Concordia College Master Plan Building Program: A Beacon of Contemporary Education

Concordia College - always endeavouring to be at the forefront of educational innovation - will soon mark the completion of its Master Plan Building Program. A journey inspired by educational research, focusing on flexible learning spaces and student voice, has now culminated in an environment that fosters academic excellence and ensures the development of values-driven and compassionate individuals.

A New Chapter

The journey started with unveiling Ngarturna Trruku, our stunning new Early Learning Centre (ELC), designed to inspire our youngest learners. The attention to detail in our ELC reflects the commitment to creating environments where every child is known, cared for and equipped for the journey.

The rebuilding and refurbishment of St John's Campus classrooms followed, enhancing the learning experiences for all students at the campus. Known affectionately as The Treehouse, the new middle and senior primary classroom building stimulates curiosity and creativity, shaping students who are better at life and empowered to face the challenges of the modern world.









Spaces for Growth

Wirrkuta (the Kaurna name for activity) Trruku is a multifunctional activity and worship centre, which will become the spiritual centre of St John's Campus, providing a space where faith and community come together. Here, students learn to be relational and compassionate, embracing the values that are at the core of Concordia College.

Fortiter, our new state-of-the-art ELC-12 Gymnasium, symbolises strength and perseverance. It is more than a venue for physical activities; it is a symbol of the values we hold dear at Concordia College.

Library Refurbishments: Knowledge Meets Innovation

The rebuilding and significant refurbishment of all three campus libraries have transformed them into hubs of information and collaboration. These spaces foster a love for learning, equipping students with the tools to explore the world beyond textbooks. The increased patronage of these library spaces is a testament to the importance of having students directly involved in the design process.

Unique and Authentic Learning Experiences

Concordia can rightly claim to provide a unique and authentic educational journey. Through our building program, we have redefined what it means to be a student at Concordia College. Principals' Report

The new strategic plan has given the College an inspirational framework that ensures our students are at the very heart of all that we do at Concordia. As the strategic intents are realised, we are seeing the three pillars of **connecting**, **challenging** and **empowering** learners in action across the three campuses.

Connection across the College is a priority and we are using every opportunity to connect our learners. The recent cross-campus Reception Inquiry Day involved the St John's Reception classes visiting the St Peters Campus to explore art and nature. The students naturally formed connections with each other and the new environment. The Primary School Sports Day earlier this year, involving all Primary students and the House Leaders from the Senior School, was a wonderful example of meaningful connection as the students competed for their respective Houses in mixed teams. The inaugural Band Program in the Primary School has been a creative way for the Year 4s across

the College to connect with the Arts curriculum and to learn more about music through instrumental lessons. Both Primary campuses have also had the wonderful opportunity of having the Student Leaders deliver Chapel services.

Enrichment and Extended Learning

Celebrating 10 years of Academy Learning conferences at Concordia College

In 2023, we celebrated 10 years of hosting Junior and Senior Academy Learning conferences as part of our commitment to high-quality academic enrichment and extension opportunities. These world-class "thinking days" for highly able students stimulate thought beyond the constraints of the curriculum. They are facilitated by Julie Arliss - a well-known international educator of gifted students. Julie is on the examining team for Cambridge International Examinations and is a Farmington Scholar from the University of Oxford. This year, over 300 students and staff from Concordia and other schools explored topics including:

- + Epistemology
- The Science of Happiness
- Social Physics the relationship between Big Data and Al and Nanoscience.

Both conferences offered an incredible day of learning for our students - big ideas for curious minds!





More Extraordinary Extension Opportunities

While there are too many extraordinary extension opportunities to list exhaustively, here are some of the recent experiences from Terms 2 and 3:

- + Our team of 12 students from Years 9 to 11 received Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards in Round 1 of The Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO)

Enrichment and Extended Learning



Student Learning

Our core purpose at Concordia is to support our young people to be prepared for life, both now and into the future. As adults, we know that life is changing and adapting at a rate we have never experienced before, with many factors changing the way we work, learn and interact. Our students are experiencing this as well.

