Last week, Year 11 Visual Art students visited Light Square Gallery, where they were inspired by exceptional Stage 2 Visual Arts work showcased in the 2026 SACE Art Show, with its diverse, high-quality artworks.

The exhibition featured a range of media, including sculpture, painting and digital works, highlighting strong conceptual exploration and high-level skills from 2025 graduates.

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Experiencing the Full-cycle of Inquiry in German

As a teacher, it is always rewarding to see inquiry come to life in the classroom. I would like to share Maya's fantastic inquiry journey, which highlights curiosity, persistence and a love of learning.

Maya's inquiry began in Term 3 last year during her German lesson when Year 2 students were learning family members using German language. While watching an episode of Bluey in German, the class noticed something unexpected: instead of "Mama und Papa," the characters used the English words "Mum and Dad." This sparked an authentic inquiry question—why were English words being used in a German kids' show?

Demonstrating remarkable independence, Maya wrote a letter to the Bluey TV team in Germany. She visited our Concordia Campus for some assistance to send it all the way to Germany. After patiently waiting, she received a reply just before Christmas explaining that the wording followed the books. This response led Maya to deepen her inquiry further, prompting her to write again—this time to the Bluey Book team.

Maya's persistence in her inquiry paid off. Recently, she received a reply confirming that the English terms were intentionally kept, to reflect Bluey's Australian identity. Through this process, Maya experienced the full cycle of inquiry—questioning, investigating and finding

meaningful answers.

Maya's experience highlights the power of inquiry-based learning, resilience and authentic communication. We are incredibly proud of her dedication and enthusiasm.

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Year 11 and 12 Physics at Adelaide University, Mawson Lakes

Recently, our Year 11 and 12 Physics students visited Adelaide University's Mawson Lakes Campus to take part in a range of experiments in a tertiary science setting. Read on to find out more about their experiences!

Year 11

Year 11 Physics students recently visited the Mawson Lakes campus of Adelaide University, where they explored real-world applications of physics through hands-on activities in radar technology and nuclear physics.

During the visit, students collected and analysed data to calculate the speed of sound and measure the speed of moving objects using radar. They also investigated nuclear physics concepts, including determining the half-life of a radioactive substance and exploring beta and gamma radiation.

The day sparked engaging discussions, from the surprising radioactivity of everyday items like bananas to how human hearing changes with age. The data gathered will support students in

their upcoming assessments, where they will demonstrate their skills in analysing results and evaluating scientific methods.

The excursion also provided a valuable opportunity for students to experience a university campus environment and consider future study pathways.

Have you ever played air hockey? Do you remember those smooth round 'pucks' that hover above a table with 100s of tiny holes? Year 12 Physics students recently took up the challenge of analysing collisions on an air hockey table at Adelaide University, Mawson Lakes. Using video capture, students measured the motion of air hockey pucks on a 2D table. The almost frictionless motion enabled students to verify if momentum is conserved (or not). The visit to the Adelaide University campus also provided an opportunity to engage with an 'out-of-this-world' experience in the Planetarium.

German Exchange

Each year, Senior School German students from Concordia College have the opportunity to take part in a two-month exchange with Bavaria, in Southern Germany. For parents and carers, this can feel overwhelming and complex. However, awareness is a powerful first step. By understanding the signs, keeping communication open

and knowing where to seek support, families can play a crucial role in protecting young people and breaking the cycle of harm.

This Special Report provides practical guidance to help families recognise warning signs, understand the impact on children and identify pathways to support. By working together, we can create safe, respectful environments where young people feel protected, heard and supported.
