

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# From the Head of College

"How might Concordia College as an ELC-12 learning ecosystem provide an innovative education within our community?"

On Monday 25 July, the College staff - along with Student Leaders, a selection of parents, Board Members, and Old Concordians - gathered to explore the new opportunities which come with increasing connections across a threecampus College structure. A highlight of the day was having strong representation from St Peters Lutheran School as we begin to share a new learning journey.

The day was facilitated by educational futurist Louka Parry, who put forward a series of provocations to participants about the future of learning and then posed the question,

"How might Concordia College as an ELC-12 learning ecosystem provide an innovative education within our community?"

This question was discussed amongst thirty small groups, who then presented solutions back to the audience. It was moving to see staff and students side by side sharing their amazing ideas about the future of learning at Concordia. The ideas put forward in this dynamic session have already been tabled and discussed at the College Leadership level. The pleasing aspect of these discussions is that our strategic learning agenda aligns with the ideas raised in many ways. However, there was a range of innovative ideas proposed which haven't been considered that will now be features of our future planning.

#### Some of the themes that emerged from the group sessions were as follows:

- + More student voice in subject and topic choices
- + A more flexible timetable, which allows students to spend extended time on deeper rather than superficial learning
- + More cross-campus and cross-year-level learning initiatives
- + More outdoor wellbeing and learning activities (with purpose-built outdoor facilities)
- + More significant community/industry input into the learning program
- + More individualised learning projects and
- + More learning connections to real-world

The feedback received on the day was compelling. We are looking very closely at the feedback provided as the themes will feed into redesigning our strategic plan, which is already underway. I believe the ideas raised will have exciting possibilities for our learning program moving forward.

Overall, it was an inspiring day where the Concordia community spoke with passion and purpose about the learning environment that they want to be part of in the not-too-distant future.

#### Student Learning

The last 12 months has been a landmark period in the history of Concordia College. During this time, we have transitioned to a leadership structure that is helping to streamline operations, and we have further developed as an amalgamated, multi-campus ELC to Year 12 College. This dynamic time has included the exciting redevelopment at the St John's Campus and the formalising of our partnership with St Peters Lutheran School, which will become a campus of Concordia College from January 2023. This places the College in a unique position, enhancing our ability to provide students with a connected, enriching and diverse ELC-12 learning experience wherein they can explore and develop their strengths and passions from the age of three right through to 18!



Through deliberately using and connecting the facilities, resources and expertise that exist across the College, we will be able to provide students, particularly at our Primary School campuses, with diverse and specialised learning experiences in the following areas.

#### STEM:

+ through facilitating a program in which students can engage with specialist teachers, experts, facilities and technologies, students will have opportunities to explore and solve realworld problems, both inside and outside the classroom.

#### Music:

+ through engaging in a greater variety and quality of performance groups and opportunities, students will have even more opportunities to explore their musical interests and strengths.

#### Drama:

+ through using our existing teaching expertise and facilities, we can bring this experience into our programs, which we know is a major area of passion for students.

#### Sport:

+ through connection across the campuses, a greater diversity and number of sporting opportunities can be provided, which we know is vital in supporting the wellbeing of young people and developing their teamwork and resilience.

## Exploring and Developing Passions:

+ through offering a greater range of competitions, clubs and teams, we will help students connect and build relationships with other like-minded peers and teachers, with opportunities to explore their passions in incredible facilities like our Media Studio.

## English Language Development Program:

+ for our increasing student cohort from multicultural backgrounds who require support with their English language development, this connected program across ELC to Year 12 is aimed at providing students with the skills and support to achieve their learning aspirations.

#### **Connected Transition Programs:**

+ through programs supporting students as they enter, transition between and exit the various campuses of the College, we will aspire to ensure that every child's strengths, needs and passions are understood so that we can best support their wellbeing during their time at the College as well as in their transition to post-school life.

Along with these exciting opportunities, we will be able to further strengthen what is often identified as a key strength of the College, our community. Through providing regular connection opportunities across our campuses, the strong culture of belonging, acceptance and supportive relationships that exists amongst our student and wider community will only be enhanced.

