# From the College Chaplain

I love the drive down from the hills into Highgate at this time of year. As December nears, our streets and gardens become a haze of glorious soft purple as the Jacaranda trees release their delicate blossoms. Soon after, Agapanthus flowers, with their crowns of violet petals appear all over. This vibrant purple heralds a long-awaited South Australian summer.

Purple is a significant colour for Christians at this time of year too. Purple is the colour of the season of Advent—the four-week time of preparation for Christmas. Purple for Advent is well chosen. In the ancient world it was the colour of royalty; rare, expensive, reserved for kings. When the church clothes its altars and candles in purple during Advent, it is making a bold declaration: the King is coming! Not a political ruler, not a temporary leader, but the true King—Jesus, the promised Messiah.

As the trees make their announcement of Summer's arrival, Advent also offers a spiritual announcement: prepare your hearts—Jesus the King is near.

The people of Israel waited centuries for this King. They clung to God's promises through exile,

oppression, silence and longing. Prophets like Isaiah spoke hope into their weary hearts: "A king will reign in righteousness... a child will be born... and he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6-7)

Their waiting was not empty, and neither is ours. In Jesus, their hopes and ours burst into bloom. He comes with everything our hearts hunger for; hope, peace, joy and love.

As we see the floral purples emerge, creation itself seems to join the church's quiet whisper: "Get ready. The King is coming." Advent invites us to slow down, to look for the signs of God at work, and to prepare room in our own lives for Christ once again.

May this Advent season draw our eyes to the purple signs of hope around us—the blossoms, the candles, the Scriptures and the promises. May they lead us again to the feet of the One who comes as King—Jesus, the Saviour, the Prince of Peace.

# SchoolTV Special Report: New Social Media Regulations: What you need to know

From Wednesday 10 December 2025, new laws will take effect in Australia to protect young people online by restricting access to social media for those under the age of 16. This important change reflects growing community concern about the impact of early social media use on children's mental health, wellbeing and development.

Research shows that social media can expose children to unrealistic comparisons, online pressure and harmful content long before they are emotionally ready to manage it. While regulation is a positive step forward, real safety begins at home. Families continue to play the most powerful role in helping children build confidence, resilience and awareness in the digital world.

These new regulations provide an opportunity to talk openly with your child about their online experiences and what these changes mean for them. It's also a chance to review family technology habits, reinforce healthy routines, and explore age-appropriate ways for young people to connect, learn and express themselves.

This Special Report explains what the new laws mean in practice and offers practical guidance to help families prepare for the upcoming changes.

# Year 7 Food Design Students Support OzHarvest Through Sustainable Cooking

Year 7 Food Design students have recently completed an inspiring project focused on

sustainability, food production and community support. As part of their learning, students designed a sustainable food product suitable for donation to an OzHarvest food distribution supermarket. Throughout the project, they were challenged to think critically about the environmental impact of their ingredients and cooking processes.

Students examined the packaging of their chosen ingredients, considering how different materials contribute to waste and how more environmentally friendly alternatives can be selected. They also researched the distance their ingredients needed to travel, aiming to reduce food miles and support more local, seasonal produce. Understanding seasonality helped students identify which ingredients grow best at particular times of year, and how choosing in-season foods can lower environmental impact.

As part of their practical skills development, students explored the resource demands of popular proteins such as beef and chicken, recognising the significance of choosing more sustainable options. They also experimented with fresh pasta making—rolling dough, forming ravioli or slicing sheets into fettuccine—before assembling pre-packaged pasta meals ready for donation.

OzHarvest expressed their sincere gratitude for the students' contribution. The pasta meals were distributed immediately through their Hindmarsh food distribution centre, making an instant and meaningful difference to community members in need.

Alongside cooking, students learned strategies to manage food preparation waste more efficiently, including how to reduce vegetable scraps and how careful planning of ingredient quantities can minimise excess.

This project not only strengthened students' practical cooking skills but also deepened their understanding of sustainability and the positive impact their choices can have on the wider community.

# SchoolTV Special Report: Embracing Change and New Beginnings

Change is a natural part of growing up. Whether it's the start of a new school year, moving between year levels or stepping beyond the school gates for the final time, each transition brings a mix of emotions, presenting both opportunities and challenges. These shifts call on young people to adjust to new routines, navigate unfamiliar environments and develop emotional flexibility. While some may embrace these changes, others may find the disruption unsettling and struggle with the loss of predictability.

Research shows that periods of transition are often linked to heightened anxiety, reduced academic engagement and changes in peer relationships. For families, these periods can also bring added stress. Recognising the emotional and psychological impact of change helps us respond more effectively and supportively.

While change can feel daunting, it also offers valuable opportunities for young people to learn and grow. By normalising uncertainty and encouraging open conversations, we help young people face new beginnings with curiosity rather than fear. When children are surrounded by guidance, encouragement and consistent structure, they're far better equipped to manage life's transitions with confidence and resilience.

## **Year 9 German Students Visit Hahndorf**

Over two days in Week 4, the Year 9 German students travelled to Hahndorf as part of our unit on Prussian/German Immigration to South Australia. In groups we explored Rodert's Farm and were shown original buildings and tools that Prussian settlers had used all the way back in 1839. We learned about some of their customs and traditions, including that animal bones were placed in between the stones of walls to help strengthen and insulate the buildings, and that pear trees were planted near wells in the belief that they would sweeten and purify the water.

The Hahndorf Academy had much information about how life was for these early settlers, including their gruelling journey by ship; their interactions with the local Indigenous population; and the challenges of establishing housing, farming, schooling and sources of income.

While exploring the area we saw that there is evidence of a rich history spread all through Hahndorf. We also learnt that taking the time to look for and read about it can teach us many lessons about hard work, perseverance, and in some cases our own roots.

Although the weather was not always kind to us, eating a pile of Berliner, Streusel and Bienenstich buns did wonders to keep up energy levels, and allowed us to enjoy a sweeter side of German heritage!