What does this mean for our young people at Concordia College?

As an ELC to 12 College, we are uniquely placed to support every young person to develop the specific skills and dispositions that we believe will 'prepare them for life', whatever their future may look like.







Collaboration and Communication

As a College with over 1,400 students and 250 staff spread across three campuses, the opportunities for our students to develop collaboration and communication skills is unlimited. In many ways, Concordia reflects a contemporary workplace. In all dimensions of school life, a Concordia student is constantly in connection with others, developing these important skills.

Emotional Intelligence

We also recognise that collaborating, learning and communicating with people can be challenging at times, especially emotionally. To build emotional intelligence, we explicitly teach the brain science behind emotions and the signs of emotional dysregulation. This approach is consistently applied across the early and middle years. It provides students with the understanding, language and strategies to support their own emotional intelligence – a much-needed skill for learning and for their futures.

Creativity and Entrepreneurship

Whether to effect social change, solve a problem or generate an income, the capacity for our students to be able to turn an idea into reality is critical. After all, this is something that machines and artificial intelligence cannot do - think creatively! Through our International Baccalaureate (IB) programmes - particularly the Year 6 Exhibition and Year 10 Personal Project students take a 'deep dive' into a personal area of passion. They are empowered to further develop and use their creativity to devise a product or solution that has personal meaning and benefits others. These opportunities are expanded through our Senior School, where many of our subjects are deliberately centred around the application of creativity and entrepreneurial skills within the contexts of industry and wider community groups.





Leadership

At Concordia, we believe that leadership is an act of service. The community service heart of the College means that every student has the responsibility to develop and apply their leadership skills in supporting and bringing out the best in others. Whether it is supporting the transition of new students, having Old Concordians return to coach and mentor current students, or leading initiatives that positively impact the lives of others, we are developing leaders who lead with their hearts.

The development of these skills is essential to enable every learner at Concordia to be challenged, connected and empowered. We are strongly committed to continue this course of action and focus, and I personally look forward to strengthening our learning community in my new role as Principal at our St John's Campus from 2024.

Students engaged in choreographic devices, creative body-based movement and imagery techniques, learning to express themselves physically with motion and sharing their creativity with their peers.





Musical Inspiration

High-energy music, engaging props and interactive tunes had students mesmerised when the JAM (Just Add Music) band visited St Peters Campus. Playing a blend of old classics and current hits, they captured our students' attention and had them dancing, clapping and singing along. At St John's Campus, a visit from Kaboom Percussion produced a similar result, with performers Nathan and Laura using a range of objects to create catchy beats in an entertaining and interactive drumming show. Sharing the Planet Inquiry

Provocation boxes from Nature Ed filled with items to see, touch and explore gave our Year 1 and 2 students at St Peters Campus a perfect introduction to their 'Sharing the Planet' unit of inquiry, sparking curiosity and prompting insightful questions. When Animals Anonymous visited, they brought cute and cuddly creatures for a memorable hands-on learning experience. Seeing some amazing animals up close, students learned about animal needs, behaviours, adaptations and habitats - a memorable reminder of our shared responsibility to respect and care for living creatures. Later, students explored the impacts of plastic pollution and went on a virtual reality journey to explore the Great Barrier Reef and Daintree Rainforest, which inspired ideas for sustainable alternatives to plastic.

St John's Campus ELC Teddy Bear's Picnic

The sun was shining and spring was well and truly in the air as our three-year-old children from the St John's Campus ELC enjoyed a walk across the Oval to the Concordia Campus Memorial Garden for a special Teddy Bear's Picnic event in Term 3. There were books, games, food – some of which had been made by students and educators the day before – and, of course, teddy bears aplenty. It was a lovely way for the children to see the Middle and Senior School campus in a relaxed environment and we look forward to more opportunities for our youngest learners to experience some of the amazing spaces at the 'big school'.





