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## **From the Middle School Leader**

The afternoon chill of autumn is settling in across the mallee scrub at Swan Reach. There is tension, nervousness and an eerie silence in the air. The Year 9 students are packed into the bench seats of the purpose built truck like anxious sardines awaiting the unknown of their Solo Experience on The Adventure camp. They have their pre-prepared materials on their laps and look expectantly to the staff for some final words of wisdom before they reach their site. One by one they are dropped, swag and tarp in hand and farewelled by the group with raptures of clapping, whooping and best wishes for the night ahead. Possibly the first night they have spent on their own in a long time, potentially the first time ever.

When I think back to that experience from Term 2, I reflect on the learning that was happening for our young people in real time. I visibly saw it on their faces, their body language and the way they talked to each other. This one experience perfectly embodied our LearningWell pillars of students being Connected, Empowered and Challenged. In this instance the element of intentional challenge built deeper connection among the group as they faced the unknown together. The next morning you could tell they felt empowered as they survived and maybe even enjoyed the experience. LearningWell at Concordia doesn't just occur through Pastoral Care programs or year level camps, it occurs every day in each lesson activity, each break time conversation, each Chapel service, each music lesson, each sports practice and each passing in the quadrangle.

Ben Crowe in his recent book 'Where the Light Gets In' speaks about the perspective shift from 'fitting in' to 'belonging' in our search for connection. Connection is a human need that is arguably at its most emphasised in the teenage years where 'fitting in' and finding your group can seem to be all that matters. These formative years require intentionality in creating opportunities for connection, that often form around challenge and lead to young people feeling empowered. Steve Biddulph outlines in his 'Raising Boys' / 'Raising Girls' books that our young people are hardwired to seek out connection through challenge as they establish who they are and what they are capable of. This often happens as they are on the bridge of adolescence, the space between childhood and adulthood. A space that needs clear rites of passage to help our young people navigate growing up. If we as schools and parents are not intentional in that space of growing up, our young people often find their own rites of passage to test themselves and this can be unhealthy risk-taking behaviour, causing more harm than good.

I wonder what ways you as a family already foster healthy opportunities for your children to be Connected, Empowered and Challenged at home? I also wonder what other ways we could continue to develop those characteristics here at Concordia as we find opportunities to foster belonging through LearningWell.

Together, we strive to build a community that honours truth, values diversity and actively contributes to reconciliation in Australia.

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## **Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad 2026**

2026 is the fourth year Concordia has participated in the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO). This year's problem set has been described by the organising committee as 'one of the hardest in the history of the competition'. In 2026, we once again had 16 students take part, who worked together under time pressure to solve a range of language analysis problems. The four Concordia teams—comprising students from Years 9, 10 and 11—were amongst 2,448 students from 82 schools across Australia who participated in the first round of the competition. We commend all students involved, and are very excited to announce that two of our teams achieved Bronze and Silver, placing them in the top 50% and 25% nationally.

### **Rostrum Voice of Youth 2026 Success**

This year, seven talented students from Years 9–11 represented us at the annual Rostrum Voice of Youth public speaking competition. The competition demands confidence, creativity, strong communication skills and countless hours of preparation, making a place in the semifinals a testament to each student's dedication, resilience and public speaking talent.

Each Wednesday afternoon, as the final school bell echoes through the grounds of Concordia College at St John's Campus, a small group of students lace up their runners, shoulder their backpacks, and head for the hills. At 3:30 pm, the Trailblazers Run Club begins.

What started as a handful of eager runners has steadily grown over the past year into something far greater than a training group. Together, students from Years 4–6 leave behind the classrooms and step into the winding trails surrounding our community—breathing in fresh air, climbing hills, splashing through puddles after rain and discovering what they are capable of one stride at a time.

Most weeks, our runners explore the peaceful tracks of the Waite Arboretum or tackle the Waite Loop behind the university, where gum trees sway overhead and the dirt paths twist through the Adelaide hills. The runs are challenging enough to build endurance, yet welcoming enough that every child feels they belong.

That spirit of friendship and belonging has become the heartbeat of Trailblazers. This is not a group reserved only for the fastest runners. It is an inclusive space for all abilities—a place where encouragement matters more than pace, where older students support younger runners, and where friendships form naturally between students who may never have crossed paths during the school day. In a coeducational environment, the social connections built along the trails have been just as valuable as the kilometres covered.

For some students, Trailblazers has become a stepping stone into cross country and athletics competition. For others, it is simply an opportunity to move, improve fitness, challenge themselves and experience the joy that comes from running outdoors with friends. There is something quietly powerful about children choosing movement after a long day of learning, about tired legs finding strength on a steep hill, about hearing laughter echo through the trees, and about seeing confidence grow with every run completed. The Trailblazers Run Club continues to build not only stronger runners, but also resilient, connected and courageous young people.