This pivotal time in the College's history is allowing us to collaborate and connect at a deeper level across ELC to Year 12, thereby enabling us to be stronger together. We look forward to the great benefits this will bring for Concordia students, both now and into the future.

A feasibility study was presented to the College Board on Thursday 21 November 2019 with the following aims:

- + Enhancing educational offering for all students through improved facilities and resources
- + Securing enrolments for the future by responding to demand for earlier entry into the ELC and entry into Upper Primary
- + Providing increased financial security
- Redeveloping aging facilities

This was endorsed by our College Board in 2019 and since this time the College has been working towards these aims.

Architects Brown Falconer were appointed in 2020, financial funding was finalised and an ambitious marketing plan was developed, incorporating consultation with key stakeholders.

Sarah Constructions were engaged for all developments at Concordia. The expansion at the ELC and Primary School was strategically planned in stages to ensure that students only moved once during the development, no transportable buildings were required and the school could continue to provide quality education during the anticipated 18-month build.

Building commenced officially in October 2021. It has not been without compromises and sacrifices, including being without a Hall and sections of our play space; however, we acknowledge the resourcefulness and adaptability of staff and students through this process.

It all seemed worthwhile when, at the beginning of Term 3 2022, staff and students were able to move into Stage 1 of our development. Our current ELC children moved into fabulous new facilities in the refurbished Hall area. This includes the first of three ELC classrooms, a kitchen, a sensory room, a Director's Office, a staff planning room and a spacious, dedicated entrance to the ELC. Our Reception students returned from holidays to refurbished classrooms and their own dedicated breakout spaces, toilets and Inclusive Learning area

Primary School staff are absolutely loving their facilities, which include a new staffroom with beautiful views to the Adelaide Hills, and new planning and meeting rooms.

As part of the planned expansion of our Music area, two additional private music rooms were completed and will support our growing tuition program. Driving past our site, the three-storey building, due for

completion at end of October, is taking shape and will be a prominent part of our Primary School, housing our Upper Primary students and the Resource Centre.

Another major development is the commencement of the College Gymnasium construction on the old Highgate Lodge site. In the coming weeks we will see the blockwork commence for a two-court gymnasium and changing rooms, a weights room, a café, three classrooms and a dance studio. This exciting project is due for completion in May 2023.

Researchers tell us that feeling a sense of belonging, inclusion and connection is a critical element to our maintenance of both identity and wellbeing. Recent media reports have variously outlined the struggle that a growing number of gender diverse, intersex and sexually diverse members of our wider community have in relation to feeling accepted, connected or included in society. Recently the Board adopted a "Respecting and valuing gender diverse, intersex and sexually diverse students in Lutheran Learning Communities" policy.

- 1. Each person is a unique creation of God and a person loved by God
- Students have God's all-inclusive and life-giving love demonstrated to them through the full inclusion of all students
- All students, regardless of intersex status, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, should be respected and valued and receive a quality education in a safe, supportive and inclusive environment, free from discrimination, bullying and harassment

It is said, 'Home is where the heart is'. Our heart should be where we can make a safe 'home' at Concordia College for each and every student whether they be at our St John's Campus, Concordia Campus or, soon to be, St Peters Campus.

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# Service Learning

On an icy cold Thursday at lunchtime, twelve intrepid staff members took their seats in the quadrangle. One by one these staff - some teachers, one a Pastor, another a Principal, and even a Head of College - calmly took their turn to have a large bucket of freezing water unceremoniously dumped on them, creating quite a spectacle for the students and staff in attendance! These staff volunteers had agreed to be doused with cold water should we reach certain fundraising milestones for our Term 2 service-learning project, which involved raising funds to support The Salvation Army in Unley. Incredibly, we surpassed all of our goals, raising approximately \$9,000!

This is one of a number of service-learning projects this year. Each term we choose one main project where we engage with those who do charitable work both locally and overseas. Across this year we will support:

- + The Salvos through their Digital Doorknock appeal
- + Lutheran Care's Winter and Christmas appeals
- + Australian Lutheran World Service's Walk My Way event
- + The Mustard Seed Family Project
- + The Collective of St Mary Magdalene.

