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# From the Head of College

#### Commencing 2024 Together from ELC to Year 12

As we began the 2024 school year, it was incredible for staff and students across the College - from ELC to Year 12 - to be able to share in our first ever whole-of-College Commencement Service with three campuses present in our new Fortiter Gymnasium. Coming together as one College to commit the new year to God - and to introduce and pray for our Principals, new staff, returning staff and 2024 Student Leaders - was truly a special occasion and a perfect way to begin a new year of learning and collaboration. We look forward to more opportunities to connect as an entire College in the months and years ahead.

## Exciting Developments in the Middle and Senior School

We are delighted to share some significant enhancements to our educational offerings that underscore our commitment to providing a dynamic and forward-thinking learning environment. These changes, set to commence in 2025, are designed with our students' futures at heart, aiming to offer more personalised and flexible learning paths that cater to their individual interests and academic needs.



#### **Revitalised Curriculum Structure**

To further enrich our curriculum and respond to the evolving educational landscape, from 2025 Year 10 students will transition into the Senior School, beginning their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) journey a year earlier than the current model. This decision comes after a comprehensive review, which included valuable input from our families and an in-depth analysis of our curriculum. It is a strategic shift designed to enhance our students' learning experiences and it allows for the International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Programme (MYP) to be streamlined into a focused three-year program for Years 7-9.

The key benefits include:

- + Increased Personalisation: By Year 10, our students have a clearer understanding of their interests and strengths. This change will empower them to tailor their studies to their passions, enhancing engagement and satisfaction with their learning journey.
- Accelerated SACE Progress: Starting
   SACE in Year 10 offers our students a head
   start, enabling them to undertake Stage
   2 subjects in Year 11 and, consequently,
   providing them with more flexibility in their
   crucial final year of schooling.
- + Enhanced Academic Outcomes: It is anticipated that this restructured approach will improve our academic results and median ATAR, aligning Concordia's outcomes more closely with the topperforming schools in the region.
- + Optimised Learning Experience for Year 9:
  Modifying the MYP will enrich the Year 9
  curriculum as well, integrating personal
  and community projects more effectively
  with The Rite Journey and introducing new
  elective choices.

Furthermore, the redefinition of our Middle School (Years 7-9) and Senior School (Years 10-12) boundaries will not only expand the leadership opportunities available to our Year 9 students, but also balance the workload among our educational leaders more equitably, ensuring a focused, supportive learning environment for all students.

Incoming Director of Learning and Wellbeing, Mathew Disher, and Concordia Campus Principal, Penny McKenzie, will be implementing these exciting changes. This will reshape our Middle and Senior School timetable, leading to more exciting subject choices.

### Seventh Year 7 Stream

In response to the increasing demand for Year 7 enrolment opportunities and our commitment to accommodating the educational needs of our growing community, Concordia College is excited to announce the introduction of a seventh Year 7 stream starting in 2025. This addition is a testament to the trust and confidence placed in us by our community and reflects our strategic vision for the future of the College.

The decision, warmly received by our staff and approved by the Board, aims to allow more families to be a part of our vibrant learning community. Preparations are underway to ensure the smooth integration of this additional stream, with a keen focus on maintaining the high standards of education and support defining the Concordia experience.



As we look forward to these exciting developments, we remain committed to engaging with our staff, parents and the wider College community.

We extend our heartfelt thanks for your ongoing support and enthusiasm. Together, we are setting the stage for a future where every student can achieve their full potential, guided by our shared values and dedication to excellence.

More detailed information about these enhancements will be communicated with families in Term 2. We welcome feedback from our community as we continue on this exciting journey together.


all time! New life emerges from the darkness and hopelessness of death. Hope exists in a world of grief, despair and sadness. If that's not worth celebrating, nothing is.

## Celebrating Achievement

There have been many occasions on which to celebrate the achievements of our extraordinary students in recent months. Here are some highlights from the end of 2023.