Middle School Highlights

Young Women in STEM

A group of Year 10 girls attended the Young Women in STEM event at the University of Adelaide, applying their problem solving, communication and collaboration skills to a variety of activities. In a challenge set by the Engineering department called Cantilevers in Action, they built cranes to set specifications and tested their load capacity. They also learned about robotics and created a structure to free a Mars rover that was stuck in a crater. A third challenge involved assembling a DC motor with copper wire, a magnet and a battery. Additionally, the event provided a wonderful opportunity to hear from women in STEM fields. This was a valuable source of inspiration for our students who may be considering future career pathways in this exciting industry.







Capabilities in Action Exhibition

This year, our Year 10 Exhibition was the culmination of both the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme Personal Project and the students' journey through their SACE Stage 1 Exploring Identities and Futures studies. Across Terms 1 and 2, students explored their own connections and passions to identify a project of personal interest. The Exhibition of their work, titled 'Capabilities in Action' saw surfboards, skim boards, sustainable fashion, sushi, soccer goals, skate ramps, songs and more on display - a testament to the variety of student interests represented and to the hard work, commitment and creativity of our students.









Backflips Against Bullying

As part of their Pastoral Care program, our Year 7s and 8s witnessed a daring display exploring bullying behaviours taught through parkour and flips. The presentation by visiting presenters from Action Education covered topics such as power dynamics and resilience, cyberbullying and the consequences of such negative behaviours in the real world - a valuable learning opportunity presented in a highly engaging way.







Year 8 Normanuille Camp

Normanville was the location of this year's annual camp for our Year 8s. The program was packed with activities such as hiking, kayaking, snorkelling and team-building challenges. The students visited other stunning Fleurieu Peninsula locations from their base in Normanville, including Second Valley and Deep Creek Conservation Park. They also had the opportunity to cook their own food on Trangia stoves and sleep in tents while learning about the local environment and wildlife. Following their time away, Year 8 student Adele commented,




Year 10 Service Activities




















Year 12 Analytical Chemistry and Titration Competition

Our Stage 2 Chemistry students travelled to Flinders University in Term 2 for an Analytical Chemistry workshop. To complement their studies on how complex mixtures can be separated using chromatography, the excursion connected theory with practical application. Students saw how to separate the components of Kool-Aid using column chromatography. They also discovered how to separate and combine the ingredients that make the 'glow' in glow sticks. Their final investigation looked at some of the chemical components of wine using a gas chromatogram and they witnessed a demonstration of the applications of atomic absorption spectroscopy. Later in the term, students had the opportunity to participate in the National Titration Competition, honing the precision of their practical skills to try to achieve the best possible titration.

Two of our teams had a combined error of less than two percent in the school phase, which saw them progress to the State round at the University of South Australia. Both teams performed well and one advanced to the National competition. At this stage they were classed as an 'Excellent Team' with a combined error of less than one percent, and they finished the competition ranked in the top 10 in the nation.









Year 11 'Steps to Success Day'

The 'Steps to Success Day' is designed to help Year 11 students navigate their first year of Senior School, supporting them to learn to study effectively while leading a balanced life. Sam Ghamrawi from Sekseed Projects presented sessions on setting up for success, organisation and time management. Several Old Concordians spoke about their experiences in the Senior School and the pathways they have taken since finishing at Concordia, offering their tips for success. The afternoon saw students taking a change of pace, engaging in relaxing activities such as walking and mindful colouring, or participating in volleyball, cooking and karaoke. Overall, the day presented a wonderful chance for students to learn new study strategies, switch off from their daily routine, try new activities and relax with their peers.

Legal Studies Learning Opportunities

A group of 13 Year 12 Legal Studies students spent a portion of their autumn holiday break on an educational tour of Canberra, learning about Australia's legal system, history, culture, heritage and democracy. Visits to sites such as Parliament House, the National Gallery, Old Parliament House and the High Court of Australia were particularly beneficial, relating to three topics within their SACE course: Sources of Law, Dispute Resolution and the Constitution. In addition to this trip, our students have had a range of other engaging learning opportunities, including attending a Just Lawful podcast presentation at the University of Adelaide, hearing from numerous guest speakers and competing in the SA Law Society Mock Trial Competition.