While there is often a fundraising aspect to these projects, we also aim to educate and engage students in learning about the work of these agencies. We invite speakers from these organisations to speak at our Chapels and Assemblies, to help students hear about the needs of people in our world but also to hear stories of hope and gratitude that our involvement helps to bring these people. Student Leaders play an important role in working with staff to create events and activities that bring these projects to the community's attention by involving as many participants as possible.

Through these activities and the support of various agencies, students learn to look outside their own wants to the needs of others. We want our students to learn to take action where they see injustice and to act in compassion, as the parable of the Good Samaritan teaches, for those who cannot help themselves.

#### **Learning Respect for People and Country** in the ELC

The implementation of the College Reconciliation Action Plan in the ELC has resulted in significant learning for the children and educators. We have benefitted greatly from our developing relationship with proud Kaurna Elder Uncle Tamaru. The children have been greeting others in Kaurna, learning language through song and developing an understanding of and respect for Kaurna land 'yarta'. On Friday 3 June, all ELC and Primary School students gathered in a large circle on the oval in a collective statement of commitment to reconciliation.

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#### **Lunchtime Clubs**

Our lunchtime clubs cater for all ages, with students from different year levels connecting and working together on various fun activities. There are many options on offer - from crochet and knitting to chess, drawing, box construction, art, board games and dance - providing enjoyable recreational opportunities for students across a range of interests. These clubs have been invaluable while areas of the playground and oval have been inaccessible due to our construction projects, but they are also valued for the role they play in developing students' social skills, thinking skills, resilience and cooperation.










#### **Sensational Science**

Early in Term 3, we learned that two of our Primary School students who entered the statewide Oliphant Science Awards were winners in their categories. We are very proud of their achievements.

There have also been a range of other scientific learning opportunities for Primary School students in recent months, including:

- + the Year 1s visiting the Nautilus Centre to look at various substances under a microscope with support from Year 8 students, leading to many interesting observations and questions
- the Receptions heading to Fern Avenue Reserve as part of their Unit of Inquiry 'Sharing the Planet', exploring the conditions of living things and the special features that enable them to survive and thrive in their habitat
- + the Year 2s studying how living things grow and change by investigating animal lifecycles ahead of an excursion to the Adelaide Zoo.

#### **SA German Week Primary Activity Day**

A group of 20 Year 5 and 6 students represented the College at the inaugural South Australian German Week Primary Activity Day held at the Austrian Club in August. Following a bilingual performance of "Aschenputtel" (Cinderella) by Melbourne puppet theatre company 'Carrousel', students connected with peers from other schools in small groups to take part in a quiz on all things German. Several of our students were excited to take out the winning prize













#### **Year 8 Camp**

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The 2022 Year 8 Camp saw students working together in ten tribes, earning points across three days by participating in activities such as shelter building, bodyboarding, kayaking, a giant swing called the Flying Kiwi, raft making, obstacle courses and more. Although the camp experience was slightly different to previous years, students were again based primarily at Adare House at Victor Harbor. On the final day of the experience, students travelled to Glenelg for team-building activities and a trip to The Beachouse to enjoy water slides, dodgem cars, bumper boats and arcade games. It was a very enjoyable week full of fun and memories.





#### **Year 9 Camp**

The Departure Ceremony, a key milestone in our Concordia - The Rite Journey Pastoral Care program, saw the Year 9s and their parents/caregivers gather in the Chapel early on the first day of their camp, with a sense of excitement in the air.

The Flinders Ranges camp, forming the 'Adventure' component of Concordia - The Rite Journey, was both challenging and rewarding as students tried new things, saw spectacular scenery, built on their friendships and developed greater resilience. With students giving activities such as mountain biking, bush walking, rock climbing and abseiling their best shot, it was an incredible opportunity to witness how navigating challenges together with a common goal builds a strong sense of community. All in all, the 'Adventure' Camp was a fantastic reminder that stepping outside of your comfort zone will stretch you and lead to personal growth.