#### **Oliphant Science Awards**

Students from Years 2 to 12 entered a diverse range of projects in the statewide Oliphant Science competition, achieving some outstanding results. Three Primary School entries received second prize in their categories: 'Bush Monopoly' (Games), 'The Science of Music' (Multimedia) and the 'Debris Separator' (Models and Inventions). High commendations were also awarded for 'All About Planes' and 'The Science of Baking' in the Multimedia category. In the Middle and Senior School, a number of prizes were awarded to Concordia students:

- + Two first prizes for Multimedia
- First prize for Programming, Apps and Robotics
- Two first prizes and a third prize for Science Writing

Finally, a particular highlight was the presentation of the University of Adelaide, Faculty of Science, Engineering and Technology: Sciences Prize 7-12 for the most outstanding entry highlighting the benefits of scientific research to the community. This was awarded to Luke (Year 11 in 2023) – a fantastic achievement!

#### **Loris Grote Nursing Scholarship**

The late Loris Grote attended Concordia College in 1949 and studied nursing after completing her final year. As part of a bequest to the school, Loris provided funding for a nursing scholarship to be offered each year to a student who undertakes to study a Bachelor of Nursing degree at Flinders University after completing Year 12 at Concordia College. The Scholarship provides 80% of the HECS fees for the first year of the course. We were pleased to present the 2024 Loris Grote Nursing Scholarship to **Tahlia Rosenberg** from the Class of 2023.

#### Class of 2023 Year 12 Results

After the final SACE examinations, we congratulated our Year 12 Class of 2023 on their hard work and dedication in their milestone year as graduating students at Concordia. Their efforts were rewarded with some excellent results:

- + College Dux, **Jasmine Chew**, obtained an ATAR of 99.3
- 46% of students achieved subjects in the 'A-Band'
- + 27% of students placed in the top 10% nationally, with an ATAR of 90 or above
- + 47 Merits were awarded across a diverse group of 16 subjects.

We are very proud of all that these students achieved and wish them well for their exciting futures.

# **Student Learning**

Connected. Empowered. Challenged.

It is not uncommon to see learning defined as outcomes such as knowledge and skills, but I would argue that these are products of learning, rather than learning itself. My favourite definition of learning is that it is a process that generates change through experience<sup>1</sup>. Viewing learning in this way means that extraordinary learning is more than just having access to information; extraordinary learning is driven by extraordinary experiences.

At Concordia, learning is more than just achieving nice grades and rankings; learning is also about young people being more connected, more empowered and more challenged. These three words haven't just been chosen because they make for a catchy slogan for a strategic plan. They have been chosen because they are the foundations of wellbeing, and learning and wellbeing have a symbiotic relationship.

Challenge is, unfortunately, often misunderstood as a negative concept for young people.

Attempts to support young people can sometimes be misguided when they involve removing challenges too quickly as they arise.

Without challenge, there is no growth. When we experience challenges, we are forced to change the way we think and behave. Challenge is how a young person discovers new and more effective ways of knowing and doing.

However, challenge in isolation will not result in extraordinary learning. Young people need to be empowered to embrace challenges through deliberate resourcing. 'Connectedness' is a key resource for young people that empowers them to embrace challenges. People who report a greater level of connectedness to the people they spend time with, and the places they spend time in, also report greater measures of wellbeing and are more likely to navigate challenges effectively. Throughout Term 1, educators have been focused on knowing every learner in their classrooms and facilitating connections between them.

This year, Concordia College will look to develop a *Wellbeing Model* to sit alongside the *Instructional Model*, to better facilitate extraordinary learning. The Wellbeing Model will enable a shared understanding of wellbeing for the College community, and it will guide educators to continue to create extraordinary experiences that connect, empower and challenge our learners.

## Catherine Obst Lutheran Schools Year 8 Public Speaking Award

Two of our Year 8 students competed in the 2023 Catherine Obst Lutheran Schools Year 8 Public Speaking Competition in November, tackling the topics of 'Global issues, local action' and 'Time travel tales – learning from the past to shape the future'. The students involved were commended by the adjudicators on a high standard of competition. In the end, Concordia claimed victory and we were presented with the perpetual shield – a wonderful achievement!