The Concordia College Law and Justice Society's annual Themis Dinner returned after a pandemic-induced hiatus, with over 75 students, Old Concordians and guests from the legal profession attending. Tania Leiman, Professor and Dean of Law at Flinders University, presented the keynote speech 'Facing the Future, What's law got to do with it?'. The question time that followed proved very helpful for students considering a Law pathway.







Concordia Students Study at Top UK Universities

Leading into the three-week mid-year break, we congratulated and farewelled Year 11 students Sienna and Macy, who were heading to England to study two-week courses in areas of interest at two leading universities:


- + Sienna attended the University of Cambridge to study 'Medicine and the Brain', focusing on the speciality of neuroscience while learning about cognitive psychology, neuroanatomy and clinical methods and practices.
- Macy attended a residential course in Film Studies at the University of Oxford, exploring film theory, film history, screenwriting, practical filmmaking and editing.

















Science Week

The 2023 National Science Week theme of 'Innovation: Powering Future Industries' was expansive and engaging, prompting students to consider how creativity and innovation in the sciences have shaped our present and will continue to shape the future. During the week, Stage 1 students ran Showcase lessons for Year 7 and Year 8 students, sharing their learning in Biology, Chemistry, Physics or Psychology. Many of the Showcase exhibits were interactive, while others provided interesting information and demonstrations. It was wonderful to see the Year 11 students developing their leadership skills by becoming the teachers and communicating their knowledge to their Middle School counterparts through these lessons.

A special lunchtime session also provided interested students with an opportunity to hear from Old Concordian Dr Lauren Thurgood (2000), who lectures in medicine and public health and works as a research associate in molecular medicine and genetics at Flinders University. For those starting to explore possible pathways into the medical field, this was an invaluable experience!

Reflecting on this year's theme, Dr Catherine O'Halloran (Science Coordinator) said.

"National Science Week's theme of "Innovation: Powering Future Industries" resonates deeply with our educational journey at Concordia. It underscores the profound role that creativity and innovative thinking play in shaping our world. Fostering these qualities isn't just about amassing facts, but about cultivating the ability to navigate the uncharted waters of progress with ingenuity and imagination."

Service Learning

At Concordia College, we partner with two Lutheran Church service agencies, Australian Lutheran World Service (ALWS) and Lutheran Care.

In Term 1, over 60 Year 7 to 12 students were willing walkers for the ALWS Walk My Way challenge, travelling 19km from Bridgewater to Beaumont on the Pioneer Women's Trail. Students raised approximately \$18,000 to assist with the Turkiye earthquake appeal - an extraordinary effort!

Our Term 2 focus turned more local, supporting Lutheran Care's winter appeal for people doing it tough in South Australia. We held our 'Wear Winter Woollies' day with students donating an item of warm clothing or a blanket. Many items were donated as students rugged up in their winter woolly outfits and the Middle and Senior School students enjoyed a sausage sizzle, raising over \$2,500.

We were pleased to support the Red Shield Appeal again in Term 3. Middle and Senior School students were invited to seek sponsorships and sleep rough in their backyards for a night. For every \$500 raised, a staff member was doused with icy water. A friendly competition between the Middle and Senior School Student Leaders also saw the senior leaders on the receiving end. St John's Campus students enjoyed a Pyjama Day with gold coin donations adding to our fundraising. We raised approximately \$10,000 towards this cause.

These events are strongly supported by members of the College community and we are grateful for the generosity and kindness of all. Thank you to everyone involved.