#### da Vinci Decathlon

A Year 7 team and a Year 9 team represented Concordia College at the 2022 da Vinci Decathlon, a competition designed to challenge the minds of school students across ten different categories. Employing their higher-order thinking skills, problem solving and creativity to compete against students from across Adelaide, our Year 7s placed in the top six in Science, Creative Producers, Ideation, Cartography and Legacy. Meanwhile, our Year 9s placed in the top six in Engineering, Science, Mathematics and Code Breaking. These are exceptional achievements given the rigorous nature of this competition and we commend the students involved for their efforts.





#### **Australia-New Zealand Brain Bee Challenge**

The 2022 Australia-New Zealand Brain Bee Challenge saw nearly 3000 Year 10 students learning about the brain, its functions, neuroscience research and more. Seven Concordia students participated, with four qualifying for the Individual and Team Challenge of the South Australian State Final at Flinders University. In the lead up, the team answered over 12,000 brain-related questions - a significant achievement in and of itself! We were very proud of their efforts and excited to learn that Concordia placed third in South Australia in the team competition. In addition, one of our students, Luke, was crowned overall State Champion. Luke will now proceed to the National Final and we wish him all the very best.







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# Personal **Project Exhibition**

In the final year of the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme, our Year 10 students explore an area of personal interest over an extended period. The Personal Project provides them with the opportunity to consolidate their learning and develop important skills they'll need in their learning and life beyond the classroom.

Students have explored a learning goal, which has culminated in a particular product. They have articulated the processes and Approaches to Learning skills used and developed through their work. They have also articulated the impact of the project on them and/or others.

The Personal Project allows students to formally show their approaches to learning skills for self-management, research, communication, critical and creative thinking, and collaboration. All of these skills lay the foundations for their learning and allow them to be able to reflect on their strengths and areas of growth before they move into the rigours of the final years of their schooling at Concordia.

As the personal interest takes shape, a broad range of Personal Projects are developed, as unique as the students who make them. It is always amazing to see the diversity and impact of the Year 10 Personal Projects.






























#### **Career Awareness Sessions**

- + Our Year 5/6 girls' cricket team defeated their opposition 2/108 6/52 to progress through to the next round of the School Sport SA (SSSA) statewide Twenty 20 cricket competition, which will be played in Term 4.
- + Our Year 5/6 boys' soccer team won both of their games to proceed to the finals of the SSSA Statewide Soccer Carnival, finishing fourth.
- + Both of our Year 5/6 basketball teams (boys and girls) were undefeated in the SSSA statewide basketball competition, qualifying for the state finals in Term 4.
- Our Primary School Athletics Team was very competitive at the Adelaide South East Sapsasa Athletics Carnival, placing third.

- + At the Volleyball SA (VSA) Schools Cup, our Open girls' team won gold and our Open boys' team won silver.
- + The Concordia Middle A and Senior A boys' basketball teams both ended their seasons on a high note, winning their respective Division 1 premierships in the SAAS competition. The Senior boys also won through to the semi-finals of the Statewide Knockout after the Year 7/8 boys were runners-up in their Statewide Knockout earlier this year. After winning the semi-final, the Senior boys played in a tough grand final match. We commend the team for their efforts with Concordia finishing as runner-up in the Statewide Knockout.



- + Our Middle A girls' football team won the IGSSA premiership shield, defeating their opposition by five points in a come-frombehind win.
- + The 7A girls' netball team won their grand final, taking out the IGSSA premiership shield.
- + Our Year 3 Concordia White netball team became Year 3/4 Division 2 Winter 2022 champions, winning their grand final 7-4.
- + Our Year 5/6 Concordia Gold netball team showed determination and resilience in a nail-biter grand final match, going goal for goal with their opposition for three quarters before stretching out their lead to win 20-15.
- + Our Pedal Prix teams have enjoyed opportunities to race in various locations this year, such as Victoria Park (Adelaide), Mount Gambier and Tailem Bend. At the Round 2 race at Tailem Bend, our allfemale Middle School team 'Shockwave' finished in third position in their category. At the following race held at Victoria Park, two of our teams achieved top 10 positions in their categories. Then, at the eight-hour race held at Tailem Bend, our Middle School girls' team finished fourth. At the 24-hour season finale in Murray Bridge, our trikes travelled a combined total of over 3,000km across the duration of the race. Our all-female Middle School team 'Shockwave' finished the series in second place in their division and our 'Concorde' Senior School team finished in seventh place in their division.