## **Year 9 STEM Enrichment** Conference

While attending the STEM Enrichment Conference held at Flinders University in October, a group of Year 9 girls heard from role models across various career stages and from several professional fields: medical, physics, applied chemistry and forensic science. Hands-on sessions enabled students to have a go at some 'green chemistry', making their own sap and plastic bottles from seaweed. Further sessions explored gravity, electroplating a keyring and the use of artificial intelligence (AI) in facial recognition. It was a great opportunity to network and consider their own future aspirations.

Our Year 7 students had a great time forming new friendships and strengthening existing ones during their year level camp to Victor Harbor early in Term 1. With amazing weather, the students had extraordinary fun engaging in aquatic activities, mountain bike riding, team-building games and the adrenalin-inducing Flying Kiwi high rope swing.









## Year 9 Concordia – The Rite Journey Calling and Departure Ceremony

Venturing to McElligott's Quarry Reserve at Mitcham for the first time, our Year 9 students - together with many parents and caregivers - gathered early in the morning for the Calling and Departure Ceremony on Friday 8 March. As the first formal ceremony within our Concordia – The Rite Journey program for 2024, this special occasion calls our young people toward adulthood, encouraging them to take increased responsibility and to build knowledge and competency needed for their lives as adults. Set on a hill with views over the city, the students and parents were met by Home Class teachers, each of whom shared a key character quality that will be essential for the students in their growth as young people.

While the Year 11 String Quartet played 'Amazing Grace', Year 9s shared gratitude letters with their parents, having reflected on their childhood. The Departure component of the morning represented, over the course of a three-hour hike, the challenges ahead and the qualities needed as students grow from adolescents into adults. Students had opportunities to show teamwork, leadership, grit, resilience, communication and perseverance across what was a rewarding morning for the year level. Lessons learned from this experience are designed to help students prepare for their Adventure Camp in Term 2.

## **Year 8 Drama Students** Perform at the ELC

Walking across the Oval to the ELC at St John's Campus, Year 8 Drama students developed their theatrical performance skills by engaging their audience of ELC children with interactive approaches, voice, costume and props. Meanwhile, the ELC students learned about audience etiquette as well as developing listening, comprehension, imagination and cooperation skills. This preparatory experience enabled the Year 8s to work on producing their own pieces of Theatre for Young People. The Drama Department is looking forward to continuing to foster this cross-campus connection.













## **Creating Electric Cars in** Year 8

Fostering scientific inquiry and promoting teamwork, critical thinking and problem-solving skills, an engaging Science task saw our Year 8 students constructing electric cars using motors, batteries and gears. Students then measured the effect that adding 50g masses had on the time taken to traverse a set distance. They learnt about the scientific process and how to conduct a fair test before using their communication skills to compile their findings in scientific reports - a wonderful example of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) learning in action.

# Senior School Highlights

## Back to Where it All Began

Prior to finishing their classes and completing final examinations, a group of students had the opportunity to head back to where it all began, visiting the St John's Campus ELC to meet some of their former teachers, see how the learning spaces have changed and interact with current ELC children. Having been part of the ELC in 2009/2010, and with the space being expanded and reopened last year as part of the St John's Campus redevelopment, it is fair to say a lot had changed since the Year 12s began in the ELC. Reminiscing with ELC Director Kate Wood and teacher Deborah Waters as well as viewing old photos from the archives brought back many memories - a wonderful full-circle reminder of all they have learnt and the fun they have had at Concordia College across their ELC to Year 12 journey.





