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Informatics School of Excellence

During the summer holidays, I had the privilege of attending the Informatics School of Excellence, representing my College and state. I'm really thankful to Concordia College for supporting and encouraging me to participate in the Australian Informatics Olympiad (AIO), which serves as the selection competition for this program. Through the AIO, I was honoured to receive a gold award and to be recognised as 'Best in Year 9' in South Australia. These are some achievements that I could only have dreamed of without the support from the College. I would also like to give a special thanks to Mr McCusker, Mr Nicola, Mrs Rieger, Mr Egan and Mr Smart for their guidance and motivation throughout this journey.

The Informatics School of Excellence is a nine-day intensive program for high-achieving students, bringing together passionate individuals from across Australia to develop advanced skills in computer science, problem-solving and competitive programming. During the program, tutors from Australian Maths Trust (AMT) introduced us to a range of algorithmic concepts, such as dynamic programming, graph theory, and techniques to optimise code for greater efficiency. The training was intensive and challenging, but it was also extremely beneficial. It made me think more logically, write code more efficiently and with better conventions, and become more persistent when dealing with complex problems.

Beyond the skills I gained, the experience itself was truly memorable. The flight, accommodation, and meals were all well-organised, which made the camp comfortable and enjoyable. Being surrounded by some of the most talented informatics students in Australia built my confidence and motivated me to push my limits and excel further. I have also developed my ability to stay calm and think analytically under time pressure. These are all qualities that will serve me well in my future competitions and studies.

This experience has strengthened my passion for informatics and competitive programming and encouraged me to continue striving for excellence. I am extremely grateful for the support from my school and the opportunity to participate in this program. I look forward to applying the skills, techniques and mindset that I developed during the camp in future competitions and academic pursuits.

I hope that by sharing this experience, more students will feel encouraged to step outside of their comfort zones and pursue opportunities in fields that they are passionate about—whether it's computer science, mathematics, sport, public speaking, science or the arts. 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School Immunisation Program for Year 7 and Year 10

Together with SA Health, the School Immunisation Program will be offered at Concordia College by Eastern Health Authority (EHA) in 2026.

All **Year 7** students will be offered:

- one dose of the human papillomavirus vaccine, Gardasil®9
- one dose of the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine, Boostrix®

The **Year 7 immunisations will occur on Monday 1 June.**

All **Year 10** students will be offered:

- two doses of the meningococcal B vaccine, Bexsero® at two separate visits (8 weeks apart)
- one dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine, Nimenrix®

The **Year 10 Immunisations will occur on Friday 15 May (first visit) and Friday 14 August (second and final visit).**

Immunisation consent packs have been sent home with all Year 7 and 10 students. It is important that you read the information contained in the packs before you give consent for your child to be vaccinated at school.

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SchoolTV Special Report: Talking About Bushfires

Events such as bushfires can be distressing for children and young people, even when they are not directly affected. Ongoing media coverage, changes within communities and conversations about loss or danger can influence how children understand safety and uncertainty. While some children may appear largely unaffected, others may experience worry, confusion or changes in behaviour as they try to make sense of what they are seeing and hearing.

Research shows that large-scale disasters can have emotional effects that extend beyond the immediate event, with responses varying depending on age, temperament and level of exposure. For families, this can raise questions about how much information to share, how to reassure children effectively and how to recognise when additional support may be needed.

By providing clear, age-appropriate information, maintaining routines and encouraging open conversations, parents can help children feel supported and secure during uncertain times.