# Heritage Centre

#### Over 20 Years of the Review

In 2020, our 130<sup>th</sup> year, Concordia College produced the 20<sup>th</sup> edition of the Review Magazine.

The "Review" is an overview of the activities and achievements of the College from the past year. In the format of a glossy magazine, it presents a snapshot of College life from various perspectives, including students, families, teachers and the governing bodies.

The Review magazine was first produced in 2001 and replaced the "Brown & Gold" to reflect that in 1995 Concordia's uniform changed from brown and gold to blue and gold. The first Brown and Gold magazine was published in 1924 and the College has produced an annual magazine ever since.

The Head Editor in 1924 was Rev H. H. Bruhn. When Rev Bruhn was 88 years of age, he wrote down some memories of the first edition of the school magazine – "One evening we were discussing producing a magazine, and my friend Ewart Eckert drew the cover design freehand with Indian ink featuring the College motto during the hourlong discussion". This cover was repeated every year until 1927.

The Valedictory theme for 2001, the first year of the Review, was "Change and Constancy". Paul McFarlane, staff member and the Editor of the first Review, explained that the front and back covers of this edition represented the fine traditions of the past and at the

same time looked to the forward momentum of a growing school. The three windows on the cover represent our faith - the essential foundation of our school; the vision into the future, technology and the building blocks of knowledge; and finally, reflections from the past.

In 2016 the decision was made to amalgamate St John's Lutheran School and Concordia College, and in 2019 the Review included content from the ELC and Primary School for the first time. This same year the whole College from ELC-Year 12 adopted the original Concordia College motto of "Firm in Principle, Gentle in Manner" or in the original Latin "Fortiter in Re, Suaviter in Modo".


Since its beginnings in 2001, the Review has grown from 112 to 210 pages in length and is a much-awaited publication each year. It is particularly treasured by the Year 12 students as a memento of their final year at Concordia.

All editions of the Review can be found in the Concordia College Archives, along with every edition of the Brown & Gold Magazine, right back to 1924. The Archives also now house past publications from St John's Lutheran School, and any donations of back copies - especially of St John's magazines - will be gratefully received for our records.


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


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
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
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


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#### **Coming to Concordia** Noel Gaden, Class of 1949

Noel Gaden was 13 years old in 1949 and living at Koonibba Mission, a very small settlement between Ceduna and Penong in the far west of South Australia, with his family the year he was due to commence at Concordia College as a boarding student. Getting to Concordia was an adventure of many parts for the young Noel, who had never been to Adelaide or even travelled by train to Port Lincoln before.

Wilfred Coleman was the mission truck driver and met the train to collect the mail for Koonibba. He kindly gave Noel a lift to the "Koonibba Siding", where he waited for the rail car which would take him to Ceduna with his large suitcase. College started the next day, but the train only ran twice per week and boarders were only allowed to arrive at the College one day in advance, so Noel's only option was to arrive at College a day late.

Once in Ceduna, Noel boarded the 5.30 steam train to go to Port Lincoln, which stopped at every stop and took all night and the next day. When he arrived in Port Lincoln, it took a very tired Noel 40 minutes to get to the middle jetty with his heavy suitcase to catch the overnight boat to Adelaide.