- + ABODA Music Festival This year, Concordia entered eight ensembles into the statewide competition. For the eighth consecutive year, our String Ensemble won the Advanced String Ensemble section. Our Orchestra and Concert Band also won their respective Advanced sections an incredible result for both groups! Additionally, our St John's Campus Concert Band, our Wind Ensemble, Chamber Strings, Big Band 1 and Big Band 2 were all awarded Silver awards.
- + UKARIA Chamber Music Concert The worldrenowned UKARIA Cultural Centre again hosted Concordia's Chamber Music concert in August. Involving our small ensembles, this was a delightful and diverse program of highquality music performed in a most beautiful setting. This was the first time Concordia was represented by all three campuses on stage.

- Getting to know you...

Heritage Centre | Bringing Concordia's History to Life

At Concordia, we are very fortunate to have a wonderful representation of our 133-year history in the archive collection, housed in the College Heritage Centre. Our collection includes photos, uniforms, magazines and books, trophies, maps, drawings and more. Some of our items are over 100 years old! We are thankful to the community members and Old Concordians who have donated so many interesting and varied items to the archives, which greatly enhance the collection – a wealth of historic artefacts that help bring history to life for today's students.

An important function of the Heritage Centre is educating our students about the long and fascinating history of their school. Year 1 and Year 7 classes visit the Heritage Centre each year to discover how Concordia became the school it is today. With this newfound knowledge, they complete history projects and assignments.

Our comprehensive collection of old uniforms, badges and hats receives a lot of attention from students, and it makes them appreciate their own uniform in comparison! Students from other year groups regularly visit the Heritage Centre to find a variety of things or sometimes just out of curiosity. Concordia has many multigenerational families, and students love to find photos, uniforms and workbooks from the days when their parents, grandparents or even great grandparents attended our College.

Our archives include copies of "Brown and Gold", the original school magazine, dating back to the very first edition published in 1924. The book "Concordia - 100 Years, Murtoa - Adelaide" written by Rev Dr Elmore Leske is an invaluable record of College events from 1890-1990, and is often referred to by students and other community members. Old Concordians also regularly visit the Heritage Centre to conduct their own research or browse our photo galleries.

Throughout the College there are reminders of our history, including two gallery walls in The Suaviter and a large mural on the Peace Building breezeway wall. We also have a Heritage Trail, around the Highgate campuses, consisting of 16 plaques, each with information and photos depicting the history of the building or area in which they are located. A Heritage Trail booklet serves a self-guided tour guide, accompanying visitors on their journey around the Trail.

We have been very fortunate to have had the assistance of some wonderful volunteers in our archives over the years. These dedicated people have helped sort through and name old photos, scan documents and complete other general archival tasks, for which we are most thankful. From the Archives – Concordia Centenary Coins

Marie (Baum 1959) and Michael Salmon

In the Heritage Centre, we have a few beautifully crafted spoons that were designed and made by Michael and Marie Salmon. The spoons were to celebrate the centenary of Concordia 1890-1990. They are made of 1890 pennies and half pennies from Michael and Marie's collection.

Michael is an exceptional artisan and craftsman who has worked for trophy companies and made exquisite copper vessels, candlesticks, communion ware and vases for the Lutheran church. He designed and oversaw the creation of large stained-glass windows and made the enameled cross at St Peters Lutheran Church, Blackwood. Perhaps his greatest works were made when Michael was chosen to create gifts for the Queen to celebrate the Centenary of Federation in 2001 and for her Golden Jubilee in 1992.

To gain permission to use pennies for the Concordia spoons, Michael and Marie had to apply to John Howard, the then Treasurer of Australia. Permission took 18 months to obtain. Michael shaped the spoons using a press, engraved the handles with the words "1890-Concordia College Centenary-1990" and twisted the handles using an old addressograph he bought at an APEX auction and modified so it would do the job. The pennies were silver soldered to the handles and then coated with 22-carat gold using an electroplating process first used by the Egyptians 5,000 years ago!

The Salmons made approximately 24 of the spoons and presented them to the College to give as gifts for our 100 Year celebrations, including some with dignitaries' names engraved on them. The College then asked for more to sell to the community. Michael was able to make over 40 more with 1890 pennies he had in his collection. The spoons were presented in brown velvet boxes that had been especially made.

