From the St Peters Campus Principal

When we think about leadership in schools, it is easy to picture student leaders wearing badges, speaking at assemblies or leading special events. While these moments are important and worth celebrating, I believe leadership begins long before a student is ever given a title.

At Concordia College, some of the best examples of leadership are often found in the quieter moments of the school day. It might be the student who notices someone sitting alone and invites them into a game, the child who encourages a friend who is finding learning difficult, or the student who has the courage to keep trying even when something feels challenging. Leadership can look like kindness, resilience, honesty, empathy and the ability to positively influence those around us.

As adults, we sometimes underestimate just how much children notice and absorb from the world around them. They are constantly learning what it means to treat others with respect, how to navigate disappointment, how to work as part of a team and how to respond when things do not go to plan. These are the moments that shape character, and character is at the heart of leadership.

One of the things I love most about working in a school setting is seeing students grow into themselves over time. A child who once lacked confidence suddenly volunteers to share an idea in class. A student who found friendships difficult begins encouraging others on the playground. These moments may seem small, but they are incredibly significant. Growth in leadership often happens gradually and quietly before we see it publicly.

In education, particularly in the primary years, our role is not just to teach students academically. It is also to help them develop the confidence, compassion and courage they need to navigate life beyond the classroom. Through learning experiences, relationships, co-curricular opportunities and everyday conversations, we are helping students understand that leadership is not about being the loudest voice or always standing at the front. Real leadership is about service, integrity and the way we make others feel.

At Concordia College, we want every student to know they have the ability to lead in their own way. For some students, that leadership may be visible on a stage, sporting field or at an assembly. For others, it may be shown through quiet encouragement, persistence or simply doing the right thing each day. All forms of leadership matter, and all deserve to be recognised.

The world our young people are growing up in will continue to change rapidly, but qualities such as kindness, empathy, resilience and integrity will always matter. If we can help our students develop these qualities now, then we are not just preparing future leaders—we are helping shape good people.

First Place Nationally and other Outstanding Success at Generations in Jazz

Recently, 71 Concordia Music students and seven staff travelled to Mount Gambier for the annual Generations in Jazz festival—joining more than 5,000 students from across Australia for an unforgettable three days of music, performance and competition.

Despite facing every kind of weather imaginable—hot, dusty, wet, windy and cold—our students showed incredible resilience, dedication and team spirit throughout the entire event. With packed schedules, very little downtime, and accommodation on air beds at the Mount Gambier Racecourse, the weekend was demanding from start to finish. Competition day alone involved more than 14 hours of walking between venues, yet our students remained motivated, focused and endlessly supportive of one another.

Their outstanding results are a testament to the hard work, commitment, and passion.

Year 10 School Immunisation Program - First Visit Reminder for Friday 15 May

The SA 2026 School Immunisation Program will be delivered by Eastern Health Authority on **Friday 15 May 2026 (first visit)**.

All Year 10 students will be offered:

- 2 doses of the meningococcal B vaccine at 2 separate visits (8 Weeks apart)
- 1 dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine

Immunisation Consent packs have been provided to all Year 10 students at the commencement of the school year, including information about the vaccines on offer. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack, please contact the school office direct so this pack can be provided to you.

We would encourage all parents/appointed legal guardians to read the information supplied in the packs before providing consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. Additional, further information and videos are available [online \(click to view\)](#) if required.

If you have provided consent to participate in the immunisation program and information has changed, in particular in relation to your child's medical condition or if you wish to withdraw consent, please directly notify your school immunisation provider (Eastern Health Authority) as soon as possible prior to the date of immunisation.

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- encourage your child eat prior to the immunisations and drink plenty of water throughout the day; and
- wear sports uniform to allow for easy access to the upper arm.

St Peters Campus Year 1–3 Sustainability Market

Our Year 1, 2 and 3 students proudly led a vibrant sustainability market as part of our Belonging and Contributing inquiry unit. After investigating practical ways to help our community live more sustainably, students designed a market that put their learning into action.