For the whole journey Noel had relied on a "mud map" penciled out for him by the Lutheran Pastor at Koonibba, Pastor

Juers, and asking for directions from passersby. When Noel arrived at Port Adelaide at 7am on Wednesday, the day after College had started, he once again consulted Pastor Juers's map to make his way, towing the heavy suitcase to the train stop where the train would take him to the Adelaide Railway Station. Once Noel arrived at the Adelaide Railway Station, Pastor Juers's map told him to cross the road and make his way to King William Street, where he was to cross the road again and find the tram stop close to Rundle Street, with the tram to then take him up Duthy Street. The tram conductor instructed him to get off at the Winchester Street stop and walk up the road to Concordia College.

Noel arrived at the back entrance to the College and searched for someone or some directions. It was already 10am and classes had started, so there was no one around. Finally, he ran into Clem Traeger who showed him the way to his dormitory, which he would be sharing with nine other boys. The only bed left was made of an old gate welded onto a frame with a hard and scratchy mattress. There were no drawers left, the other boys had filled them all.

Noel got ready, left his suitcase near his bed and headed for the Geography class, which was already halfway through. Noel said the lecturer. Mrs Champion, was not impressed, and he was regarded as a disturbance by her for quite some time after that.

Over the school holidays for the first two years, Noel went to stay with the families of other students, as he could not get home and back to the College in the 10 days allowed for holidays. By his third year, Australian National Airlines

(ANA) had a DC3 passenger plane going to Ceduna, which then allowed him to get home for the holidays.

Noel completed his Intermediate studies at the end of 1951 and returned home to Koonibba. His memories of Concordia are very dear to him with many lifelong friends made and some memorable times, especially on the football field. Concordia is blessed to have Noel as a lifelong friend. He now lives in Adelaide and has been a regular attendee at College reunions and events and is one of the very active alumni from the Class of 1949 who have regularly met until a few years ago. They now enjoy each other's company at the 60+ Brown and Gold reunion, held at the College each September.

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# **Generations of Concordians** - Roma Zweck (Andriske, Class of 1951)

The story of many early Lutheran German immigrants and their descendants is a common one. The backdrop to Old Concordian Roma Zweck's story is no different - immigrant family settles in South Australia; children marry children of other Lutheran German immigrants; pause and repeat; and in some cases, like Roma's, pause and repeat, and even pause and repeat again. For the second generation, the 'pause' often involved re-settlement to a district farther into the regions, regions where the economics of living off the land are more challenging. For many early Lutheran Germans in South Australia, it's a familiar story.

Roma was a student of the Class of 1953. Galga is her hometown. "Mum was determined to send me," recalls Roma, "no matter how many cows it would take to milk!" In 1951, after two terms at Waikerie High, off to Concordia College she was sent as a day scholar. Roma lived with her sister and brother-in-law in Castle Street, Parkside - a convenient distance to ride a bike to school (rain, hail or shine). Roma completed Septima to Quinta, leaving with an Intermediate Certificate.

That determination still exists today, doesn't it? Perhaps it is in the knowledge that a faith-centred education will be given... Firm in Principle, Gentle in Manner comes to mind.

Roma speaks fondly of her friendship with Bethany Koop and her sometimes train-travelling companion Moira Dutschke. The two would often travel home to the Mallee together (with Moira alighting at Wynarka). Imagine today (if the trains ran that far), your teenage daughter taking such a journey by

Notwithstanding that Errol Zweck isn't an Old Concordian, his connection here is noteworthy. Errol came from a large family (as did Roma). He is one of 12. His connection is that six of his siblings attended Concordia, either as students or employees (Valerie, Lois, Carolyn, Glen, Trevor and Nelson). Roma has seven other brothers and sisters. Her sister Pauline also attended Concordia College in the Class of 1955.

Roma and Errol met at Bethlehem Lutheran Church youth gatherings and subsequently married there. A family then followed while dry-land farming out the back of Ki Ki (also in the Mallee).

Debbie Linke, their eldest daughter, attended Concordia in 1975 for one year before heading off to Lutheran Teachers College. Determined? Many, many years on, one of Roma and Errol's grandsons, Jackson, is a student at Concordia.

For Roma, the buildings and grounds have changed, but one thing will always remain the same - Concordia is where you'll find Christian values taught and lived.