Thanks to Michael and Marie Salmon for this incredible gift to the College.

Generations of Concordians

- The Strelan Family

Samuel Strelan (Year 11) is a fourth generation Concordian and his father, Rev John Strelan, helped us piece together the history of Strelans at Concordia.

Sam's great-grandfather, Rev P.G. Strelan was the first in the long line of Strelan Concordians. He was a member of the Class of 1919 and later became a teacher at Concordia College (1964-71).

The generational attendance was more due to happy circumstance than deliberate planning. After graduating from Concordia Seminary in 1927, P.G. Strelan became a parish pastor in country New South Wales and Victoria. In 1953 he took a call to the St John's congregation in Unley. At that time the congregation had no building of their own, so they worshipped in the College Chapel, as they do to this day.

Sam's grandfather, Dr J.G. Strelan (Class of 1948) was a missionary in Papua New Guinea for 25 years. Initially he had no plans to send his children to Concordia, but in the mid-1980s he took a call to Luther Seminary in Adelaide and lived in Malvern, so it made sense for his children to attend Concordia. John started at the end of Year 10 and graduated in 1987.

John also went on to enter the ministry and served in parishes in New South Wales and country South Australia. John reflects that sending his children to Concordia was the last thing he expected to do. However, in 2015 he accepted a call to the St Stephen's congregation in Adelaide, which meant

another generation of Strelans had an opportunity to attend Concordia.


One connection that all generations of Strelans have is their involvement in sport at the College (cricket, tennis, football, athletics and, more recently, soccer and volleyball).

John said, "What I appreciated most about my time at Concordia was the sense of community that I felt. It was a place where I made lifelong friends. That sense of community is still something that exists at Concordia despite the growth in student population and the building developments that have taken place over the last 40 years. I see the same supportive environment at work today just as much as it was when my father and grandfather attended Concordia."

Old Concordians Blazing a Trail

We recently caught up with Gillian Stevens (Chapman 1973). Gillian has had an interesting and varied career.

Where has life taken you since Concordia College?

I have had a fantastic career working with developing nations and representing Australia through my role in the Defence Force.

As a student I was challenged with dyslexia, but found confidence through sport. I went on to complete a degree in Accountancy and a master's in health service management. In my early twenties I lived and worked in an Aboriginal community (Indulkana), setting up their computer system. For 16 years I managed Australian Government foreign aid programs, World Bank and Asian Development Bank programs, travelling to countries like Kyrgus, Papua New Guinea and Samoa. From 2000 to 2002 my son and I lived in Indonesia where my role was General Manager of Coffey International. It was a challenging time, with the Bali bombing and attacks on the Australian Embassy and the Australian International School where my son attended.

Sadly, my husband passed away, which precipitated a career change. In 2004 I worked in the Australian Public Service before joining the Army Reserves to continue the international connection.

During 2010, Coffey International offered me a two-year contract in West Timor as Governance Adviser on a maternal neonatal program, overseeing the construction of culturally sensitive maternal neonatal centres and the design and development of a procurement system.

By 2016 my public service role was Executive of Aged Care. By 2020 I had left the public service as I was asked by Defence to deploy to Iraq. I spent three months on pre-deployment training and six months in Iraq as the Finance Adviser. My role involved managing the international agreements for logistics and providing financial advice to two Commanders. I resigned from Defence in 2022 as a Major.

I'm now a self-funded retiree, involved in South Australian Recreation Trails. I've raced the Simpson Desert on a fat bike for the Royal Flying Doctors and ridden twice from Coolangatta to Sydney to raise money for Baptist World Aid. More recently I became an ambassador for the Adelaide Parklands Association and I'm about to head off to cycle Lands-End to John O'Groats in the UK.









Do you have any funny or favourite memories that you would like to share?