They collected clothing donations and pre-loved books to resell, giving everyday items a second life. Students also dried citrus fruits from our school trees and their homes, sold seedlings and plants they had nurtured, and created beautiful watercolour cards. Our school chickens contributed too, with fresh eggs available for purchase. Families enjoyed homemade cakes and cookies, and students packaged seeds chosen to attract bees and butterflies into local gardens.

This hands-on project also connected directly to our learning in financial mathematics, giving students real-world experience in handling money, calculating change and understanding value.

Thanks to the generosity of our community, the funds raised will support the purchase of a food dehydrator and new trees for our school orchard, helping us continue to grow a sustainable future together.

Crochet Club is Back in the Library

Did you know that crochet is over 5,000 years old or that it is one of the only arts that cannot be replicated by a machine?

The Library Crochet Club is returning for Terms 2 and 3, creating a welcoming space where beginners can learn and practise a new skill, and experienced crocheters can come for advice or to work on a project they already have. All yarn and hooks are provided, and we have a variety of patterns available for students to use.

Crochet is not only fun, but also good for you. Learning a skill that requires hand-eye coordination, pattern reading and memory has a number of benefits for the brain. These are some of the benefits (Houtman, 2017) (Burns & Der Meer, 2021):

- Crocheting can reduce stress and anxiety because the rhythmic, repetitive motion helps calm the nervous system
- Crochet supports mindfulness by keeping attention on the present moment, which can interrupt rumination and mental overload
- Crochet can contribute to cognitive reserve by challenging the brain with a learned skill and repeated practice
- Crochet may improve mood and help with low feelings by creating a sense of accomplishment
- Crochet gives the brain a structured motor-and-cognitive workout, since you have to coordinate hand movements, follow patterns and track stitch sequences.

This year, Crochet Club has a theme: Scarves! Scarves are an easy way to practise a variety of stitches, from basic to advanced. They are also very quick to make, leaving you with a cool new piece of clothing for winter and the feeling of satisfaction that comes from making something with your hands. Students are also welcome to let their inspiration take the lead and try something else from the variety of patterns we have available in the Library Makerspace.

Crochet Club will run during Terms 2 and 3 in the Concordia Campus Yangadlitya Library on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at lunchtime. Everyone who is interested is welcome. For more information, please [contact me](#).

Australian Lutheran World Service Walk My Way

Australian Lutheran World Service’s (ALWS) Walk My Way is an event Concordia has been involved in for many years. This year we planned two major walks during the last week of Term 1 to raise money for the work of ALWS, especially to help send refugee children to school in East Africa—this year with a focus on girls.

Then came the rain...

Sadly, we had to postpone our Concordia Campus walk in the Adelaide Hills until Term 2, which was a disappointing result for our 25 Year 7–12 students who had volunteered to walk from Balhannah to Lobethal.

The previous day was planned to be a combined Primary School walkathon day where all students were to walk together at St John’s Campus or through the Waite Arboretum at Urrbrae. The threat of rain caused St Peters Campus to stay put at Blackwood and we forfeited our walk to the Arboretum. Unperturbed, both campuses made alternative plans to ensure the walks were completed. At St Peters Campus, before the heavens opened, students walked around the adjoining Blackwood footy oval. Meanwhile, at St John’s Campus our younger students did many laps of the College oval and the older students did 1.3km laps around the adjacent suburban streets.

While raising money is an important part of this event, creating awareness for the plight of refugee children is critical. Students were able to engage in fun learning activities led by our teachers and staff from ALWS as well as hearing a talk about how the money we raise makes such a big difference to many young lives. We even had a small lunch of a handful of rice to

remind students of the meagre amount of food many of these young people must live on (thanks to members of St John's Lutheran Church and Principal Ali at St Peters Campus for cooking the rice).

At the time of writing, we have raised over \$11,000 and hopefully this will grow when the Concordia Campus students complete their walk. On behalf of ALWS, we are so thankful to our whole Concordia community who have, once again, so generously donated to this important project.