### **Year 12 End-of-Year Events**

At the 2023 Valedictory Service in the College Chapel, staff, students, parents and caregivers celebrated the achievements and service of the Class of 2023. Pastor Dale Gosden shared a message from Matthew 5:13-16, "You are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world..." and Mr Rory Amoy spoke about how individuals taking small actions can effect change on a global scale. ### CARE@CC



# **Musical - CHICAGO: High School Edition**

Creating this production has been a great vehicle to discuss concepts of fame, celebrity and 'fake news' with this team of young people who have been born into an era of social media influencers and sensationalist news. Our interpretation of CHICAGO: High School Edition served as a warning that stardom at any cost can be very short-lived. It paid homage to the '20s era and the iconic Bob Fosse style while drawing from Epic Theatre to enhance the satirical commentary on the corruption in the iustice system, the 'media circus' and the concept of the 'celebrity criminal.'

A school musical is an experience students remember for the rest of their lives. It is also where they make lifelong friends, develop their craft as artists, build communication, ensemble and complex problem-solving skills, and achieve a true sense of belonging to something bigger than themselves.

This was particularly palpable in this production as we decided to do away with understudies and instead mount two equally strong principal casts. It was wonderful to see students work with their counterparts to encourage, inspire and 'lift each other up' with a genuine concern for bringing the best out in each other.

Close to 120 students were involved on stage, as part of the technical crew and pit band, and were supported by a dedicated team of staff and parent volunteers, and mentors, making this a mammoth ensemble effort of an extremely high quality. This was reflected in the glowing review the production received from the Theatre Association of South Australia stating "this production was smooth, slick and well coordinated. It was thoroughly entertaining and of a uniformly high standard, a credit to all involved" (Smith, 2024). The full review can be found on the TASA website (tasaonline.org.au).














# Community Events

# Heritage Centre

#### Autograph Books

From the 1920s through to the 1970s, autograph books were commonly used and highly prized possessions of many Concordia students. They asked fellow students, family, teachers and friends to contribute their autograph, an original poem or piece of verse, a personal message or a drawing.

As you can see by the pages displayed here, in many cases a great deal of time, care and talent was thoughtfully assigned to a single page entry. Pages of the autograph books contained anything from the heartfelt and sentimental to the humorous and witty. Some were a record of the names in the student's class or boarding house. The pages were looked through and admired by friends and family and served as a lifelong reminder of Concordia days.

The Concordia Archives has a collection of autograph books on display, dating back to the 1920s, which are both interesting and unique.

### **Old Concordians Blazing a Trail**

#### Janine Mohamed, Class of 1991, 2024 Australian of the Year for Victoria

### Tell us about where life has taken you since leaving Concordia...

After my schooling at Concordia from 1987-89, I initially moved to the Riverland to help my parents run a citrus farm. After a couple of hard years during the 1990s recession, I was keen to get back to Adelaide!

I studied nursing at the University of South Australia, trained at the Women's and Children's Hospital, and worked in clinical nursing, balanced with academic and research work. It highlighted to me the problems in the health system that created injustice and inequity in Indigenous health outcomes. So, I moved into the Aboriginal community-controlled health sector - and into policy work at statewide, national and international levels - seeing the deep need for work on antiracism and reconciliation.

I was awarded an Atlantic Fellowship in 2019, a Doctor of Nursing honoris causa by Edith Cowan University in January 2020 and, in 2021, a Distinguished Fellowship by The George Institute for Global Health Australia. I was recently awarded 2024 Australian of the Year for Victoria, which was a great honour.

I call myself 'the accidental CEO' because I had not planned to enter senior management, but I stepped up at the invitation of Elders who I deeply respected, to be CEO of the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM) and then the CEO at the Lowitja Institute.

As importantly, I am married to Justin Mohamed, Australia's inaugural Ambassador for First Nations People, and I am Mum to our five beautiful children.

### You recently finished up as CEO of the Lowitja Institute – can you tell us a little about the organisation and your time there?

The Lowitja Institute is Australia's national Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community-controlled health research institute. Across more than two decades it has challenged and disrupted Western models of research, and of power instilled in research organisations and funding.

The Institute's namesake and founding chair and patron was Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue, an extraordinary South Australian woman and a true trailblazer, who sadly just passed, aged 91.

