Reaching the Rostrum Voice of Youth State Final is an outstanding achievement and places a student among the very best young public speakers in South Australia. It reflects exceptional skill in speech writing, critical thinking, persuasive communication, and the confidence to excel through multiple highly competitive qualifying rounds. Keziah represented Concordia with distinction, demonstrating outstanding poise, eloquence and intellectual maturity. Congratulations to all the incredible young people who participated.

Brain Bee State Final

On Friday 24 July, seven Year 10 students represented us at the State Final of the Brain Bee Challenge at Flinders University. Our students collectively answered close to 18,000 questions about the brain and neurodegenerative diseases in the lead up to this event. What a mammoth effort! At the end of the individual round of testing, 50% of the top 10 students in South Australia were from Concordia. Our extraordinary team of Lyla, Lucy, Noah and Zoe competed in the Team Challenge, with two rigorous rounds of questioning. The day concluded with a series of fascinating presentations from PhD neuroscience students before the much-anticipated results were announced. We were delighted to learn that our students had achieved outstanding success.

Congratulations to our team who placed first in South Australia in the Team Challenge. In a very special moment, we also celebrated Lucy who placed second and Noah who placed first in South Australia in the individual challenge. Noah will now progress to the national final round. Congratulations to every student who participated. With neurons firing and neural pathways strengthening, these students have shown that great minds are built by embracing a challenge.

Oliphant Science Awards

A total of 17 students from Concordia's secondary campus (Years 7–12) have submitted entries into the 2026 Oliphant Science Awards, the largest science competition in South Australia. Formal judging of all entries will take place this week. On the weekend (8–9 August) there will be an Oliphant Science display of student work from across the state at Science Alive. This is an immersive event where visitors discover the science behind all aspects of our day-to-day lives. There will be a diverse range of exhibits and interactive displays to spark curiosity. 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Reminder: Year 10 Immunisation Program

Immunisation Information for Parents / Appointed Legal Guardians of Year 10 Students

The SA 2026 School Immunisation Program will be delivered by Eastern Health Authority on **Friday 14 August 2026** (2nd and final visit).

All Year 10 students will be offered:

- dose 2 of the meningococcal B vaccine

Immunisation Consent packs have been provided to all Year 10 students at the commencement of the school year, including information about the vaccines on offer. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack, please contact the school office direct so this pack can be provided to you.

We would encourage all parents/appointed legal guardians to read the information supplied in

the packs before providing consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. Additional, [further information and videos are available online \(click to view\)](#) if required.

If your child missed their first school immunisation visit and hasn't yet attended a catch-up clinic:

- The missed vaccines will be offered at the upcoming school visit.
- Following the immunisation, it is then recommended that you contact EHA to book an additional follow-up appointment on or after 8 weeks at one of our council clinics.

If you have provided consent to participate in the immunisation program and information has changed, in particular in relation to your child's medical condition or if you wish to withdraw consent, please directly notify your school immunisation provider (Eastern Health Authority) as soon as possible prior to the date of immunisation.

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- encourage your child to eat prior to the immunisations and drink plenty of water throughout the day; and
- wear sports uniform to allow for easy access to the upper arm.

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'The Tale of Frieda Keysser' Book Donation

Early this term, Concordia was honoured to receive a very kind donation of the three volumes of "The Tale of Frieda Keysser" by John Strethlow from Glen Auricht.

The books document the life and impact of Frieda Keysser, who was a pioneering Lutheran missionary. She travelled from Germany to the remote Hermannsburg Mission in Central Australia, where she devoted her life to supporting the Arrernte community. She learned the Arrernte language; worked closely with women and children to improve education, health and daily living; and contributed significantly to the mission's linguistic and cultural research. Through her practical leadership, writings and collaboration with her husband, Carl Strehlow,

she helped transform Hermannsburg into a thriving community while preserving an invaluable record of Arrernte culture and life.

In more recent times Glen Auricht has also made a significant contribution to the communities in and around the Finke River mission. During his time there he has learnt a number of First Nations Languages and has emphasised learning the culture of the First Nations people whilst sharing his skills and knowledge in building and construction. 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Supporting Your Year 12 Student Through Term 3
