anxiety or emotional pain. What may begin as occasional use can sometimes become a pattern that impacts mood, motivation and wellbeing. The developing teenage brain is particularly vulnerable to the effects of alcohol, vaping and drugs, making early use more likely to lead to harm.

For many families, understanding substance use means looking beyond the behaviour to what might be driving it. Risk-taking is a normal part of adolescence, but for some young people, it can also be a signal that they are struggling to cope. Substances can offer temporary relief, but they can also mask underlying issues such as loneliness, low self-esteem or poor mental health. When left unrecognised or unsupported, substance use can interfere with school performance, relationships and emotional development, leading to more serious challenges later in life.

This edition of SchoolTV guides families to help young people develop resilience, self-awareness and the skills to make healthy, informed choices that protect their wellbeing into adulthood.

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SA Secondary Schools Constitutional Convention

Charlotte 11RGOG, Elise 11AMOF and Sherry 11RAMO were invited to attend the State Secondary Schools Constitutional Convention. The day started with a student activity which gave the opportunity to interact with students from other schools to discuss and debate the Australian Constitution, namely '*Should the Australian Constitution be easier to change*'. This activity was chaired by Dr Joe McIntrye, University of South Australia, and Cornelia Koch, University of Adelaide.

There was a diverse range of Legal Studies students involved, which allowed for differing perspectives from the young people of Adelaide on the Constitution, and some improvements that could be made.

The proceedings of the day included guest speakers. First, The Hon. Blair Boyer MP, Minister for Education, Training and Skills, then speaking on 'The Australian Constitution and our History of Change', Dr Joe McIntrye from the University of South Australia. 'Different models of Constitutional change' followed, by Cornelia Koch, University of Adelaide. All speakers have worked extensively in constitutional law, making for very informative talks that helped influence debate.

The 2025 South Australian Constitutional Convention is an enjoyable experience, held in Parliament House. An interesting part of the day was the question time. The students had the opportunity to ask questions regarding the topic of the day or questions about what it's like to be a member of parliament.

The debate section of the Constitutional Convention was what everyone was looking forward to all day. Students gathered in the House of Assembly and sat according to their views on the issue. It was interesting to see people from all different backgrounds, schools and areas' opinions and reasoning on the same issue. It also gave students an insider's perspective on the processes used to make changes to our constitution.

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Year 9 Community Project Intensive Week

The Community Project is the culminating activity for students in the Middle Years Programme (MYP) and focuses on service-learning through action. The Intensive Week provided students with a range of activities to help them begin their planning for their action that will be completed throughout Term 4 during Christian Studies lessons.

Service is a core value in Lutheran education, reflecting the belief that faith is lived out through loving action. At Concordia, students are encouraged to serve others as a way of expressing compassion, humility and responsibility; values rooted in the teachings of Jesus. Galatians 5:13 says, "*Serve one another humbly in love*". Through service, students not only grow in character but also contribute meaningfully to their communities.

The first day involved students exploring and understanding the different types of service-learning and brainstorming different ways they can support their communities. On Tuesday and Wednesday, students spent two days exploring the Adelaide CBD and experiencing a range of different actions that serve the community. The students were lucky enough to have volunteers from Green Adelaide lead them through a range of volunteering activities that are undertaken at Victoria Park/Pakapakanthi wetlands and Miyawaki (tiny forest) planting; they also heard from The Adelaide Fringe Festival about accessibility and inclusion; Pastor Fraser Pearce from Bethlehem Lutheran Church spoke about the role of church communities, and students completed a range of other activities, such as the Kaurua Trail and Rundle Mall audit of service action, which were designed to allow students to build their independence.

The students will complete their action throughout Term 4, with an opportunity to exhibit their learning later this term for parents and friends to see.
