From the Director of Learning and Wellbeing

Term 4 is a personal favourite of mine. It is alive with celebrations of learning, whether that be from the year just gone, or—in the case of our Year 6 and Year 12 students—a celebration of many years of learning coming to a meaningful end.

Over the coming weeks, your Concordia app will light up with invitations to come onsite and share in these moments. You may find yourself wondering (especially when the timing collides with something else in your calendar) why we invest so much time and energy into these events. The answer is that these are far more than just opportunities to see what your child has been doing.

Research from the Education Endowment Foundation shows that a child's academic success is strongly linked to the level of parental engagement in their learning. So much so that it ranks as the second greatest-influence on learning outcomes (second only to high-quality teaching). The Australian Education Research Organisation research goes further, showing that when

families engage, not only does a student's academic performance increase, but they also develop more positive dispositions and behaviours towards learning.

Our College Wellbeing Model helps explain why. Family engagement provides psychological resourcing, helping to support motivation and provide encouragement and a sense of support. It also provides academic resourcing, as the additional conversations and questioning that take place enrich learning and provide additional cognitive scaffolding for supporting the understanding of complex ideas.

Here are some events for your calendars that we are looking forward to seeing you at:

- MADD Festival occurs this Friday 7 November (4.30–7.00pm) at the St John's Campus, featuring an Art Exhibition and Year 3–6 performances in Wirrkuta Trukku—a brilliant window into learning across Music, Art, Dance and Drama.
- Launchpad occurs on Tuesday 18 November (3.30–5.30pm), showcasing learning from all learning areas on the Concordia Campus as well as the Primary School campuses. Following on from this will be the St John's Campus Year 6 PYP Exhibition (5.45–7.15pm), which will allow families with primary and secondary children to celebrate their learning on the same evening.

On the Concordia Campus, Learning Conversations provide an opportunity to speak with your child's teachers about their progress. We are currently seeking feedback on how these are conducted, in readiness for 2026. We would appreciate if you could take the time to <u>respond</u> to an online survey to help with our planning.

Youth Governor's Leadership Foundation Program 2025

This year, **Annabelle (10BWHA)** has taken part in the Youth Governor's Leadership Foundation Program, working with three other students from independent schools in Adelaide to take action aligned to one of the United Nations' Global Development Goals.

We recently asked Annabelle about her experience as a participant in 2025.

What is the Youth Governor's Leadership Foundation Program, and what has it involved for you?

The Youth Governor's Leadership Foundation Program, otherwise known as YGLF, is a program based on teaching young leaders about what it means to teach and what it means to be a leader of today. We have learnt about who we are, when to lead and when to follow. We have learnt how to run meetings, when to step back, and have focused on how to improve or be more productive or less stressed through games, activities and workshops.

The program allowed us to understand why we want to lead and to understand who we lead, otherwise there is no connection between you and your peers.

One Wednesday every month, as a group, all 19 students from around SA would go to the University of South Australia to have workshops on leadership. We would learn different topics on leadership, how to get a message across, presenting ... and how to implement our leadership frameworks into action. Our project was to go to younger Primary School students and educate them about gender equality and how important it is today.

So, that's exactly what we did, we reached out to primary schools, focusing on the future generations, and sent out surveys to find out what they already know. We then made a presentation and an interactive workshop, going to four different Primary Schools around Adelaide.

To finish off the program, we had a graduation on Tuesday 21 October. This included us sharing about our journeys, what we have learnt and what we have overcome throughout the year. Our groups had the pleasure to present to family, friends, sponsors of the program, the Governor and many more people.

How did you become involved in the program in 2025?

I became involved in the program through a Year 11, **Claire (11RAMO)**, who did the program last year and then spoke to my year level. Claire spoke so well, and I was really inspired by her confidence to lead. So, I decided to apply to the program, and I got in.

What did you and your peers involved in the program hope to achieve through your work?

Before the program, we had to apply and choose two United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, which then later turned into our action groups. From there, I was assigned with three other girls to learn more about gender equality and reduced inequities.

We mainly focused on gender equality and from there we found how we wanted to make a change in our community. We came up with our vision and mission of the world we want to see and what we want to achieve.