Prior to the Lowitja Institute and its earlier iterations, research was done about and to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, not by and for us. This meant it was embedded in 'the deficit discourse' – where we were the researched "problem", rather than the systems that have caused us such harm.

My greatest joy at Lowijta Institute was that 60% of the organisation is made up of Indigenous staff, and 100% of the research the Institute commissions is led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers, who bring new and ancient knowledges into the health research space. As the oldest continuing culture on the planet, we take great pride in having been humanity's first researchers.

### Congratulations, you are the 2024 Australian of the Year for Victoria – please tell us what you would like to achieve.

I hope I can use the platform to open up more discussion and understanding about the impacts of racism on health and health care. No man, woman or child should die a preventable death because of their cultural heritage, yet too many do, and many others have near misses.

I will also continue to advocate for the creation of a national Truth Telling process. There are still significant numbers of people who are either unwilling or unable to confront the historical injustices, discrimination and racism faced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, which of course have ongoing impacts. Truth can be truly healing.

### What have been some of the defining moments in your life since Concordia College?

I'm proud and lucky to say there have been many:

- + Going into nursing.
- + A chance encounter as a trainee nurse with the extraordinary Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue that led to me having coffee with her every week in West Lakes for two months, where she imparted her wisdom and took a genuine interest in my future.
- + Being involved in and reading many coronial inquiries into preventable deaths of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, where no one stood up on their behalf and saw that they were being racially profiled. That has powered my work on the need for cultural safety in the health and justice systems.
- Learning about the impacts of climate change on people living in remote
   Aboriginal and Torres Islander communities.
   This led me to speak for change at the
   United Nations, COP-26 in Glasgow and COP-28 in Dubai.
- + Being granted an honorary doctorate by Edith Cowan University, being honoured as Alumni of the Year by UniSA, launching the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Worker Association, and embedding cultural safety into nursing and midwifery professional accreditation standards.



### What advice would you offer current students to inspire them?

Aim to leave the world a better place, to seek justice for the most vulnerable, to 'do no harm', and know your blind spots — that is, to examine your own beliefs, assumptions, biases and stereotypes that affect the way you interact with others, particularly Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

I'm very mindful that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people make up only three per cent of the Australian population, so we need and value the support of our allies.

My other advice is to be open-minded. I hated research when I was at school and university, and more recently I have led an outstanding health research institute. You never know where life is going to take you.

### Please tell us your fondest (or funniest) memory of being at Concordia College.

I have a few...

- Receiving my scholarship to go to Concordia College in the first place. It demonstrates the school's commitment to justice and equity.
- + Being at our Year 9 Social, dancing to Rick Astley's 'Never Gonna Give You Up' with my friend Simone Berry, perhaps at Burnside Town Hall? I might have had a rah-rah skirt on and too much hairspray in my hair!
- + My favourite teacher, Mr Pfitzner... he was dry as dry, but he made Science fun for me.
- + I also have fond memories of the importance of faith and Christian values at Concordia.

Melanie has worked throughout Australia in a variety of government and corporate industries covering criminal justice, social services and female leadership with a focus on reform.

During her time with South Australia Police (SAPOL) as a specialist detective and investigator, she completed the Catherine Helen Spence Memorial Scholarship focusing on an outcome that led to the offence of 'drink spiking' being included into South Australian criminal legislation. Melanie developed her portfolio of governance experience as a Board member and Chair of YWCA Adelaide, focusing on the status of women, safety and policy. She also attended international conferences focusing on microeconomics of women-led business in developing countries.

Next, Melanie transitioned into executive careers within community and social services development, including aged care, disability and education models for at-risk young people.



Melanie has worked with a variety of organisations to implement change management and create commercial service models as well as leading local and national projects to grow female participation for females and vulnerable populations, including within the AFL.

Melanie is now the CEO of Girl Guides SA with a focus on leadership for young women and growing female leaders of the future.