I enjoyed hanging out with a small group of friends. We used to turn the hose on each other on 40-degree days. I'm not a good singer, so I could never join the choir, but I did learn guitar. I'm still learning the guitar and I still can't sing but it's fun and social.

Playing sport was my outlet; however, no matter how hard I tried, I could never beat Lyn Schumacher at running! On weekends I played netball with a group of school friends for the local Lutheran Church. We were pretty competitive and won the trophy a few times. I'd kick the footy with the boys, but I was never allowed to play, so I used to watch them on the weekend and hand out water.

In Year 11 we went on an exchange to Alice Springs and also visited Ernabella. We had boarders from Ernabella and I loved their down-to-earth attitude. This experience was a real connection for my time spent working in Indulkana.

What motivates you?

- + A challenge: Setting a goal and working/ training towards it.
- + Nature and getting involved: A few years ago, I moved from the western districts to the city. I've adopted Adelaide Parklands Park 23, which means I regularly go there to clean. The area has several wetlands, which are home to kookaburras, frogs and all types of birdlife.
- + Being thankful: Even when things get me down, I remind myself to be thankful for what I have and to let go of what I don't have.

What advice would you give to students?

- 1. Life doesn't stop at school. Being dyslexic was difficult, but I had to realise it wasn't about what others were doing. What was important was what I could do with what I was given. I realised it's important to find a small strength or gift and work with it, then build on it.
- Be forgiving. People don't always respond or react in the way you expect or hope. It is far easier to enjoy what we have been given if we forgive and move on. Bitterness takes us nowhere.

Where has life taken you since Concordia College?

I was part of Concordia's first IB Diploma
Programme cohort. When I graduated, I just went
with the flow a bit, not knowing what I wanted to do
professionally. I originally enrolled in an Arts/Science
double degree at the University of Adelaide, but a
few weeks before the semester started I realised I
wanted to pursue a Media degree.

I had a fine time at university, made some good friends and really found my passion in community radio on Radio Adelaide. I created a comedy show called The Beefcake Hour with Liam Phillips (2012), airing on Thursday nights. I became increasingly involved, serving as the University of Adelaide's Student Radio director in 2016 and producing a few things for the national Community Radio Network.

After my degree, I worked at a film post-production house, which turned into a gig filming SA Parliamentary proceedings, before resuming my radio journey and landing my first commercial radio job in Port Pirie. After two years and the worst of a global pandemic, I moved to the Riverland to host the breakfast show.

I've also been making my own film about Ned Kelly, which I shot out in the bush with my regional radio buddies. I'll finish it eventually...

You were nominated for and won an Australian Commercial Radio Award for Best On-Air Team (Country) for 2022, can you tell us about that?

I'm really proud of the show I do with my cohost, Brooke Humble. We were mashed together as two disparate talents, but we genuinely hit it off. That friendship leant itself to lots of hilarity and adventures, but it also felt like a strong point of difference. I had a great time assembling our highlights reel for the awards and the nomination was a huge moment for us.

I can't tell you much about winning the award, since it all came so fast, but Richard Wilkins read our names out, Brooke gave me a big hug, and the Australian Radio Network bosses were thrilled with the result. It's exciting that we have been nominated for an award again this year.

Do you have any funny or favourite memories that you would like to share?

I was blessed to go on multiple overseas band trips, first to Malaysia in 2010 and then to Hong Kong and China in 2012. The 2012 trip was a logistical nightmare for the staff, but a really great last hurrah at the end of Year 12, sharing a holiday with the dozen or so people I'd been playing music with for my entire schooling.

I had a great time at Concordia. I don't want to be boring, but there are math classes, walks home from school, jokes in the Quad and so on that all count as cherished memories. One of my closest friends from school passed away a few years ago, and those are primarily the memories I have with her. They're very special times.

What advice would you give to students?

I really struggled figuring out what I wanted to do after school and I didn't need to. There are so many pathways to get to where you want - or some other place you didn't know you wanted. Until then, just find something to keep you social and work on having good relationships with others. You can't beat that.