As a group we decided that we didn't want to only raise awareness but take action, by going to the next generation and making sure that they truly understand the importance of gender equality and that when they grow up nothing should stop them from reaching their full potential.

What are the top one or two things you have you have learnt or valued most from your involvement in the program (key takeaways)?

I have learnt to look at different perspectives. If you want to make change you must look at the positives and negatives, considering all angles. For example, it is not just girls being impacted by gender distribution, but it is also other genders.

Through the YGLF, I have learnt to be open about others' ideas and not only take them into thought but take the jump and take them into action.

Lastly, another key takeaway would be communication. Communication is all about staying in contact, making sure everyone around understands the circumstances and it isn't just about talking at someone, it's talking with them. Sometimes the best way to communicate is to listen, letting someone else take control so that you can hear what they have to say. 'Always keep on communicating so that you can keep on growing.'

What advice would you give to students aspiring to become involved in leadership opportunities or student advocacy?

Take the chance. When you take a risk, you are showing your vulnerability but also your brave heart. It is ok to fall or make a mistake, but it is all about getting back up. Take all the opportunities that are given to you because you are blessed to have a life where such amazing opportunities are given.

Well done, Annabelle, on your involvement in this important leadership development program. We trust the skills you have learnt will be of benefit to you and a blessing to those you lead in the years to come.

Celebrating Reformation Day at St Peters Campus

On Thursday, our school community gathered during Chapel to celebrate Reformation Day, a special time to reflect on the history of the Christian faith and the values we hold dear.

The Reception and Pastor Andrew led us in a meaningful service, sharing the story of Martin Luther, a key figure in the Reformation. He reminded us that Luther stood firm in his belief that God's grace is freely given to all, not earned through deeds, and that God's love is a refuge for everyone. Even when faced with great opposition, Luther trusted in the truth of Scripture—including the powerful promise in Psalm 46:1, that "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble." This verse reminded us that just as Luther found courage in God's unwavering presence, we too can find strength and comfort in our faith.

In the Reception classroom, we have been exploring how people communicate and live out their beliefs and values. As part of our Reformation Day reflections, the children talked about the values they hold as true and important. Each child drew a picture of a belief that matters to them and explained why it is special. Their ideas were thoughtful and heartfelt, showing how even our youngest learners are beginning to understand and express their faith:

"I believe it is important to mend a broken heart because I don't want people to feel sad."

"I believe it is important to help someone when they are hurt so they can get better and are happy."

"I believe family is important because I love them so much."

- "I believe it is important to give presents because it shows I love them."
- "I believe church is important so we can learn about Jesus."
- "I believe Jesus is important because he sacrificed his life for us."
- "I believe it is important to pray to God, help someone up, love each other and to share."
- "I believe it is important to remember God and love each other because it helps them feel loved."
- "I believe it is important to share toys and to fix a heart because when it is hurt, we can put it back together with kindness."
- "I believe it is important to help a friend up because they are hurt."
- "I believe it is important to help people when they have a broken heart."
- "I think it is important that everyone can go into the church because it is kind."
- "I believe it is important to have the same amount of money (share) so they feel happy and safe."
- "I believe it is important to help a friend up because they are hurt."

Future Caretakers at the Fullarton Park Community Centre

Future Caretakers, supported by Unley Council, is a series of youth-focused forums exploring major megatrends—significant global shifts expected to shape the coming decades, which today's young people will inherit and need to act on.

The event was held on Thursday 30 November, with 110 Year 10 and 11 students from five local schools being represented: Walford Anglican School for Girls, Unley High School, Glenunga International High School, Cabra Dominican College, and Concordia College, with 16 of our Year 10 students in attendance.

Students selected from topics including Health Care and Wellbeing, Housing and Lifestyle, Social Connection and Loneliness, and Global Power and Economics. The day was facilitated with great energy by a team from SA Futures Agency.

Participants were confronted with challenging statistics such as one in six Australian children live in poverty, and nearly a quarter of Australia's homeless population are children. Throughout the forum, students were encouraged to imagine South Australia's future and consider how we might build the capabilities, communities and cultures needed to thrive in a rapidly changing world.