"The leadership opportunities that Concordia provided me as a young person were instrumental in my ability to go out into the world as a confident person who cared for others. I was taught that as an individual I was valuable to my community and I could do anything! Now, I am in a position where I can lead an organisation in providing caring, tailored, and holistic leadership opportunities to other young women. I feel incredibly privileged to do this and strongly feel that Concordia had a pivotal influence in helping me to grow into a capable and caring citizen."

#### **Concordia Girl Guides**

Year 11 Leader and German teacher Ms Judy Harris is a Girl Guide leader, she was a Brownie and a Guide as a child and returned as a leader in 1995. Although she said it was "just for one year" - that one year has stretched to nearly thirty!

Judy says: "I enjoy seeing the girls develop friendships and challenge themselves to try new things. Camps and outdoor activities are always a highlight, from kayaking to ice blocking. Community service is also important, and Guides have taken part in many projects, including tree planting on the Coorong and raising money to buy goats and fund drinking water for people in developing countries. When I was 23, I represented Girl Guides Australia at an international seminar in Switzerland. Since then, I have been fortunate enough to attend Girl Guide events around the World. I have also served on committees at State, National and global level, and

have taken groups of girls to events in England and Switzerland. Guiding really has significantly changed and enriched my life."

Current Concordia Campus girl guides Soraya (Year 7) and Eleanor (Year 9), are both members of the Knightsbridge Girl Guide Unit where Judy is a leader, and they told us what they like about being Girl Guides:

Soraya: "Being in Girl Guides means that I can be active and make friends, as well as serve the community."

Eleanor: "I like the opportunities and adventures at Girl Guides, it's a good way to meet girls similar to you."






Image: 'The Student Body of Concordia, 1931' taken from the 1931 Brown & Gold. Oscar is fourth from the left in the top row.

#### From the Archives

#### Oscar Johannes Aesche, Class of 1931 – 'A Rat of Tobruk'

Oscar was born on the fifth of January, 1917 at Ambleside. That year the town of Hahndorf was one of several towns that experienced a name change because of anti-Germanic sentiment generated after WWI (the town later reverted to Hahndorf in 1935 when South Australia celebrated its centenary).

Oscar attended Concordia College in 1931 as a boarder at the age of 14 and was one of 84 students at the time. Eventually his family moved to Monarto South, where Oscar worked as a farm labourer

At 23 years old, with the outbreak of WWII, Oscar enlisted to serve on the 29th of June 1940 and was allocated to the 2/48<sup>th</sup> Battalion. His early days were spent at Wayville before heading to Woodside. Oscar boarded the Stratheden in November and arrived in the Middle East on the 17th of December that year. His experience with driving trucks meant that Oscar was initially graded a Group III Driver Mechanic before returning to his battalion in October 1941.

Oscar was injured with a gunshot wound to his left foot and left thumb during the fierce, unrelenting fighting at El Alamein at the end of October 1942. That battle created a turning point in Egypt. On that night alone, nine of the Battalion were killed and 20 wounded in action. Of these, 16 were from South Australia and the remainder from Western Australia.

Authors John Glenn and Paul Oaten in 'Tobruk to Tarakan' described that event as the climax of the Alamein Battle and the reason the Battalion earned itself a new name, "In total 48 men from the 2/48th lost their lives in this battle. An horrific battle for the proud and very brave 2/48th Battalion who in future years were to proudly own the name 'Rats of Tobruk'" (Glenn and Oaten, 2012, p. 148).

Oscar was hospitalised for the next two months before boarding a hospital ship which arrived in Sydney on the 27<sup>th</sup> of February, 1943. Having endured such challenging conditions in the Middle East, Oscar returned to South Australia, where he received ongoing treatment for arthritis, resulting from the injury to his left hand and thumb.

Aged 59, Oscar died on the 21st of February 1976 with a plaque in his honour placed in the Tailem Bend Cemetery. His name also heads the list of Old Concordians who served in World War II and are honoured on the War Service Honour Board at Concordia College.
